IRISH PEACE QUESTION.

The letter of Mr. Lloyd George, on behalf of the Cabinet, in reply to Mr. De Valera's Note on the political situation, is a weighty and a fateful document. That it will receive the consideration which it claims may be taken as assumed, for all through the negotiations which have taken place with reference to Ireland's status, the people's desire for peace and its continuance have been distinctly in evidence.

This leads to an unmitigated brightening of the political prospect, and the raising of the people's hope that a will come well out of the years of trouble the country has suffered. Mr. Lloyd George's invitation to the proposed Conference, if couched in firm tones with respect to the basis on which it is to proceed, evinces an evident readiness to have a long-drawn dispute ended once and for all time, based on what the Cabinet deem fair and equitable terms from their point of view.

How Mr. De Valera and his colleagues may view the Government proposals has also to be taken into account. If the exchange of political views is to be a success on the question of adjusting National differences it must be remembered that the work has to be determined and accomplished not from our point of view. Mr. De Valera, in his letter to Mr. Lloyd George, left the door to peace ajar, left it to his Cabinet to decide if the question of adjustment regarding certain details might be reviewed, and the proposed further Conference is the result so far of the negotiations which have taken place, and been somewhat protracted. It is anticipated that there will be no difficulty in Mr. De Valera and Dail Eireann giving their assent. Public opinion will be, undoubtedly, in favour of such a course being followed, and every member of the community, everyone interested in the peace and prosperity of the country, will ardently wish that the deliberations over the Council Board may eventuate in peace and amity.

The magistrates adjourned at the City Petty Sessions yesterday evening.—Mr. H. Dickenson, R.M., and Mr. G. H. Mercer, R.M.

UNREST IN INDIA.

The India Office states that the Nawab of Bahawalpur, a Mohammedan State in the Bombay Presidency, has informed the Bombay Government that a riot broke out in Bahawalpur City on the night of August 30th. The rioting was due to the arrest of a Hindu (Hindu) magistrate was attacked by a mob numbering 2,000. Stones were thrown, and the building was injured, but is now doing well. The riot was due to violent speeches made during the holidays of the Nawab's Government.

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At the meeting of the Whole House Committee of the Corporation on Thursday night, the question of the proposed abolition of the city night constables, under the Council's scheme of retrenchment of expenditure, was discussed. It was stated that for a considerable time the constables had not been doing duty, and that the retention of their services was costing the ratepayers, in round figures, something over £3,000 a year.

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Sir Stanley Harefoot presided at a meeting of the Board of National Education in Dublin on Tuesday, at which the warrant of the Lord Lieutenant appointing Professor Gwynn as a Commissioner of National Education was read. A letter was read from the Treasury refusing, in view of the present financial position, to accede to the Commission's application for special additional grants to subsidize the schools where the attendance has been injudiciously affected by riots and civil commotion.

IRISH PEACE.

Premier's Invitation.

Hopeful Feeling in Dublin.

Our Dublin correspondent wires:—No decision as to the acceptance or rejection of the Prime Minister's invitation to a Conference at Inverness will be reached by Dail Eireann before next Wednesday. On that date a private session will be held, at which Mr. Lloyd George's letter will be considered, and at which the fateful decision to refuse the offer or accept plenipotentiaries must be taken.

UNREST IN INDIA.

In a review of the Moplah outbreak, the General Staff reports that all information points to a steady improvement in the situation, which is well in hand.

SUBMARINE BLOWS UP.

Three Kill—Three Injured. The Press Association's Liverpool correspondent says:—The ex-German submarine "Deutschland" blew up while being dismantled at Birkhead today. Three were killed and three injured.

ASIA MINOR CAMPAIGN.

The General Staff is convinced that the Asia minor campaign will be happily terminated shortly.

MASSACRE OF CHRISTIANS.

It is stated the Christian population in the Prats region are being exterminated by Osman Agha's orders. Scores of villages have been destroyed, and hundreds of Christians massacred. Many victims were strangled.

NOTABLE ENGLISHMAN DEAD.

The Right Hon. Lewis Fry died today at Clifton, Bristol. Born in 1832 he entered the legal profession. Deceased had sat in Parliament for Bristol.

IRISH PEACE.

It was officially announced that the Dail Cabinet met in Dublin yesterday, and that a private session of the Dail is being summoned for Wednesday next. The Press Association's special correspondent says that, although it would appear that the decision will be left to the Dail, the belief is held in Dublin in some quarters that Mr. De Valera and his Cabinet colleagues made up their minds yesterday, and that the reply may be sent to the Premier before Wednesday. The correspondent says that Dublin firmly believes the invitation will be accepted.

LIMERICK AUTUMN RACES.

The Limerick Autumn Races will be held over the Curragh course on the 5th and 6th inst., when good sport is expected to be seen as many as 275 entries have been received for the 12 events on the card, all the principal racing stables in the country being represented.

IRISH RAILWAYS' PECULIAR POSITION.

A peculiar situation, says the "Railway Gazette," has arisen in connection with the oversight by the Government of the Irish railways. Sub-Section (2) of Section 10 of the Government of Ireland Act provided that:— "The railway, with the uniform administration throughout Ireland of public services in connection with railways, and powers exercisable by any department of the Government of the United Kingdom at the appointed date with respect to railways shall, as from the appointed date, become powers of the Council of Ireland."

ASIA MINOR WAR.

Greek Advance Stopped. Reuter's agency relates the Greek attack in the region of the river Sakaria has apparently been brought to a standstill. There has been severe fighting within the last few days and every sign of a Greek withdrawal but no definite details are available. The Greek army now holds a position approximately 40 miles southwards of Angora.

CURRAGH INTERNEES.

The Press Association Dublin correspondent wires:—It was reported in Dublin this afternoon that a large number of prisoners detained in one of the internment camps at Curragh escaped last night. One report estimates the number between 40 and 50. No information regarding the reported escapes was forthcoming at military headquarters.

EUSALINE.

Rendered homeless through the ravages of war, the Irish Banditti of the name of Ypres have found a permanent home in the fastnesses of Connaught.
