Bovine Tuberculosis (Ireland) Order of 1914.

NOTICE

An Order of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, dated 18th December, 1919, brings into operation again, as from 1st January, 1920, under the above title, The Tuberculosis (Ireland) Order of 1914, which was suspended (save as regards one provision) from 11th August, 1915. Under the Order every person having in his possession or under his charge

(i) any cow which is or appears to be suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, disease of the teat, or other abnormality; or

(ii) any bovine animal which is or appears to be suffering from consumption due to tuberculosis; or

(iii) any bovine animal which is suffering from chronic cough and showing definite clinical signs of tuberculosis is required to notify the Veterinary Inspector for the district of the Veterinary Department, and to keep the animal isolated from other animals as far as practicable until the animal is slaughtered, or the necropsy is obtained. He is also required, if the animal be a cow, to take certain precautions with regard to milk and milk vessels (Article 9).—By order,

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LIMERICK'S PART IN ECONOMIC BOYCOTT OF CARSONIA

£4,800 Worth of Goods Sent Back Last Week. Limerick is taking an active and important part in the economic boycott of Carsonia. An interesting article in reference to this question will be found on page four of this issue. It may be mentioned as an evidence of the vigilance of the local committees in connection with the embargo that last week alone goods worth the value of £4,800 were actually sent back to the senders. This is altogether outside of cancelled orders, which were many and important. It may be mentioned that one Limerick firm has taken nothing from the latter since last June. The embargo in Limerick, it is said, is to be even more strict, if anything, from this forward. The embargo is further made that through the South and West of Ireland the economic boycott is being applied to the whole of the area comprised in the partitioned portion of the North—that is, the Parliamentary Counties of Antrim, Armagh, Down, Fermanagh, Londonderry and Tyrone and the Parliamentary Boroughs of Belfast and Londonderry.

B., were also present. The Rev. Father O'Connell, Adm. read the Lenten Pastoral issued by his Lordship the Bishop. The Mayor and those accompanying him were received by his Lordship after High Mass.

30-TON AIR CRAFTS

An Aeronautical Correspondent writes to "The Times":—A recent contribution of the American Naval Department to the problem of "big ships or—" is not only very practical, but also most significant. News is now to hand in respect of the design of two large aircraft, or ocean-going triplanes, which the Naval Department have put in hand to the design of Messrs. Gallaudet and Richardson. These flying boats will be fitted with no fewer than nine engines, giving a total horsepower of 2,800. The span of the wings will be 140 feet, and the machines will have a total lifting surface of 6,000 square feet. The total weight of each triplane will be 30 tons, and 15 tons of this will comprise crew, fuel, and other indispensable loads. The machines will carry so much fuel that they will be able to remain in the air for about 24 hours, and will be able to fly 2,100 miles.

BURNING OF AEROPLANE

ANXIETY AT KILMALLOCK AND KILFINANE. Local Traders Warned. There was much anxiety in the districts of Kilmallock and Kilfinane during the week and a half of the burning of aeroplanes at some distance outside the latter town on Thursday evening. On Friday it was officially intimated to the traders of Kilmallock and Kilfinane that if the burning of aeroplanes was to be held in the districts of Kilmallock and Kilfinane, the aeroplanes should be dropped warning the people to give information as to the whereabouts of the missing officer. Clancy's farmhouse at Ballinavreena was bombed and destroyed on Friday evening by military.

LORD MAYOR OF CORK

A New York message, dated Friday night, says:—Despite the Secretary of Labour's order to Mr. O'Connell to leave the United States by midnight, he was at Buffalo this evening, and expressed his intention of coming here today to consult his lawyers.

OFFICIAL REPRISALS

IN COUNTY TIPPERARY. Official reprisals, ordered by Col. Cameron, Commanding 18th Infantry Brigade and Military Governor, were carried out in the Glengalloo district, Co. Tipperary, on Saturday last. Some five houses were destroyed, including valuable furniture, and the damage is estimated at £200. The military governor has given a reprieve for the nabobs at New Birrington, Co. Tipperary, when two members of the Orange forces were killed. An ex-soldier and his widowed mother resided in one of the houses.

DOCTORS' SALARIES

The Limerick Board of Guardians decided to reduce the salaries of dispensary medical officers by £50 per annum. It was also decided to reduce the salary of Dr. J. T. Dillon, dispensary medical officer and medical officer to the workhouse, from £200 to £180, and that he should do his own compounding.

BOMB THROWN INTO BILLIARD ROOM

Bombs were thrown into the billiard room of the Town Hall, Macroom, occupied by police, last night. One bomb exploded and two others were wounded.

