



Air Wonders to

trapprising as have been the developments of vission wishin she past Afress or swenty sers they are tame, it would seem, in cumparison with those still in stors for us. Such. at all events, is the view of one who may reasonably be looked upon as no mean authority on the audjeak, Mr Harry Harper, Technical Secresary of the Civil Asrial Transpers Committee of Great Britain, holds in fact that the real wonders of the air are only just about to dawn.

When Tennyson in his "Lockeley Hall' predicted a time when alreraft would be used in war-" the nations' airy navise grappling in the central blue," as he put it-he little stought, doubtless, that his prophecy would be so soon, if ever, feifuled. Nos only has his draum been felly realised, however, bus what he saw in his dip into the future is in many respects far short of the reality, or, at all events, of what is sonadently expected to be in the very mear fature.

We have seen a good deal, but "we have not yet soon half there is to be seen." So says Mr Harper, who adds :- "We have thought of flying, so far, as comething that is very wonderfal, no doubt, but yery far indeed from our own personal lives. But this is going to be the case no longer; we are not going to look on at flying any more; we are going to fly ourselves and we are, in a sense, going to make our lives longer by doing so. We shall move at such speed from place to place that the time we spend on travel will be more than halved."

Aerial experts, it appears, are and for some

time have been very busy perfecting developments and inventions for aliminating as far as is humanly possible the danger and difficulties hitherso incidental to aviation, and we are promised some bruly amazing achievements as a result. Instruments "simost human in the ingenuity of their astion," for instance, are now being devised to eashle the airman to success. fully surmount all difficulties of fog and mist and cloud and to determine at ones his altitude and his relation to any particular landing place. This is but one of many wonderful devices being perfected with a view to make passenger and goods frame by simmuch more safe, expeditious, and convenient than we have

dared to dream of up to this. A wonder soon to be realised in actual fact we are assered, is the airship arrival and departure pistform on the top of a huge stee tower. "Experiments conducted secretly during the war, and continued since, says Mr Harper, "have now proved that big sirehips, or air liners, such as have been designed and are now building for the Atlantic service between Europe and America, will require to go into their sheds only occasionally, like a ship into dock. all other times they will simply rids out in their appointed element, the air, just in the same way as a ship does on the sea, picking up and disembarking passengers from special serial stations raised high above the ground."

The possibility of driving aeroplanes by alsobricky supplied from an electrified interna-Monal rouse, electrified with a controlled ray of wireless current, is a thought occupying the winds of invertors, and should the idea materialles it will bring results almost incredible. "This will mean," we are told "that an aeroplane will be installed merely with a lightened electric moter capable of being energised by the wireless waves. There will be no need, as as present, to life into the air the dead weight of many gallons of fuel and the space and weight thus saved will be devoted to profit sarging earge. A possibility even more assonishing, which seems at a first giance positively uncanny, is the flying along these electrified airways of planes without plicts or any numan being in them."

Astounding marvels of aviation, it would thus appear, are not only possibilities but Probabilities of a time not far ahead. If the serial prophets be true, indeed, it will not be very long-comparatively speaking, at all events-until travel and commerce by air be developed to such a pitch that people will really wonder how those who came before them managed to get along at all without the facilities and conventences that will be then

DUBLIN SIX HANGED

" WENT ALMOST JOYOUSLY TO THEIR DEATH"

Our Dublin correspondent, wiring this after-

noon, says :-The six young Irishman condemned to death were executed this morning at Mountjey Jali. two at six, two at seven, and the remaining two at sight o'clook.

The first two were the boys, Meran and Whelan believed by those who knew them to be innecent. Mass was celebrated in each condemned call, and the lads went calmly, almost joyously, to their death.

An immense consource of people assembled outside the Gaol immediately after Carlew hour, five o'clock a m, and prayers were said during the three hours for the departing souls. The prison Chaplain, who was deeply affected, refused to make any statement when seen sub-

sequently to the execution. Dublin itself is a city of the dead to-day and the prevailing gloom is accentuated by heavy rain and snow, which is falling.
