IRISH RAILWAYS TRIBUNAL. When the Railway Arbitration Tribunal assembled at the Shelbourne Hotel, Dublin, yesterday, the Great Northern Railway Company was not represented.

IRISH RAILWAYS FINANCES. According to the monthly statement of the British Midland Railway, the total gross receipts by Irish-controlled railways was £249,003 and the expenditure £260,356, leaving an adverse balance of £11,353, plus a deficiency of £2,976, under the heading of "Other Items".

Joint Synods Meet. The Election of Bishop. The Joint Synods of Limerick, Ardferd, and Aghadoe met in St John's Church, Tralee, to-day, for the election of Bishop in room of the Right Rev Dr Orpen, resigned.

BELFAST DISTURBANCES. Killed and Wounded. Six persons were killed and twenty-one wounded in street fighting in Belfast on Tuesday. The shooting in the streets continued up to Curlew hour. Seven people were killed and 50 wounded yesterday.

Workers Attacked. Wild scenes were witnessed in Belfast yesterday morning, and for about two hours a mob of practically held possession of the district surrounding York-street and North Queen-street. As the workers were proceeding to the shipyards and other industrial establishments there was a fierce outbreak of revolver firing in this locality, and the mob proceeded to break into the houses.

IRISH HORSES EXPORTED TO SPAIN. Agents of the Spanish Government have been making an extensive purchase of the draught horses in Ireland. On Tuesday about 80 animals, purchased mainly at Mullingar fair, were sent from Dublin to Holyhead, to be shipped later to Folkestone for Madrid.

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary Schools in County Limerick. I.—NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS. Six of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarships where the pupils' parents or guardians are in a position to bear part of the expense of his or her education.

II.—CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the pupil comes must have adopted the Gaelic League Education Programme as modified by Dal Bricain, viz., (a) Irish to be the medium of instruction, (b) Irish to be taught for vernacular use, (c) Irish to be taught to all pupils for vernacular use, (d) All Examination Papers to be set in both English and Irish, each pupil examined to have permitted to answer in whichever of the two languages he may think fit. In examinations in a foreign language the use of that foreign language to be permitted in setting and answering questions. The pupil to be taught at the Secondary School with a view to Matriculation at the N.U.I.

III.—TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS. The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as tested by (a) the annual school examination, (b) the annual school examination at the end of the academic year, (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelic College, where the pupil will spend a session in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee, until certified as able to be taught through the medium of Irish. The courses for the Special History Examinations are:—At the end of First Year—Story of Ireland (History Bilingual) of Beata Naom Padraig—History of Ireland and Stair na hEireann Part I (Rogan o Ynais) at the end of Third Year—Laet Conquest and Sean A'Daimala, "Eire" (Donan Mac) at the end of Fourth Year—"The Irish War, by J.J. O'Connell, M.A., and Scaith ar Sean I. Gaelic. By Sean O'Connell, M.A.

IV.—RESIDENCE AND QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years. V.—OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £20 but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the Committee with a view to the parents' circumstances. Children of other than farmers or labourers may be awarded a Scholarship (full or reduced), at the Committee's discretion, according to the circumstances of the parents. VI.—AGE LIMIT. Pupils shall be eligible for Scholarships up to but not exceeding 16 years on the first of June. VII.—EXAMINATIONS. Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for examination, produce a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager of his school, together with a medical certificate as to fitness, and a recommendation from a Clergyman of his parish as to character. VIII.—AWARDS. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in order of merit, &c. IX.—EXAMINATION. Candidates for Scholarships shall be subjected to a competitive examination—oral and written to be held by Examiners appointed by the Committee. X.—GENERAL POWERS. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship without assigning a reason. The Committee also reserve the right to revise this Scheme or any part of it at any time, and to the sanction of the Limerick County Council.

XI.—SYLLABUS. The following is the list of subjects for examination (written and oral) as may be necessary:—IRISH, IRISH HISTORY, LATIN, FRENCH, ARITHMETIC, ALGEBRA, GEOGRAPHY, DOMESTIC SCIENCE, RUSSIAN SCIENCE, GEOMETRY, ENGLISH, IRISH HISTORY are essential. Other three subjects from the foregoing list. 100 marks will be assigned to each subject.
