Bovine Tuberculosis (Ireland) Act of 1914.

NOTICE.

AN Order of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, dated 19th December, 1919, brings into operation, as from 1st January, 1920, under the above title, the Tuberculosis (Ireland) Order of 1914, which was suspended (save as regards one provision) from 31st August, 1915, under the Order every person having in his possession or under his charge

(i) any cow which is or appears to be suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, indurated udder, or other chronic disease of the udder; or

(ii) any bovine animal which is or appears to be suffering from tuberculosis of the udder; or

(iii) any bovine animal which is suffering from a chronic cough and showing definite clinical signs of tuberculosis

is required to notify the Veterinary Inspector for the district of the fact without delay, and to keep the animal isolated from other animals as far as practicable (Article 10) until the animal is slaughtered, or the permission of the Local Authority for the removal is obtained. He is also required, if the animal is a cow, to take certain precautions with regard to milk and milk vessels (Article 11) by order.

CONSIGNED FROM BELFAST. Seizure at Charleville Station. On Friday evening, about 5.30, three unknown men, armed with revolvers, visited the parcels office at Charleville Railway Station, held up the parcels porter, and ordered him to hand over part of a plough consigned from a Belfast firm. After warning the parcels porter to remain in the office for a few minutes, they took their departure. This is the first seizure in the district since the boycott campaign was started.

WOUNDS PROVE FATAL. TIPPERARY MAN'S DEATH. John Hayes, labourer, 23, Knockarden, Tipperary, one of the three men shot by the O'rows forces in a field at Knockarden on Tuesday, died on Friday evening in the Tipperary Military Hospital. He was shot through the windpipe, and his case was hopeless from the first. Thomas Looby, a farmer's son, from Stroughin, in the same district, was shot dead in the field on the same occasion.

DURING ROBBERY. Of Important Documents. A sensational robbery was carried out at the Kingsbridge Railway Station on Saturday morning. A heading, the property of Mr J. H. Bermingham, the Irish Secretary of the N.U.B. which contained important documents of a confidential nature in connection with the activities of railwaymen in connection with the strike, while he was engaged buying tickets at the booking office. Mr Bermingham had laid the bag down beside him while he was purchasing his tickets, and when he stopped to pick it up he discovered it missing. The inquiry into the Mallow stoppage will be closed next week, and the absence of the documents contained in the bag will cause inconvenience to the railwaymen's representatives.

BRIDGES BLOWN UP. In County Kerry. Crown forces blew up two bridges on important roads in the district from big areas on the eastern side, the intention being to prevent them bringing supplies to market by entering to secure their weekly provisions. Crown forces, it is stated, admit the destruction of the bridges, and assert that they are only playing the game started by their enemies, and will continue to erect a large number of innocent people may suffer, both the cutting of the roads and bridges by Republicans causes and the roads are restored to their normal condition. Should this policy be pursued the population will suffer many privations.

THE HOME CIRCLE

HOUSEHOLD HINTS AND COOKERY NOTES

A little salt rubbed on the discoloured spoon or fork will restore its silver tint. Milk that is turned may be rendered fit for use by stirring in a little baking soda. Salted water softens lettuce and salads, but borax makes the green-stuff crisp and cleaner. Gold embroidery may be cleaned when it tarnishes with a brush dipped in burned and pulverized rosin.

Steamed Steak.

Cut steak into nice pieces for rolling up, dip each piece in flour, pepper and salt. On each side put a little finely-minced onion, and roll up. Lay in a basin, add a tablespoon of stock or gravy, a little ketchup and meat gravy. Cover basin with greased paper, and steam for 2 1/2 hours.

Coffee Fritters

Put up slices of stale bread into even fingers. Mix together three-quarters of a gill of made coffee, 2 tablespoons of sugar, quarter gill of hot milk as creamy as possible, and one egg beaten. Let the mixture soak the bread fingers and then roll in fine crumbs. Fry in a pan of deep fat and sprinkle with sugar.

