



Interesting Proposals Outlined The following estatement was issued on Sendey evening by Mr M. Coy, Secretary of the Delegation in Ireland, representing the Ameripan Relief Committee: -On Friday, March 11, Olemans J France, Chairman, and Samuel D M'Ooy, Scoresary, of the Delegation in Ireland, representing the American Commisses for Relief in Ireland, salled upon General Sir Navil Macready as she Royal Hospital. With General Macready were Sir John Anderson, Sir Erness Ulark, General Brind, and others of the civil and military 204115--Mr France and Mr M'Ooy made the call to inform these officials of the tentative conclusions they have drawn from the tour, which they and the other six members of the Amerisan delegation have made through Iteland during the past month. They gave it as their individual opinion that the wisest form of relief which America could furnish to Ireland would be is funds for the reconstruction and rehabilitation of crammerles, factoriss, and office buildings, which have been destroyed, thus throwing numbers out of employment, and they stated that in their opinion the renewal of these orippled industries would, by giving employment once again to these now ont of work, relieve personal distress in a permanent way. Money given without such reconstruction would never be, they asserted, other than a temporary alleviasion of the economic distress. To undertake this reconstruction programme which they favour, they suggested the formation of a body of responsible Irish basinesemen and angineers, to work in connection with similarly responsible American busimessmon and engineers resident in Ireland during the completion of the programme. Mr France and Mr M'Ooy have recommended to the American Committee for Relief in Irsland that this suggestion be accepted, and shas a campaign for £6,000,000 in contributions from the American people be inaugurated with which to carry is out. They suggested that the sum raised by this campaign should not he sent as an outright gift, but that it be administered as a fand to be loaned under proper scourity, and that when each individual loan was repaid the amount should return to the general brust fund, to be again loaned for the building-up of other industries. Pending the approval of this suggestion by the American Committee for Relief in Ireland, smaller sums for the relief of urgent personal distress in Irsland will doubtless be fortheoming from America, they pointed out, and would be distributed through charitable organisations which already exist or which may be organized ; and they expressed their personal belief that these sams would be wisely distributed, apon genuinely humaniseries principles, and without support to raligious or political differences.




