ANNUAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN It is now 64 years since there was a nearly total eclipse of the sun visible in Ireland, but on the 8th of this month, about new time 7.45 in the morning, the moon will commence to cross the face of the sun, moving at the rate of 3,000 miles an hour, so that in about an hour the entire moon will be over the disk of the sun; but on this occasion the disk will be a shade smaller than the sun, with the result that there will be a ring of light at the time of total immersion.