Almond Paste

Required—One pound of castor sugar, ten ounces of ground almonds, two ounces of ground rice, two ounces of castor oil, one ounce of gelatine, one gill of water; soak the gelatine in water till it has swollen then drain it on a sieve; mix all the dry ingredients together. Now dissolve the gelatine in the gill of water, which should be hot, and when dissolved add it to the dry ingredients. Mix the whole up to stiff dough or paste, divide into four equal pieces, roll them round like a ball, then flatten them out with the rolling-pin to the size required.

Stewed Steak and Kidney

Ingredients—2 lb beef kidney, 1/2 beefsteak (the round), 1 onion, 2 cloves, 1 bay leaf, 1 few mushrooms, 2 pint stock, 1/2 butter, 1/2 flour, salt, pepper, 10 garlics—Heat bottled mutton. Method—Wipe out the steak and kidney with a clean cloth in size to the kidney. Fry fat and some of the fat from the steak. dredge with flour, fry the meat and sliced onion lightly in the very hot butter; remove and make the sauce—i.e. blend the flour to butter; add the sugar gradually, boil 4 minutes; draw one side of the fire to the minimum. Put in the meat, simmer very gently. Turn on to a hot dish; decorate with little bunches of macaroni. Time, 2 hours.

Corn Bread

Beat three eggs very thoroughly and stir into them two and one-half cups of milk, one teaspoonful of melted shortening, and one teaspoonful of sugar. Mix in another bowl one cup of wheat flour, two teaspoons of corn meal, a round teaspoonful of baking powder, and one teaspoonful of salt. Stir these together and then beat them gradually into the liquid mixture. Whip very hard for a minute and pour into a well-greased mould. One with a foot to the inch is best. Bake in a steady fire for 45 minutes. Cut clean from the thickest part of the loaf.

Pineapple Cream

Ingredients—2 oz of castor powder, 1/2 pint of milk, 1 gill of evaporated condensed milk, 1 gill of pineapple syrup, 2 oz of gelatine, 1 teaspoonful of pineapple essence (small dice), 2 oz of sugar. The whites of 2 eggs (the yolks can be used for another sweet or for macaroni eggs). Method—Put the castor powder into a basin and blend smoothly with a little of the milk; boil the rest of the milk and pour on to the unsifted powder, stirring well. Return the mixture to the pan, add the sugar and stir over gentle heat until boiling, simmer for 5 minutes. Then stir in the milk and mix most of the liquid. Melt the gelatine in this, then strain into the custard, add the condensed milk and dice of pineapple and stir often. When cool and nearly setting, whip the whites of egg to a stiff froth and stir lightly to the mixture. Put into a mould lined out in cold water and leave in a cold place. When set turn out and garnish with whipped red jelly or jelly shapes of pineapple, which may be coloured pink with cochineal tincture.

Uncommon Teacakes

Ingredients—1 lb of flour, 1/2 oz of yeast, 1/2 oz of currants, 1/2 oz of margarine, 1 pint of lukewarm milk and water mixed, pinch of salt. Method—Put the flour, currants, and margarine in a bowl and make a well in the centre. Beat the yeast and one teaspoonful of the sugar to a cream with a wooden spoon; make half the milk and water lukewarm and stir gradually into the yeast. Four times into the well in the flour, cover with a cloth, and put in a warm place to rise for half an hour. Just as the margarine, add the rest of the milk and water, and make it lukewarm; take up the "sponge," mix the flour into it, and stir the rest of the milk to the mixture; gradually knead well, add the rest of the sugar and cleaned currants, cover, and leave in a warm place to rise for an hour, then knead again, divide into eight pieces, make into rolls, place them on a greased baking sheet, put between two pieces of paper to rise for 15 minutes, then bake in a hot oven for from twenty to thirty minutes.

