





The soil in which the outlings are to be struck should receive a dressing of decayed manure at the end of September, and if the soll be heavy some lightening material-such as road scrapings or sand-should be added. Planting

Biack ourrant cuttings, 14 inches long, should be planted 9 inches deep ; red surrants or goospherry outlings, of thet leages. 6 inches deep. The deplo of planting is of importance. because during the first esseen rosts may be pushed out from any part of the culting below the ground, and the deeper the catting is planted the more roots is will form within limits. Below 10 Inches or so soll conditions are unfavourable for such surface restors as the bush fruit. The cuttings may be put in as 6 inches apart in lines 18 inches apart, the latter distance to allow for hosing and mulching the first summer. At the end of the first sesson each cutting should have made three strong roots. If these are more than 1 foot in leogia the young plant will be strong enough to pat out in its fraiting quarters ; if clean, is will require a year in a rich nursery bad.

Manuring

The ground intended as permanent ousriers for bush frais can scarcely be too rich. Market gardeners and others have long knows that moossberries and ourrants respond to heavy dressings of farmyard manurs. An English investigator, in a manurial experiment exbending over a number of years, found that manuring increased the yield of gooseberries by 500 per cent. He also found that artificials sould not replace farmyard manure as a source of fertilising ingredients for this crop.

Pruning

The young bushes having been planted out in cloh ground at 6 feet spart (or at 5 feet if space be limited), the next question that arises Inquiries on Monday discideed the fact that is their pruning. As in the case of the apple, hard omiting is practiced until the requisite number of branches-8 or 10-are obtained to form a good head, and then moderate outsing to strengthen the branches. With goossberries and red and white carrants the form to be aimed at is the open-centred, cup-shaped bash ; with black currants an open centre fe not so necessary as there are no spure on the lower and older parts of the branches regaining light. The three or four shoots produced by the custing during the first season are shortened back so within 3 inches of the main stem, pruning to an outward bud. Six or sight scrong shoots whit result; if eight, and shey are well placed, the foundation of the tree is laid. If less than eight well placed shoots are obtained ; again out back rather hard, that is, to within about 4 inches of the bass of the shoots, and the necessary number of shoots will be forth. coming in the second season siter planting. After the bash is formed the praning will differ according to the bush being treated. The red carrant is vigorously spar spraned, i e, all laterals-side branches-are put back to wishin one inch from the main branch, except where a space occurs in the bush, when a laseral is left to fill is. The leaders have onethird of their length removed The gooseberry is also spar praned, bas more lateral wood is lefs than in the case of the rad currant, as fruit is formed on the young wood as well as on the spurs of the old branches. In proning the laterals all those in the centre are sparred back, and also which cross or interiore with the ploking of the fruit on the main branches. When the proper number of branches are formed eachers coming from below the ground should be removed. The black currant will require little or no praning for shree or four years. The outlog out of a branch where swo prosees, and are rubbly against each other, is all that is necessary. Toping the young succus -as is sometimes practized -is not advisable. As the bushes get older they will be found to contain a good many bare and more or less anproductive branches. Some of these should be out out to give room to young shoets springing from the base of the bush.
