







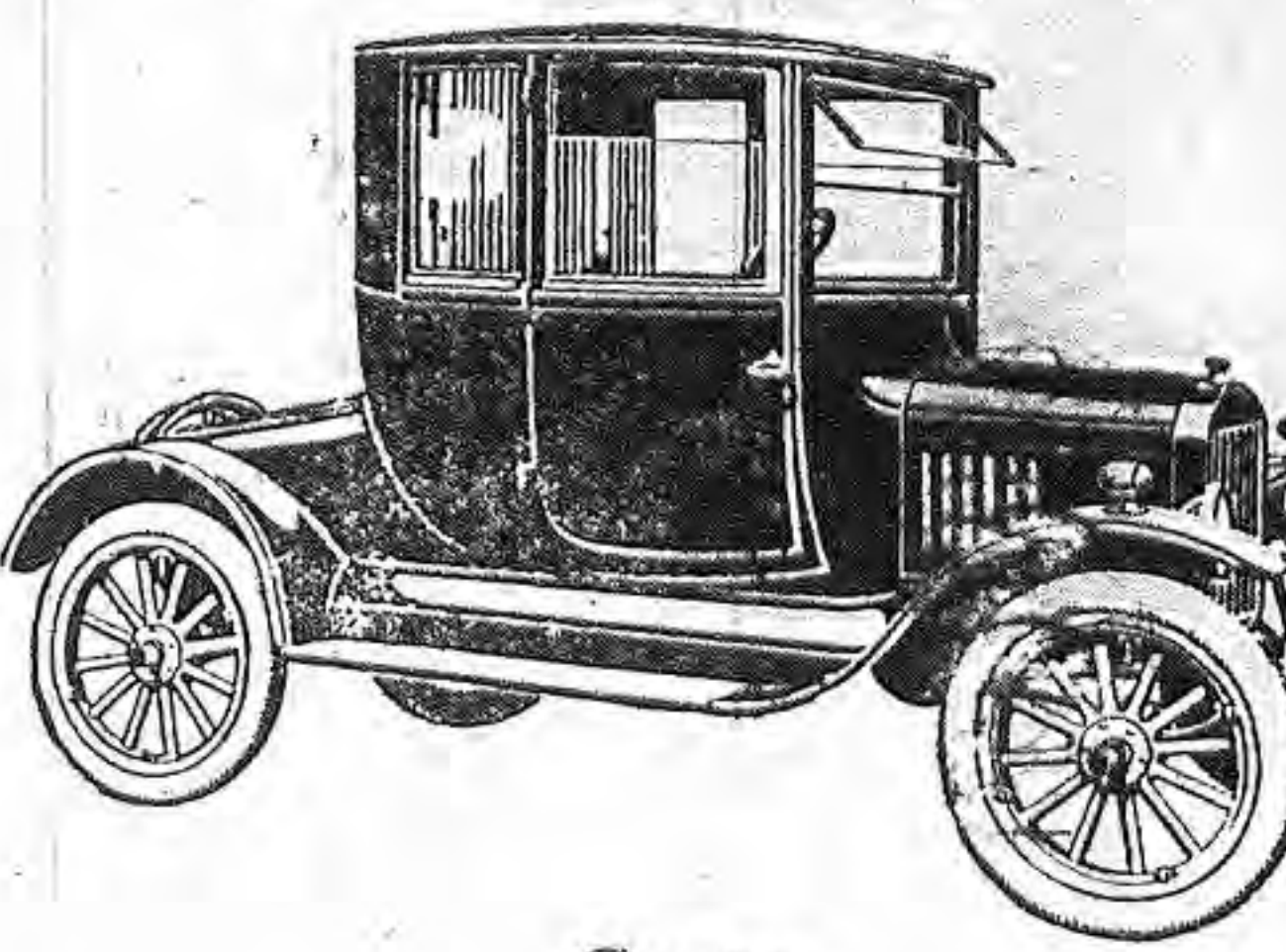

WHOLESALE PRICES OF IRISH PRODUCE.

The following is the Department's return of the average wholesale prices of agricultural produce at certain Irish markets during the week ended 12th November, 1921, as compared with the previous week. The prices are in the average wholesale prices paid in the markets mentioned for the particular quality of produce sold there.

Ben Eggs—Prices for eggs remain firm with an advancing tendency. A slight drop from 47s 11d to 47s 10d was noted in Belfast, and in Dublin, from 47s 10d to 47s 9d.

Duck Eggs—Belfast was the lowest market for duck eggs, though prices were 10s 11d to 11s 4d in Belfast, and 11s 4d to 11s 6d in Dublin.

Poultry—Chickens—The previous week's values of 11s 6d, 8s, and 5s 11d per pair at Dublin, Ennis, and Cork respectively.

DEBT TO AMERICA, Ten Thousand Million Dollars.

Interesting figures have just been compiled by the Guaranty Trust Company of New York concerning the indebtedness to the United States Government.

Commenting on the situation, the "Guaranty Survey" points out that after two centuries of foreign investment the British acquired a balance due to them in 1914 from all parts of the world of about £4,000,000,000.

Though Great Britain required many years to reach her pre-war credit position through private investment abroad, the United States in the last six years has built up a foreign credit of all sorts in excess of 15,000,000,000 dollars.

Of this approximately 3,000,000,000 dollars is in the hands of private investors in the form of various classes of securities, while the more than 10,000,000,000 is owed to the Government by other Governments.

In approximate figures, at the parity of exchange, the principal United States Government debts estimated as follows—Germany's reparations liabilities are about 32,000,000,000 dollars; France owes 2,700,000,000 dollars on principal account to Great Britain and 3,350,000,000 dollars to the United States.

The indebtedness of other Governments to the Government of the United States is shown in the accompanying table, to which should be added approximately 1,000,000,000 dollars of unpaid interest.

MR HUGH BARRIE AND IRISH SITUATION. In a letter to the Chief Secretary, Mr. Hugh M.P., Vice-President of the Irish Department of Agriculture, says:—"I have remained entirely sceptical as to the response which has been forthcoming about with regard to the Government and Ulster. I considered them utterly unshakable. As a duty bound I desire to do nothing precipitate. It must, however, be obvious to you and the Prime Minister that if Ulster's position, as established by last year's Act, should in any degree be weakened by these proposals, I can no longer remain a member of the Government."

General Childs is believed to have accepted the appointment. An official announcement will be made through the Home Office later in the month.

WAGES IN SUGAR CONFECTIONERY AND FOOD PRESERVING TRADE. The Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving Trade Board (Ireland) met in Dublin on the 17th inst., and decided to issue a Notice of Proposal to the existing minimum rates by reducing the 1d per hour and the 1s per hour for adult male and female workers respectively; the proposed reduction in the case of juvenile workers of both sexes ranging from 1d to 3d per hour.
