Bovine Tuberculosis (Ireland) Order of 1914.

NOTICE

AN Order of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, dated 15th December, 1919, brings into operation again, as from 1st January, 1920, under the above title, The Tuberculosis (Ireland) Order of 1914, which was suspended (save as regards one provision) from 1st August, 1915.

Under the Order every person having in his possession or under his charge

- (i) any cow which is or appears to be suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, lactated udder, or other chronic disease of the udder; or (ii) any bovine animal which is or appears to be suffering from emaciation due to tuberculosis; or (iii) any bovine animal which is suffering from a chronic cough and showing definite clinical signs of tuberculosis.

is required to notify the Veterinary Inspector for the district of the fact without delay, and to keep the animal isolated from other animals as far as practicable (Article 10) until the animal is slaughtered or the permission of the Local Authority for its removal is obtained. He is also required, if the animal be a cow, to take certain precautions with regard to milk and milk vessels (Article 9)—By order,

FARMING NOTES DESTRUCTION OF WARBLE FLIES

Storage of Wet Grains High Prices for Milk Recorded Cows

It has been estimated that the loss sustained annually in England and Wales, through damage done to hides by maggots of warble flies, might be put at £500,000 per annum.

The only certain remedy at present known is systematically and thoroughly to squeeze out the maggots before they emerge.

Although listlessness has been laid on the "squeezing out" process as the only certain remedy, it should be mentioned that in a letter issued recently by the Ministry of Agriculture it is stated that experiments carried out during two seasons as to the effect of various treatments which might be used instead of this troublesome process, one has given results so promising that it has been decided to try the following to see if it is possible to find a more effective remedy.

The dressing is a wash of which the principal ingredient is a tobacco powder. This powder is mixed in water for 24 hours, the liquid strained through a coarse muslin cloth, and applied to the backs of the cattle with a cloth or brush.

Storage of Wet Grains. Commenting on the comparative cheapness of wet grain for feeding purposes, the Editor of the "Limerick Leader" writes that the loss of grain from waste, the compiler of the monthly notes on feedings prepared by the Ministry of Agriculture states that the practice of storing grain can be carried out with advantage when the price of this purpose is available.

Mr. Keogh thought the Board should protest against the increase, but he considered there were several complaints of the defective services.

LIMERICK ASYLUM BOARD

The Mayor, Mr. M. O'Malley, presided at the meeting of the Limerick Asylum Board on Monday, and the other members present were: Alderman P. Doyle, Messrs P. K. Walsh, M. Heenan, B. O. and D. Naughton, G. O.

Dr. P. J. Irwin, R.M.S.; Dr. D. Kelly, Assistant D.O.; and Mr. W. O'Shaughnessy, Clerk, were the official guests.

Dr. Irwin reported that the health of the patients and the state of the asylum was satisfactory. Since last meeting nine patients had been admitted, eight died, and there were four for discharge.

The Mayor said that he was carrying out the instructions of the Council in regard to the reduction of the number of patients by 48 by sending them to the various unions, as he was instructed by the committee.

KILMALLOCK UNION

THE ESTIMATE. (FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.) A meeting of the Kilmallock Guardians was held on Saturday to consider the estimate for the ensuing year.

The Clerk submitted the estimate for the financial year ending 31st March, 1921, which amounts to £29,180, as against £28,800 for the year ending 31st March, 1920.

Maintenance and clothing—The expenditure under this heading has shown an upward tendency owing to the introduction of a new diet scale during the year which was necessary to improve the fare introduced during the year.

Medical Charities—This expenditure continues to remain steady, but I have included a sum of £200 to meet repairs and painting of the different dispensaries during the year which will be essential to prevent depreciation of your property.

Superannuation—An increase of £200 is recorded owing to retirement of two officials during the year, and a vote of £160 to an officer whose office has been abolished.

Outdoor Relief—This item continues to increase owing to a better rate of payment of the inadequate amounts previously allowed to some of the recipients.

KILMALLOCK DISTRICT COUNCIL

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.) Mr. Albert Burke presided. Also present—Messrs J. McGrath, J. J. Condon, James Fitzgerald, B. Ryan, D. Ryan, and B. Ryan.

