County Council of Limerick Bovine Tuberculosis (Ireland) Order of 1924, N Order of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, dated 18th December, 1919, brings into opera-tion again, as from 1st January, 1926, under the above time. The Tuberculosis (Ireland) Order of 1914, which was suspended (save as regards one provision) from 81st August, 1915.

Under the Order every person having in his possession or under his charge

(I) say cow which is or appears to be saffering from suberculosis of the udder, indurated adder, or other shronic disease of the adder; or (II) any bovine animal which is or appears to be suffering from emastation due to

(III) any bovine animal which is suffering from a chronic cough and showing definite clinical signs of tuberoulosis is required to notify the Veterinary Inspector for the district of the fact without delay, and to keep the animal isolated rom other animals so far as practicable (Article 10) until the animal is slaughtered, or the permission of the Local Authority for its removal is obtained. He is also required, if the talmal be a cow, to take certain precautions with regard to milk and milk vespels (Article





# LIMERICK TECHNICAL INSTITUTE

ECHO IN THE KINGS BENCH

Application to Quash Sealed

In the King's Bench Division, before Mr. Justice Gibson, Mr Justice Gordon, and Mr Jasties Samaels, a case came on for hearing in which the Corporation of Limerick Technical Instruction Committee seek to quash three several sealed orders made by the Local Government Board, determining that James Comercon and Mary Halpin were suittled to receive a panelon or allowance, and that Parrick White was ensitled to a gratuity from the iceal suthority on their testrement from the services of the Technical Instruction Com misse.

Mr Overand, K C, and Mr Smylin appeared for she persone named ; Mr Bablagton, K O Mr Wood, K.O; and Mr Litpsets (Instructed by Mr McOredy) appeared for the L G B; Mr & L Brown, K C, wish whom were were Mr Healy K O, and Mr Patrick Kelly (instructed by M

John Dandon) appeared for the Corporation. Mr Brown, in opening she case, said that the orders now sought to be quashed were made by the Local Government Board in excess of jarlediction, as the officers in question did not come within the provisions of Section 8 of the Provincial Act, 1919. That section provided that if an officer of the local authoricy resigns after having 10 years service, he shall be entitled to receive from the local authority an allowance not sycholing swo-thirds of his salary and emplaments. The question in this case was : Was the officer at the sime he resigned in office at al! ? If he was not in office he was not capable of resigning. Mr Comerson was secretary and principal of the Technical School; Mr Waite was a teacher, and Mary Haipin was a charwoman, M Comerton, with the saccion of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Insuraction, resigned on the 23rd November after ten years' service. His ealery and emplaments amounted to £467, and the Local Governmant Board, under so order made in January, 1920, sested that he was envisied to a pension of £311 per annum. The orders were all in one same form, except that Mr Walte, was given a gratuity instead of a pension, because he had not been sen years in the service. The question was whether Comerton and White as the date of their resignations were in the service of the Committee. The work of the Commisses went on accessfully from 1908 to 1918, and Limerick was in the position of having the flosss Technical School both as regards sesoning and premises, in Ireland. In 1918 the Committee included in shelr scheme the name of Mr De Lacy as headmaster of the School of Commerce. Lacy was implicated in the rebellion of 19:6 and she Department of Agriculture and Test nical Instruction declined to approve - De Lacey unless he gave an undertaking, which he was unwilling to give. The result was that the grant from the Department of between £3 000 and £4 000 a year was stopped, and she Commisses were unable so carry on. In this state of affaire the Commissee, on legal advice, arranged with the members of the School staff to accept shorter notice of the termination of their employment than they would be entitled to, with the undersanding that if the Department released shair salaries would be paid and everything would go all right. As ordingly at a special meeting of the Sub Committee of the Technical Instruction Committee on the 5th November, 1918, the staff, with the exsepsion of Comercon, agreed to accept a month's

# MINTS FOR THE HOME.

BY A PRACTICAL HOUSEWIFE.

MASTICATION OF BREAD.

The importance of mastication, so much and so rightly insisted upon by many recent contributors to the subject of dist, is very marked in the case of bread, says Dr. C. W. Saleeby. Digestion begins in the mouth, and the teeth are of great value in making bread practically useful. It is a mistake to eat new from the teeth. It is so moist that it cam scarcely be chewed, and cannot suck up the digestive juices of the saliva. It is largely because toast and biscuits and stale bread and crusts are dry that they are so useful. In the first place, the teeth can work upon them, and in the second place, they scak up the saliva. Biscuits are much more digestible than ordinary bread in the stomach, and stale bread is much more digestible than new bread.
On the whole, and as compared with other
regetable foods, white bread is extremely
well-absorbed—best of all when it is taken with other kinds of food.

THE FAIRY - RING CHAMPIGNON.

The fungus called "the fairy-ring champignon" (Marasmins oreadeas) is highly valued abroad, writes " Atom " in Averyman. It does not reach one half of the size of the pasture mushroom; but it has a much longer season, is more prolific, and can be dried and kept. The stem of the champignon has no ring, and the gills spring from the stem, but they are light buff in colour and wide apart. One great difference from the ordinary mushroom is that the championen does not readily decay. With gareful drying they may be kept in perfect condition even for years. As the season may last quite six menths, the useful-ness of the champignon can hardly be exag-gerated, and in France it is much more highly valued than here. As a flavouring for soups and stews it is incomparable, and Eng-lish cooks can be recommended to study it a

STUFFED TOMATOES.

One pound of tomatoes, four ounces of cold minced fish or meat, one hard-boiled egg, two tablespooninis fresh breadcrambs, two ounces of butter, sait, pepper, envenne, and, if fish is used, a dust of ground mace, and two teaspoonfuls of lemon inice. The toundoes must be firm. Cut a piece from the centre of each, not the stalk end, or they will not stand. Reserve the lids. Scoop come of the pulp from each tomato, and cook this with the butter in a small saucepan. Strain over the crumbs, add seasoning, mest or fish, and the egg chopped up. Fill the tomatoes with the mixture, replace the lids, bake on a well-greased tin about ten minutes; the tomatoes should not break. Dish on cress or garnish withparsley.

STEAMED APPLE PUDDING.

For a pudding of good size, use two quarts and a half of pared, quartered, and cored apples, a pint aml a haif of flour, three teaspoonfule of baking powder, one of sugar, one of salt, one table spoonful of tatter, and about three gills of milk. Mix the sugar, salt, and baking powder with the flour, and press through a sieve. Rub the butter into the dry ingredients, and then wet with the milk. Roll the dough into a sheet large enough to cover the apples; then spread it in a buttered baking dish, and put in the apples. Draw the edges of the dough together, and, after covering with another dish, which also has been well buttered, put into the stramer, and cook for two hours. Turn out on a pudding - dish, and serve with a sweet sauce.
