THE MAIL SERVICES.

The need for an acceleration of the mail services to and from the South of Ireland has long been demonstrated by the Limerick and other Chambers of Commerce, which have been persistently urging the matter of the Post Office-General, but without any appreciable result so far.

DEATH OF POPULAR LIMERICK JOURNALIST.

Mr W. Reeves Passes Away.

It is with feelings of deep and sincere regret we announce the death of Mr William Reeves, B.A., 7 Omeigan Terrace, which took place at 7 o'clock early in the morning in Richmond Hospital, Dublin, after an illness of short duration.

Limerick Colleagues Regret.

At a special meeting of journalists held in Limerick to-day, the following resolution was unanimously adopted: "That we desire to place on record our sincere and heartfelt regret at the death of Mr William Reeves, a well-known colleague, a brilliant journalist, and a steadfast friend."

Mr Thomas Cahill, Munster and Leitner Bank, has been appointed to the vacant position of branch at Droichead.

KIDNAPED WATERFORD DOCTOR RETURNS TO DUTY.

Waterford, Monday. It is stated that Dr. J. J. Hogan, resident surgeon, Waterford County and City Infirmary, who was a witness in a case at the Waterford Petty Sessions on Friday and did not appear, was kidnapped on a motor-car on the morning on which the case was to be heard.

COUNTY LIMERICK DISPUTE.

Strikes Settled. Kilmallock, Monday. The four members of the I.T.W.U. arrested during the week by the I.R.A. in connection with the Bulgardie strike were released yesterday.

SEVENTEEN ON HUNGER-STRIKE IN WATERFORD.

Seventeen prisoners in Waterford Jail started a hunger-strike yesterday morning for one hour's extra recreation at night and the admission of parcels and letters under sentence. Hospital cases are exempt from the strike.

LIGHTER BUDGET FORECASTED.

Speaking at Brighton, St. Arthur Bowen, Minister of Agriculture, predicted a large reduction in the coming Budget. Cuts in taxation, he said, must be stopped in order that industry might be reduced.

BOMBAT RIOTS ENDED.

The latest news from Bombay received in London indicates that the situation is well in hand. Official telegrams continue to lay stress on the fact that the Prince resides remarkably untroubled in the city.

CITY BURGLARY.

The grocery and spirit establishment of Messrs W. Lloyd, O'Connell-street, were broken into during the week-end and a quantity of grocer's stock was removed.

Irish Peace Movement.

Suggested All-Round Table Conference.

London, Monday.—The Press Association understands that the Prime Minister will have an informal conference with the Sinn Féin delegates before meeting Sir James Craig, in order to ascertain their views regarding an all-round table conference between Government representatives, Sinn Féin delegates, and Ulster representatives.

"NEAR SETTLEMENT."

The "Daily Mail" states that a scheme has been considered, involving financial adjustment, which will be laid before the Ulster leaders. This new plan does not envisage an All-Ireland Parliament here and now, but it will ensure to Southern Ireland wider self-governing powers than she would receive under the Government of Ireland Act, and will provide for the ultimate establishment of an All-Ireland Parliament.

MR H. T. BARRIE

Resigns Vice-Presidency of Department.

The Right Hon. Hugh T. Barrie, Vice-President of the Irish Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction, addressed on Saturday the following letter to Mr Lloyd George: "10th November. My DEAR PRIME MINISTER.—I should have preferred that the Government proposals concerning Ulster, in which I have had a personal interest, should have been communicated to me at the same time as they were communicated to the members of the Cabinet of the Northern Ireland Parliament.

Militarism in Germany.

Yesterday's session of the Washington Conference was devoted to the consideration of the question of land armaments. At the outset Mr Hughes reported that gratifying progress had been made at last week's sittings.

A New Fleet Formed.

A new fleet of fishing enterprises has been started in Dublin, and the first boat of what is intended to be a local fleet has already set out to the city markets.

FIGHT FOR LOWER RAILWAY RATES.

Now that the Railway Rates Tribunal has been constituted, with Sir Francis Gore-Brown, K.C., as chairman, the Association of British Industries has prepared a long statement on the transport position running into something like 16,000 words. It reviews the whole railway situation, deals at length with the question of transport costs, and declares the Federation's intention of continuing to press for a substantial reduction of rates and a long and difficult task.

CARNEGIE FREE LIBRARY AND MUSEUM COMMITTEE.

ULSTER'S MEMORIAL AT THIEPVAL.

The memorial tower at Thiepval, to the memory of men of the Ulster Division who fell in the war, was dedicated on Saturday by Most Rev. Dr. D'Arcy, and the dedication tablet within the tower was unveiled by the Rev. Canon Marshall Pech, Chief of Staff of P.M. Sir H. Wilson.

USA. AND SUBMARINES.

A Washington message says—Mr. Brand has indicated that France will support the American programme of a large submarine force, and declared that the submarine was the arm of the future.

REPUBLICAN PROCESSION IN DUBLIN.

The anniversary of the deaths of three members of the Irish Republican Army, which took place last year in Dublin Castle, was marked by a Republican procession which marched on Saturday from Arrol's square, Dublin, to Glasnevin Cemetery and back. It numbered between ten and fifteen hundred.

KILRUSH CATTLE FAIR.

The Kilrush Cattle Fair, held on Wednesday, showed no improvement in the prices of cattle in any of the classes. The prices are now down to almost pre-war rates.

