HINTS FOR THE HOME.

BY A PRACTICAL HOUSEWIFE.

SIMPLE LARYNGITIS TREATMENT. The home treatment of slight laryngitis is simple and the following hints, writes a correspondent, may be useful to fellow-sufferers:

- (1) It is possible to keep in a warm room and avoid draughts. (2) Don't, even if you can, try and talk above a whisper. (3) Inhale three times a day, if you have not a proper inhaler—which is not necessary—hot steam from a bowl of water.

AMMONIA AS A DISINFECTANT. According to experiments made by a physician at Judo-Pesth, ammonia fumes destroy the cholera and typhoid fever bacilli in two hours, whilst those of anthrax and diptheria are rendered inactive in half an hour.

EMERGENCY WEIGHTS AND SCALES. How often have you to guess weights because you have no scales? Hanging up this list on the inside of your cupboard door, will perhaps save you many a disappointment in future:

- A pound of flour is one quart. A pound of granulated sugar, one pint. An ounce is five ordinary liquid ounces.

A CURE FOR EARACHE. In earache, drop one drop of liniment of acetic acid, diluted with cotton wool and insert in the affected ear. When the pain is gone remove the medicated cotton wool and replace it with a piece of warm unmedicated cotton wool.

A TERROR TO MOTHERS. Croup is a terror to many mothers. It attacks only young children and always comes with great suddenness—a child goes to bed apparently quite well, or with only a slight cold, and wakes choking in an hour or two.

A JELLY HINT. Many and many a young and inexperienced housewife has had the experience of pouring a jelly that will not set. When this happens next time add the juice of a lemon, or a little white vinegar, if you have it. It will do equally well. Also remember to rinse the mould first in hot water and then in cold water, and pour the jelly in without drying the mould.

BAKED RHUBARB. Rhubarb should never be stewed unless a double quantity is used. The best way of cooking the root, both for serving in its most simple form and for the preparation of more elaborate dishes, is to cut it into small lengths and lay them in a casserole or any other earthenware jar that can be closely closed, with grated lemon rind and sugar.

MACARONI A L'ITALIENNE. Four ounces macaroni, half pint tomato purée, three-quarters of an ounce of flour, one and a-half ounce of grated cheese, salt, cayenne. Make the tomato purée by rubbing through a sieve.

CURRY OF MUTTON EN CASSEROLE. Melt one ounce of butter, and stir into it one minced onion and one minced apple, fry thoroughly without browning. Add one dessertspoonful of curry-powder, and fry again for a few minutes.

SCIENCE NOTES & NEWS.

NEW LIGHT ON SOLAR VARIATION. The Director of the Astrophysical Observatory of the Smithsonian Institution reports that an almost exact correlation has been found between the fluctuations of solar radiation, as observed at the Smithsonian station at Calama, Chile, and variations of the brightness of Saturn, as observed by Dr. Gutnick from January to May, 1920, at the Berlin-Babelsberg Observatory, with the photometric photometer. One per cent. increase in solar radiation was found to accompany 1 per cent. increase of Saturn's brightness.

A SUBSTITUTE FOR CORE. A chemical works at Ermenk-Konrad had been carrying on experiments with a view to finding a substitute for cork, says a Prague correspondent in the "Times Trade Supplement" and these led to the following results. Turf treated by a special patented process furnishes a material for insulating and building purposes that is said to be, in most respects, not inferior, and in some superior, to cork. The product is reported to be equally light, firm, and sound-proof, to possess great insulating properties, and to be damp-proof.

THE WHITE RACES IN THE TROPICS. The Melbourne "Living Age" says: At the Australian Medical Congress, held at Brisbane, a sub-committee reported on the effect of a tropical climate upon the white race. Its conclusion was that with proper care white settlers may thrive in hot climates better than is generally believed. It is not under present conditions, their health is impaired, and a disease, malaria, which in the tropics causes 25 per cent. of the mortality; but climate is not the sole reason for this. Nervous diseases are partly due to changed conditions of life, and partly to increased frequency where white and coloured races are in contact, whether in the tropic or the temperate zone, is ascribed to the fact that under such conditions the whites—especially white labour—do not perform the usual amount of physical labour or take in its place sufficient physical exercises.

WHAT WEATHER DOES TO CLOTH. Silk resists weather conditions better than linen. Heat, light, and moisture weaken cloth of any kind, making it easier to tear and changing its appearance. This action, which was investigated experimentally in France by Leo Vignon, probably accounts for a large percentage of the wear of clothes by ordinary clothing. To quote an account of his experiments from the "Complex Textiles": "The cloth investigated was of silk and of linen, in strips of width of two inches, and of length of one yard. The strips were exposed for two months, in June and July, to various influences. The strips to be tested for the effect of sunlight were exposed to vertical rays behind a pane of glass, in a dry place, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. for ten consecutive days. The strips to be tested for the effect of heat were first heated in a bath of water for twenty minutes, and then only placed in a dark place, in a chamber of constant temperature. The strips to be tested for the effect of moisture were exposed to a saturated vapour of water, in which mercury vapour illuminated under the influence of a continuous electric current. The strips produced varied considerably, consisting in general in a weakening of the texture shown by the lowering of the resistance to tearing and in a change of colour. The latter consisted in the fading or bleaching of the cloth or the appearance of spots of mould, green, white, or black. The reader will possibly be surprised to learn that the silk, that is, the textile of animal origin, proved to be superior in resistance to the linen, which is of vegetable origin, not only with respect to the variation of its texture, but to the change of colour. This is explained by the fact that the albumenoid molecules, which compose the fibres of animal origin, resist hydrolysis (decomposition by moisture) better than the cellulose molecules of plant origin."