LAVERY PAINTING OF ARCHBISHOP MANNIX

Mr. John Lavery says the London correspondent of the "Independent" is circulating a portrait of Archbishop Mannix, and it is suggested that it may be shown at the Royal Academy Exhibition. The eminent Irish artist has painted the pictures of several of his fellow-countrymen in recent times, including Mr. J. Edmond, Sir Edward Carson and Cardinal Logue.

The will of the late Canon Magner, Duamway, contains bequest of £1,000 to found a Bursar in the new Ulster College, £200 to the Rev. Mother, Duamway Convent, £100 to Good Shepherd Convent, Cork, and various other donations to the sick poor and charitable societies and homes.

Bright Future in Store Says the Bishop of Limerick

EXCESSIVE AND OUTRAGES CONDEMNED. His Lordship's Lenten Pastoral. Towards the end of his Lenten Pastoral, read in all the churches of the diocese yesterday, Most Rev. Dr. Hallinan, Bishop of Limerick, condemned excesses and outrages in Ireland and remarked that there is a bright future in store for this faithful country. The Pastoral deals in a very impressive and powerful manner with devotion to St. Joseph and went on to say:— "And now my dear brethren, before I conclude, I must earnestly exhort you to pray to St. Joseph for our own sorely tried and afflicted country. No need to dwell on the sorrows and tragedies by which we are surrounded. The pages of the daily papers are full of them. They are the result of a state of things which is the principle of self-determination, the right to choose its own form of government, a principle for which it was loudly proclaimed, the last war was fought. That principle has now been ignored and repudiated, so far as this country is concerned, by the power which is its loudest champion in the time of need. It seeks on the contrary to govern the country by brute force. It is a futile, hopeless task. A foreign nation can never succeed in governing another against the will of a preponderating majority of the people. In the course of the conflict between the two nations, we have deeply to deplore and condemn excesses and outrages on the one side by individuals, which are grave violations of God's law. Such are the usual accompaniments to great national uprisings and a state of irregular warfare such as we are passing through now. On the other side we are the horrified spectators of deeds of repression and reprisals which are revolting in their nature, a disgrace to the nation in whose name they are being perpetrated, and are reprehensible with disgust and indignation by all civilized peoples. We do not pretend that either as individuals or as a nation we are guiltless in the sight of God. Let us then both individually and collectively humble ourselves under the hand of the Lord, and accept the present scourge in a spirit of patience, becoming this holy season in amendment for our sins, crying out at the same time for the words of the prophet, 'Spare O Lord, spare Thy people.' Let us cry out not only with deep humility, but with firm hope. Whatever our national shortcomings may be, we have the cheering consolation that as a nation we have remained faithful to God and His Holy Church during centuries of the most direct persecution. Surely God is not going to allow this little Celtic land to perish in the hands of a people to be exterminated. No, my dear people, there is a bright future in store for this faithful suffering country. Under the sunshine of His freedom which is surely coming, Ireland will take her place in the very van of Christian civilization as the champion of right, justice, and liberty. Whatsoever be the advent of that day, I wish you to pray fervently to Saint Joseph, together with our dear Mother Mary at the throne of Jesus on behalf of our beloved country. For this purpose I will ask you to begin a Novena on the 10th of March in preparation for the Feast of Saint Joseph. The exercises of the Novena are to be as follows:— a) Wherever Lenten devotions are held, the Litany of Saint Joseph, or seven Our Prayers, Hall Marys, and Gyrys, are to be said in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed for Benediction. b) Where Lenten devotions are not held, or people cannot attend them, then let the above prayers be said as the family devotion at night. c) A day which that consecrated be held in all parishes on the 18th of March to give the people an opportunity of going to Holy Communion on the 18th of March or the following day. May the blessing and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all.

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Limerick Railway Workers Industrial Court's Award

The Industrial Court on Thursday issued its award affecting the employees in the Limerick workshops of the Great Southern and Western Railway. The National Union of Railwaymen made an application for an increase in wages on the issue of fuel, fitter, fitter, and assistants' wages employed in the shops of the company at Limerick. It is said that a 10-hour day, instead of the 11 hours at present in operation, will be one of the proposals. REDUCED ESTIMATE

Limerick No. 1 District Council is in the happy position of having a reduced estimate for the coming year. The new estimate amounts to £7,013 as compared with £8,004 for 1920—a reduction of £991, or 12 1/2 per cent.

GERMANY SCORES

A few days ago Germany secured in Spain a contract to supply 110 locomotives and lodged 20,000,000 marks over the sum in the publically account. Germany's price for 1,000 locomotives is £150,000,000 each, the English estimate being £25,000.

DISCOURAGING TRAMPS