The Clerk's statement on the estimate was as follows:—I have to record a slightly increase in the District Council for the provision of pumps and the erection of a water tower in the name of Mr. Sean Walsh, the appointment of a temporary assistant clerk at £4 10s a week is provided.

CANADIAN CATTLE

The Embargo Question Arguments Against Removal

A vigorous protest against the movement now on foot in England for the removal of the embargo on Canadian cattle was made at the meeting of the South of Ireland Cattle Traders Association, and a strongly worded resolution expressing the Association's objection to the admission of Canadian cattle was passed, and the Secretary was directed to forward it to the Ministry of Agriculture.

The matter was raised by Mr. Jeremiah Collins, who spoke of the activities of English butchers in connection with the movement for the opening of the ports, and said, with a laugh, that the movement if successful would benefit themselves only. He had seen Canadian cattle in England, and he had himself bought Canadian beef, which he found to be inferior to cattle. Let the embargo be left, he said, and let the cattle be sent to England, and then there will be no objection.

Mr. John Murphy seconded the resolution, and the Chairman (Mr. Wm. Murphy), in declaring it passed, said they had a general feeling of indignation in England with the opening of the ports. "Their hands are full at the moment," he added, "and the people of Ireland need not be in any way alarmed about the removal of the embargo."

Mr. Collins advised to the subject, and said the necessary detention of Irish cattle at the ports, and the consequent deterioration together with the cost of freight, gave an impetus to the movement in favour of admitting Canadian cattle because of the increased cost of Irish beef owing to the additional expenses thus incurred.

A report by a deputation which waited on Mr. Collins, General Manager of the Steam Packet Co. on the matter of freight, was submitted to the meeting, and satisfaction was expressed as the result.

On the motion of Mr. J. Murphy, seconded by Mr. Collins, the annual annual subscription was voted to the Cork I.D.A. and on the motion of Mr. Murphy, seconded by Mr. Collins, Mr. Thomas Quinn, Chairman, was admitted a member of the Association.

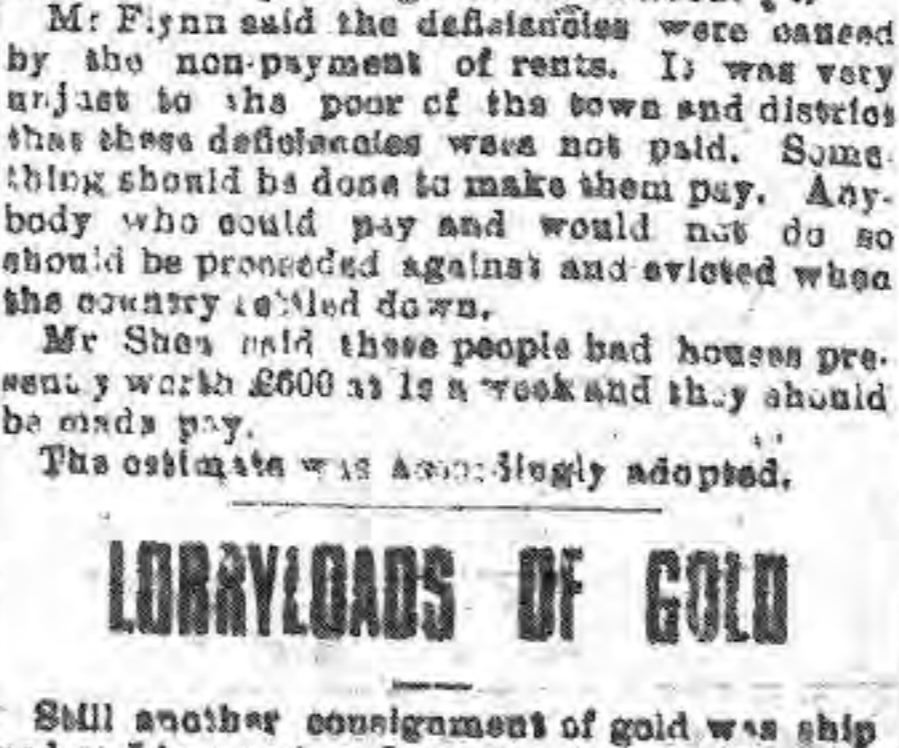
