The Press Association telegrams says— The resumed Conference on the Irish Peace was held at Downing-street at 11 o'clock to-day. Prior to the delegates of the British Government and the Irish representatives met for preliminary conferences.

The Irish Peace Conference did not resemble in London yesterday, but there was a meeting in the afternoon of an Apical Committee which was appointed at the conference.

At a meeting in Maynooth College on Tuesday, the Catholic Hierarchy expressed the earnest hope that the Peace Conference would result in a satisfactory settlement.

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The monthly meeting of the Committee of Management of Limerick District Asylum was held yesterday. Mr. B. Sadler, Chairman, Limerick County Council, presided.

The ideal weather we have been favoured with this season has enabled harvesting operations to be completed much earlier than last year.

The Conference adjourned till 1.30 p.m. The British delegates left 10 Downing-street before the Irish delegates, who were stayed for some minutes.

The Press Association states that the Conference will be resumed at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning.
