THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

OUTBREAK IN BELFAST.

An official report issued from Dublin Castle on Sunday states:—A party of police in a tandem, on Curlew patrol, was fired at in Ross road, Belfast, just after 12 a.m. to-day.

Dublin Castle states that Major G. B. O'Connor, J. P., Hinchinetta, County Cork, was shot dead on Sunday night and died.

TWO DUBLIN BANKS ROBBED.

Nearly £200 Taken. At about an hour before the beginning of the truce, two branches of the Ulster Bank in Dublin were robbed by armed men.

TO BOIL RICE FOR CURRIES.

Patna rice should be chosen for curries. Before boiling wash it well in several waters. Then ready in a large saucepan three parts full of fresh boiling water; add salt.

SWEDEN AND BAKED EGGS.

APRICOT SPONGE PUDDING.

Six ounces of flour, three ounces of butter or oil, and two ounces of sugar are the ingredients of this pudding. Beat the butter or oil and sugar together, then add the flour and mix thoroughly.

NON-INFLAMMABLE TIMBER.

A process by which timber is made fire-proof consists in submitting the wood in a closed cylinder to a steaming and vacuum treatment, which removes the air and moisture in the pores of the wood and vaporizes the sap water.