IRISH MAIL SERVICES.

Railway Conditions Blamed.

The Dublin Chamber of Commerce, which has been pressing the Post Office for an improved mail service between Dublin and the South and West of Ireland, has received a letter from the Secretary of the General Post Office, in a course of which he says: "The Chairman of the Board of the Great Northern Railway Company for the running of the trains between Dublin and Belfast. The services between Dublin and Cork and the South-West of Ireland have also been under consideration; but the position of the Great Southern and Western Railway Company in the matter has, in the past, been a serious one."

Release of Prisoners Demanded.

A special meeting of Cork Corporation was held last evening to consider the treatment of the Irish political prisoners and the shooting of Alderman Barry. Lord Mayor O'Callaghan presided.

CORK AND THE PEACE.

The Lord Mayor said there were two kinds of prisoners—political and non-political. The political prisoners had been treated with respect and consideration, and the shooting of Alderman Barry was a tragedy.

INTERNATIONAL POTATO CONFERENCE.

At the invitation of the International Potato Conference, Dr. G. H. Pethybridge and Mr. Paul A. Murphy, of the Plant Disease Division of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction, contributed papers on recent Irish investigations on Potato Blight and "New work on Mosaic in Ireland."

TO-DAY'S TELEGRAMS.

(SPECIAL TO THE CHRONICLE) Irish Peace Negotiations. Sir James Craig's illness. Premier to Consult with Sinn Féin Delegates.

DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE.

Integrity of China. Mr Balfour and Franco. Washington, Monday. The eight Powers have signed a declaration in favour of the integrity of China, and equal commercial opportunities for all.

BOMBAY RIOTS.

Two Parsee Temples Burned. Bombay, Monday. Two Parsee Temples were burned to-day by a mob. Others were attacked. The position is quieter to-night.

MOPLAH PRISONERS.

Large Number Apparently Suffocated. The India Office report that sixteen hundred convicted Moplah prisoners were entrained at Jirur for Ballygally, about eighty miles from Jirur. Fifty-six prisoners were found dead, apparently suffocated. The survivors are being medically treated, but eight more have since died. Investigation ordered.

FATE OF ARMENIAN PRISONERS.

Col Rawlinson's Harrowing Tale. Renter learns that the first account from Col Rawlinson, lately released by the Turks, reached London to-day. He declares that last night he placed in the hands of his captives five thousand soldiers and four thousand civilians, in labour gangs, in the neighbourhood of Erzurum, almost all perished from starvation and neglect. About eight hundred only survived for repatriation.

FURTHER DISTURBANCES IN BELFAST.

Man Killed. In the Belfast disorder to-day a man was killed and a woman wounded.

CORNISH MYSTERY.

Mr Black Detained in Liverpool Hotel. Edward Black, of Tregeonsey, near Manist, was detained in a Liverpool hotel last night. It is stated that he had previously attempted to eat his throat. He had been in Liverpool over the week-end. When the police forced an entrance to his room he was in the act of cutting his throat with a penknife. He received a serious gash, and was taken to hospital. He is expected to recover.

VETERAN SOCIALIST DEAD.

Mr H. M. Hyndman, the veteran Socialist, died to-day in London, aged 73. He had been ill for ten days with pneumonia, when heart failure supervened. He founded the Social Democratic Federation.

GOVERNMENT OF NORTHERN IRELAND.

The Government of Northern Ireland took over administration duties to-day.

SLAUGHTER OF IMPORTED CATTLE.

The English Council of Agriculture to-day urged the Government to continue the present system regarding the slaughter of imported cattle.

FAMOUS SINGER DEAD.

Stonkton, Tuesday.—The famous singer, Countess Casta Miranda, died this morning.

PRIVY COUNCIL MEETING.

Additional Bank Holiday. London, Monday. The King held a Privy Council to-day at which a proclamation declaring Tuesday, December 27th, a Bank Holiday and a public holiday through out England, Wales, and Ireland was signed. After the Council the Duke of Atholl was sworn as Lord Chamberlain, and was invested with his wand of office.

DENTISTRY AMONG THE ANCIENTS.

Dentistry is often supposed to be among the peculiar triumphs of our own civilisation, but the dentistry of antiquity was not one whit inferior to that of today. The oldest mention of it is in the Papyrus of Ebers, a Ptolemaic specimen of bridge-work found in a tomb near Sidon, in which the teeth are united by gold wire, two of the teeth having been transplanted. In the monuments of Carthage, a number of fine specimens of dental work of the sixth and seventh centuries B.C. They consist of bridge-work made by riveted bands of metal. One of them supported three artificial teeth, two of which were being made from a single set tooth grooved to imitate human teeth.

THE AGE OF TREES.

Inquiries as to the general age of trees have shown that the pine tree sometimes attains 500 years as a maximum length of life; 425 years is placed as the allotted span of the silver fir; the larch lives, as a rule, about 275 years, the red beech 245, the maple 210, the birch 200, the ash 170, the elder 145, the elm 130. The heart of the oak begins to rot at about the age of 300 years. Of the holy, it is stated that there is a specimen over 400 years old near Asselshofen, Germany. A cypress of the same kind is a gigantic Californian redwood tree felled shows that it began to grow in 850 A.D. It had reached a height of 800ft., and a circumference of 90ft. at the base.