Cooking a Ham

A ham of 20 lb will require boiling for five hours. Boil slowly and skim frequently. When 15 lb will take five hours to bake. Make a paste of 2 lb of fat, mix the ham thickly, and place it in a faty large baking dish with a large cup of water. Bake slowly for six hours, but more time may be needed according to age of ham. When the ham is cooked, remove the skin and sprinkle with brown bread crumbs and place around the knuckle a piece of paper cut into a roll. When boiling ham, add a small teaspoonful of vinegar and a few drops of orange. This will greatly improve the flavour. If the ham is allowed to cool in the water in which it was boiled it will be deliciously moist and sweet. Another way to cook a ham is to boil it in a large pot of water, add a few drops of vinegar, and boil it for half an hour, after which draw all the fat from under it and keep it well covered until quite cold. It will then be found to be delicious in flavour and perfectly cooked.

Simele Cake

Ingredients—2 lb of flour, 1/2 lb of margarine, 4 eggs, 1/2 lb of castor sugar, 1/2 lb of currants, 1/2 lb of raisins, 1/2 lb of sultana, 1/2 lb of mixed spice, 1/2 lb of almond paste, pinch of salt. Method—Put the flour, salt, baking powder, and spice through a sieve. Clean the currants and raisins, stone the raisins, and wash them in cold water. Put the margarine into a basin, warm slightly, add the sugar, and beat to a cream. Add the yolks of the eggs one by one, beating each in well. If they are inclined to curdle add a spoonful of milk. When very well beaten stir in the flour and the currants and raisins. It may be lightly added the currants and raisins, and then the whites of eggs to a stiff meringue and stir in lightly. Put into a cake tin, lined with two thicknesses of greased paper, place in a hot oven, and bake for 1 1/2 hours. A layer of almond paste, 1/2 lb, spread a layer of currants and raisins, and bake for 1 1/2 hours. The oven should be hot when the cake goes in, but the heat is gradually lessened. Turn out on a sieve, and when cold cut the top away, burn it bottom side up on to a layer of greased paper, and place the almond paste a little larger than the cake, brush over the top of the cake with slightly whipped white of egg, place the almond paste on the top and smoothing with a hot dish, make the top of the cake with a rolling pin, make some holes in the almond paste. Dip the cake in white of egg and place them round the edge of the cake, brush all over with white of egg, and put into a moderate oven or under a gas-griller to brown the almond paste. Pin a fancy paper round the cake when baked.

Apple Sauce

Ingredients—2 large apples (peeled, cored, and sliced), 1/2 lb of butter, 1/2 lb of sugar, 1/2 lb of raisins, 1/2 lb of currants, 1/2 lb of mixed spice, 1/2 lb of almond paste. Method—Stew the apples with sugar and water until quite soft—about 20 minutes. Rub through a sieve, or beat with a fork or spoon. Add the butter, and serve in a hot sauce boat. The small amount of almond paste, if used, is best served with the sauce.

MR. DEVLIN, M. P.

On Irish Conditions

Mr. Devlin, M.P. speaking at a South Labour Party meeting at Wycombe on Friday night, said there was no necessity for a Nationalist to make an apology for being on a Labour platform. He claimed a hearing before English working men and working women. He said that the English working men and women to the workers of that country when they had no party of their own. He asked them to join with him in protest against the horrors being perpetrated in Ireland to-day. I want for my country precisely what the Sinn Fein Party want for New Zealand, the right of the Irish people to manage their own affairs according to their own aspirations and ideals (cheers). In making that claim he was preaching no new doctrine on a British platform. This demand of Ireland has been the doctrine first laid down by Gladstone, and had become part and parcel of the policy of English and Scotch statesmen in England. If the people of this country only knew what was going on in Ireland it would make their hair stand on end. The only thing that kept him in Parliament, because like the Sinn Fein Party, he has since not failed the Parliament in any material way. In making that claim he was preaching no new doctrine on a British platform. This demand of Ireland has been the doctrine first laid down by Gladstone, and had become part and parcel of the policy of English and Scotch statesmen in England.
