Not to do so would be to grieve the merciful God who has so graciously granted our prayer."

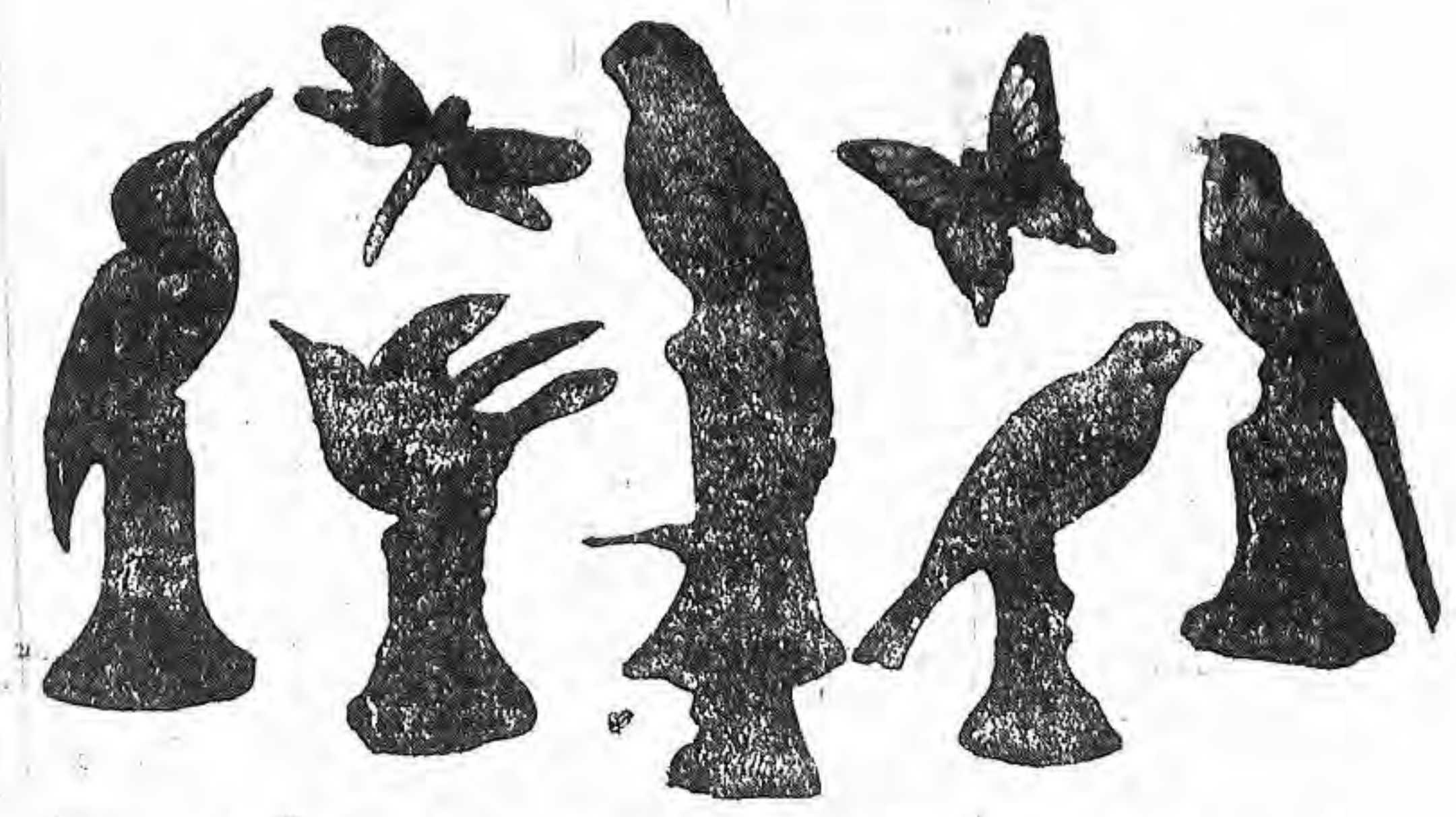
