Plums,

The plam, like the pear, is an uncertain oropper in Ireland, obledy because during its sarly finwering period the blossoms are exposed to spring frosts. Some variebles, such as Greengage and River's Early Prolific are notorionely subject to "off" years. The free eropping yellow and purple agg plams, also Victoria and Ozar might, in my opinion, be more extensively planted in the open, and room might be found for the choicer deseert plums suon as Ges's Golden Drop, Jefferson, and Count d'Althan. The solls most suited to plams are medium to light loams, containing some lims. Against walls the fan-shape is preferable to the horizontal mode of training for plams as It permits the replacement of branches which have diad or become unfruitful.

Cherries

Cherries are neusly grown against walls in gardens to facilitate their protection from birds. The cherry is subject to a disease known as "gumming" which causes branches to die back with a copious exadation of gam from the bark. No remedy for the disease-which is more prevalent on heavy solls-has yet been discovered As in the case of the plam, the fan-shaped tree is the more satisfactory form. Suitable variaties are : -- Morello, particularly asefal for covering a north wali; Eiton, May Dake, and the Bigarrens, which will succesd on walls of east or west aspect. Planting

If ordinary precautions are taken there need be no losses among newly planted srees. On arrival of the press they should be unpacked as once, the roote thoroughly soaked in water, and then laid in a brench and covered with soil antil they can be planted. To be in proper condition for plansing the soll should be orambly and noses wes as to cake when trodden upon. The details of planting simple. The soil as the bottom of the hole-made a faw lookes wider than the spread of the roots-having been loosened and raised slightly in the centre, the tree is placed in position and the route carefully spread out. In adjacting the tree the alde with most branches is sarned to the north. The finess of the top soil is first thrown in amongst the roots ; as filling in proceeds the tree is slightly shakea once or twice to settle the soll amongst the root fibres. When the roots are covered the soll is lightly prodden down, shen more soil added, and a second and firmer tramping given. The final layer of soll is left loose, and to allow for settling should be slightly above she general level of the ground. A surface mulch of manure is a usaful safeguard against she effect of drought during the first season, and should always be given in the case of wall tress.




