RE-AFFORESTATION.

One of the most interesting and important schemes for Irish industrial development, and one intimately associated with the natural resources of the country and its climate, is that of re-afforestation.

It has been before the public for years past, and practical educational work is being consistently pursued by the Irish Forestry Society with encouraging results.

There is a very wide scope for tree-planting on our hillsides and low lands whether as regards replacing woods denuded during the war, and anterior to it or in the laying down of new plantations.

Timber has its value not alone from a commercial point of view, but also as an important adjunct to the farm, as a means of protection or shelter for cattle against the rays of a scorching sun or the biting wintry blasts.

And then from the point of view of the picturesque, what is more pleasing to the eye, to the lover of nature, than the trees clothed in such and varied foliage, bright and tender in the early Spring, and again, with all their beautiful tints in the months of Autumn.

The subject, in whatever aspect we may regard it, is an altogether attractive one, and it is not just now called to mind by the first annual report of the Forestry Commissioners, appointed under the Act of 1919.

Shortage of timber is not confined to Ireland; it is equally the experience in Great Britain, if not more so. The Commissioners are of opinion that the area of productive woods had been considerably reduced before the war, and that the rotation of woods in Great Britain and Ireland has, as a rule, greatly exceeded the economic period.

There are difficulties now in the way of re-afforestation which did not exist before the war. For instance the cost of materials has very much increased, and as the report says, railway rates have advanced to such an extent that making thinings from young plantations unprofitable except in the immediate neighbourhood of commercial centres.

But at the same time the operations of the Forestry Commission are giving a decided impetus to tree-planting, and it goes without saying that each year that passes will in the future be a record of increased acreage under young timber.

MAURETANIA AFIRE.

Extensive Damage. Olympic in Danger Zone. An alarming fire occurred on the famous Cunard liner Mauretania at Southampton yesterday afternoon.

Smoke was noticed issuing from the first-class saloon, and the alarm being immediately raised, the fire was quickly extinguished. By eight o'clock the outbreak was completely extinguished. MR DEVLIN ON PEACE. At the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Dublin Distillers Company, of which he was re-elected a director, Mr Joseph Devlin yesterday referred to the Irish situation, but he then in a few words, as far as he was concerned, he thought they were on the eve of peace in Ireland.

AN ENGLISH LABOUR VIEW. Reporting on the work of the Parliamentary Labour Party to the conference of textile factory workers at Blackpool yesterday, Mr Tom Shaw said that their policy had been justified repeatedly by the fact that, after making a bad mistake, the Government had been compelled finally to revert to the proposals made by the Labour members.

THE TRUCE. Dublin Castle received no reports yesterday of any disorders or disturbances in any part of Ireland. The Corn Production Acts Repeal Bill, as amended in Committee, was considered on report in the House of Commons yesterday.

TO-DAY'S TELEGRAMS. (SPECIAL TO THE CHRONICLE) MILITARY COURT DEATH SENTENCES. Cases of J. J. Egan and P. Higgins.

TUBERCULOSIS CONVENTION. Message from the King. In a message to the International Tuberculosis Convention, which opened in London to-day, the King said he confidently hoped that the encouragement already achieved by the co-ordination of effort in fighting the scourge, would be still further advanced by the present Congress.

BANTAM-WEIGHT CHAMPIONSHIP. Regained by Pete Herman. Brooklyn, Monday.— Pete Herman to-night out-pointed J. Lynch in fifteen rounds, thus regaining the bantam-weight championship.

THE MAURETANIA FIRE. Another Outbreak. The smouldering embers of the Mauretania fire burst into flames again shortly before midnight, but by 1 o'clock the outbreak was finally quelled.

EXPLOSION AT PORTSMOUTH. Two Killed—Two Missing. Two men were killed, two are missing, and four were injured by an explosion to-day at Friday's naval shell filling establishment at Portsmouth.

CENTRAL AMERICA. The "Daily News" says— News has just been received in this country of the satisfactory completion of the negotiation resulting in the merging of the five Central American Republics of Guatemala, Honduras, Salvador, Nicaragua, and Costa Rica in a single sovereign State.

THE NEAR EAST. An Athens telegram, dated Sunday, states— An official communication says that the great battle of Dryas ended in a striking victory for the Greek army. The pursuit of the enemy continued throughout the day as far as forty-five kilometers from Dryas. Orders issued on Turkish lines confirm that the enemy had concentrated practically all his forces, and attacked with the intention of recapturing Dryas. The remainder of the enemy's troops beat a retreat; night towards Sivrihisar. We have counted hitherto forty guns, and have captured a number of prisoners and much war material. The rapid progress of the operations does not permit of a exact enumeration of the booty taken.

IRISH MEDICAL FEES. In the House of Commons, Mr. Jellicott asked the Minister of Health whether in view of the serious loss involved in medical practitioners in Ireland, arrangements will be taken to restore the fee to the level for the notification of infectious diseases to its pre-war amount of 2s 6d.

Further Rainfalls Predicted. The continued rainfall during the week-end has already begun to have an appreciable effect on the crops. Further falls of rain are forecast in northern and north-western districts, with an extension of the rainy area in a day or so.
