

And Several Captured

An official report states :- Troops sucounsered rebels at Mullinshone, Tipperary, on Sanday. Two rebels were killed and three captured, two of whom were wounded. Toere were ac military cascalties.

A Cahir message says :- Rarly on Sunday morning a force of military and police eurrounded the house of a farmer named Richard Dagg at Garranies, near Cabir. Dagg's wite was in the house at the time, also Thomas Dagg, his nephew : Richard Reans and Patrick Hogan. Ksans and Hogan had been on the run for some sime.

The military went to arrest Keens and Hogan, but on surrounding the house were, it is stated, fired at from luside, a builet wound. ing Captain Marshall, Royal Artillery, in the arm slightly. The military fired a voiley, and after an exchange of several shots Hogan was

The removal of the remains of Alderman

George Clancy, Mayor of Limerick ; Councilior Michael O'Callagaan, ex-Mayor, and Mr Joseph O Donoghue, who were so bratally murdered on Sunday night and Monday morning, sook place on yesterday evening to St John's Cashedral. The remains of Mr Joseph O'Donoghus were removed about 5 o'clock in the evening from the house of Mrs Lyddy, Januaboro' Aveaue, where he resided. Notwishesanding she early hour of the removal of the remains there was a large cortegs present, and as the coffin passed along, covered wish the Republican fing, all heads were bared, and everyone showed signs of respect to the remains of the martyfed dead. The deceased, who was a member of the I R A. was dressed in his uniform, and his cap was laid on the coffin lid. Many beautiful wreaths were also carried in the funeral prossasion. The remains were placed in from of the High Altar of St John's Cathedral, where they will remain antil after Requiem High Mass at 11 o'nlock on so-morrow morning.

The scenes astending the funerals of Alderman George Clancy, Mayor, and Conneillor Michael O Callaghan, ex-Mayor, were sad to a high degree, and are likely to be impressed on the memories of those present for a lifetime, Ever since the tragis news of the foul deads of Sanday night and Monday morning spread shrough the city the cittzens of all shades of opinion have mourned the loss of the noble dead and on last night neveral thousand oisizens united in marking their detestation of the murders and paying their tribute of respect to the dead.

The funerals were announced to start at 6 c'olcok and long before this sime thousands of people, young and old, assembled outside the residences of deseased. The remains of the late ex-Mayor were removed from his residence. St Margaret's Villa, North Strand, soon after six c'clock, The funeral proceeded along the riverside and joined up with the funeral of the lats Mayor, Alderman Clancy, ousside St Munchin's Charch. The growd now reached considerable demensions and the seens presented a sad spectacle, when the balls of Sa Manchin's pealed out and the coffice consaining the dead, and shouldered by the cisisons, were borne along the funeral route to St John's Cashedral Two hearses formed portion of the faneral

NOVENA TO ST PATRICK

FOR PEACE IN IRELAND

Letter From Cardinal Logue In a letter to the clergy, which was read at all Masses in the Archdiocese of Armagh on Sanday, Cardinal Logue orders a Novena to St Patrick appealing to Almighty God for

return of peace to Ireland. He was, he said, reminded by a letter recelved from a young undergraduate at Cambridge-not a Oatholio-that the forthcoming Peast of St Patrick offered an opportune pecasion for an appeal to Almighty God for a seturn to peace. The young gentleman in question, hoping little from the devices of politicians and militarists, relied upon prayer. sepecially on the Feast of St Patrick, to obsain for as railed from the present terrible trials, and his Eminence thoroughly agreed with him. St Patrick brought peace to Ireland, Peace of she Gospel, which reconciled a failen race so its Orestor. His mission to Ireland was in every sense a mission of peace. While so many other countries were converted in face of violence and persecution, Irsland was brought to the Faith without chedding one drop of blood. By Patrick left Ireland in profound peace, shickly studded over with homes of prayer, penance, learning, and the practice of Ohrietian virtues in their highest perfection, by which she won the proud title "The Island of Saints." "What a reproach it would be to me." the Cardinal continued in his letter, "did we dim by crims the lustre of this glorious inherisance, Though still, thank God, the great body of our people are true children of St Patrick, staunch in the Faith, diligent in the discharge of their religious duties, guided by principles of Christian teaching, owing, no doubt, to circumstances which are beyond our control, the Ireland of to day presents a sad contrast to the Ireland of St Patrick. Were not grief excluded from the resime of the blessed, we sould easily imagine the gentle spostle weeping over the terrible evils which affilet the land he so dearly loved. But, though grief be excluded from the Kingdom of Heaven, is does not exclude charity, nor piety and mercy, which are akin to charity. We may be assured, therefore, that our glorious apostia in ever prepared to plead for us, and shat in him we have a powerful advocate with the Father of Mercy. We need not, however, expect his advocacy if we do not abetain from crime which outrages the Majesty of God. It were vain to raise blood-stained bands to Heaven in appeal for peace. Such appeal would be in itself an impleyy. We cannot hope for God's mercy and blessing if we either commit, encourage, approve, or even sympathies with crime. It is no excuse that erimes even greater and more numerous, which is, no duabt, the fact, are committed by others. Orims does not justify orims. The time is coming-very soon for some of us, in no distant future for all-when we shall stand before

of responsibilities, and for those alone. We shall not have to account for the misdeeds of the Black and Tane, or of the Auxiliary Oadsts, or of the military, who sacrifice so many innocent lives on the most fatile pretexts in their wild raids through the country. We shall not even have to account for the blindness, obstinacy, and partiality of our present Government, which has, perhaps, the most formidable reckoning of all. Danger to Irish Store Stock Inqustry

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK LEADER Sin-The Commisses of Agriculture of the Royal Dubila Society regres to observe a renewal of the agitation for the admission into the United Kingdom of store estile from Canada. In the opinion of this Committee the opening of Brisish parts so the introduction of sach animals would prove highly prejudicial to the stock breeding in this country, and consistate a grave menace to the future of food

production in the Kingdom. The improvement of stock-breeding in Irsland has siways received the active support and socouragement of the Royal Dablin Society. Initiated by the Society, this scheme has latterly been administered by the Department of Agriculture, in conjunction wish the Society, and it has been lessramental in not olay enhancing considerably the value of the individual animal but in adding substantially to the food supply of the nation.

Our small farmers - who breed shree out of every four of our stores-would esage to rear each animals and turn their attention to other sources of revenue, leaving Great Brisain to depend upon supplies of store: from abroad. In the event of a cessation of such supplies, owing to outbreaks of disease-always imminent-or so a diversion of trade to other channels, or so the outbreak of war, the British feeder would find himself wishous stores and wishous the possibility of falling back on a supply from Ireland.

The danger of inverraption due to disease is real. Granted that Canadian flocks and herds now anjoy a clean bill of health, there is no guarantee that they will continue in this fortunate position. Moreover, there is siways the possibility that the United Seates, aiready an extensive purchaser, may at any moment become so serious a competitor for Canadian cattle as to cut off supplies to tols country after home production has been abandoned .-I am, your obedient servant.
