SALARY INCREASES

TO MUNICIPAL OFFICIALS THE CIVIL SERVICE SCALE

Discussion at Corporation Meeting

The Mayor, Mr. M. O'Donnell, presided at the meeting of the Limerick Corporation held on Thursday night.

In accordance with notice of motion, Mr. Donnell moved that the resolution proposed for the increase of salaries to officials in accordance with the Civil Service Scale be referred to a sub-committee.

Mr. O'Flynn supported Mr. Donnell's motion. He (Mr. O'Flynn) always supported the clerical staff while he considered they were entitled to an increase.

Mr. O'Connell said the Corporation were in a very serious position. They had decided to pay their clerical staff as Civil Servants and pay them accordingly.

Aid O'Connell said they were bound by the Fair Wage resolution of the old Corporation. It was declared at the first meeting of the present Corporation that they would be fair to all their employees and that the clerical staff would be treated as Civil Servants.

Mr. O'Donnell said they were in too great a hurry to give increases. A poll was then taken when they voted: For the increase—Aldermen G. O'Connell, James O'Connell, Joseph M. Kearney, M. P. O'Leary, T. D. K. P. Walsh, P. Doyle, J. Donnell, M. O'Donnell, J. Bourke, T. Burke, M. Griffin, T. A. M'Intyre, M. O'Donnell, A. Shaw, J. Cronin, J. Quinlan, A. M. O'Mara, J. Kelly, D. Griffin—18.

Against—Messrs P. A. O'Brien, P. O'Flynn, and T. Donnellian—9.

The Mayor declared Mr. Donnellian's resolution lost.
