THE HOME CIRCLE

HOUSEHOLD HINTS AND COOKERY NOTES

Grated lemon peel is a great improvement to rhubarb tart. A little lemon juice added to the water when mixing will make pastry light.

Sweet Cookies

Four cups flour, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup lard, one-half teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon soda. Wet with sour cream.

Potato Cakes

Three cups mashed potatoes, 1 egg, pinch of salt, one quarter cup milk, 1 teaspoon powder in flour to roll, fry or bake.

Oatmeal Cookies

5 cups rolled oats, 2 cups flour, one-half teaspoon soda, one-half teaspoon salt, 1 cup lard, 1 cup sugar, one-half cup water.

French Mustard

One-half cup mustard, one-half cup milk, one-half cup vinegar, 1 tablespoon pepper, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1 egg, salt, piece of butter; boil.

MARZOONS

Beat stiff whites of 3 eggs; add one cup of loaf sugar and exactly one-half pound coconut. Bake in moderate oven in small cakes dropped from teaspoon.

Sauce for Veal

Take yolks of 2 eggs. Add spoonful cold water. Whisk in saucpan, adding juice of half lemon and tablespoonful cream; pepper and salt. Boil over fire, keeping smooth; serve.

Lettuce Dressing

1 tablespoon brown sugar, 4 tablespoons vinegar, one-half teaspoon of mustard, 1 teaspoon pepper sauce. One half cup of milk or cream put in jar of all before pouring on lettuce.

Savoury Omelet

Mix yolks of 2 eggs with half teaspoonful salt, pepper and salt; beat with a bit of flour and add a little chopped ham or kidney. Beat half a cup of butter in pan, add to mixture and stir lightly for a few minutes. Fold up sides and serve hot.

Cream Dressing

One-half tablespoon each salt, French mustard (or any other mustard), flour, three-quarters teaspoon sugar, egg slightly beaten, two and one-half tablespoons butter, three-quarters cup thin cream; add slowly one-quarter cup vinegar. Cook over boiling water with mixture thickens, stirring constantly. Strain if necessary.

Walnut Bread

Ingredients—Three cups of flour, 1 cup of brown sugar, 3 teaspoonful of salt, 3 teaspoonful of baking powder, 1 cup of milk, 1 egg and 1 egg and 1 cup of milk; mix and sift dry ingredients. Mix in the walnuts and add beaten egg and milk. Pour into a greased tin and bake in an oven barely warm for the first 15 minutes, then gradually increasing the heat.

Fritters

One-quarter lb flour, one quarter c of butter, pinch of salt and white of one egg. Mix butter to cream and stir into flour, add salt. Moisten with enough warm milk to make batter that will drop from spoon. Rub down all lumps, add beaten white of egg and stir well. Make jam of sandwich, oil in cooker, dip in batter and fry in hot lard or good dripping.

Vegetable Sausages

Boil 3 carrots, 4 onions and 2 parsnips; chop all fine, and cook until soft half pint of peas. Pound these up well, add the chopped vegetables and a layer of chopped parsley, a little chopped garlic, pepper, salt, with 2 eggs. Mix all together, add beaten white of egg and stir well. Make jam of sandwich, oil in cooker, dip in batter and fry in hot lard or good dripping.

A Savoury Dish

Ingredients—2 pork chops, 2 apples, 2 onions, 2 potatoes, 4 teaspoonful of dried sage, 1 pint of stock or water. Salt, pepper. Method—Wipe the chops with a damp cloth, trim off any superfluous fat, and cut them into four pieces. Put them into a greased casserole and sprinkle with the sage. Peel and slice the onions and apples, removing the cores from the latter, place them on the chops, sprinkle with salt and pepper, and pour in the stock or water. Cover with greased paper, then peas, and bake in an oven for 2 to 3 hours. The oven must be hot when the chops go in, but the heat should be gradually lessened.

Buttermilk Cake

Ingredients—1 lb of flour, 4 lb of margarine, 4 lb of brown molasses, 4 lb of raisins, 1 lb of currants, 1 lb of sultana, 2 of candied peel, 1 lb of level teaspoonful of carbonate of soda, 1 pint of buttermilk. Method—Sieve the flour and carbonate of soda, rub in the margarine; stone the raisins, clean the currants and shred the peel, add to the flour together with the sugar, sift all together, add the buttermilk, and put all into a greased cake tin lined with greased paper, place the tin on a baking sheet and bake in a slow oven for 2 to 3 hours. The oven must be hot when the cake goes in, but the heat should be gradually lessened.

Raisin Roly-Poly

Ingredients—1 cup of raisins, 1 cup of flour, 1 teaspoonful of salt, 1 teaspoonful of butter, 1 teaspoonful of baking powder, 3 teaspoonful of shortening, 3 cup of milk, 1 egg and 1 cup of sugar. Sift flour, salt, and baking powder into a bowl, add shortening and rub in lightly with tips of fingers. Add enough milk to make into a dough, and roll out to 1/2 inch in thickness. Cover with raisins which have been stewed, thickened and sweetened with one tablespoonful of sugar. Roll up the same as a jam roll, and bake in a tin that has been brushed with butter. Sprinkle top with another tablespoonful of sugar, and dot with the remainder of the butter. Bake in a moderate oven for 40 minutes, and serve with lemon sauce.

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NORTHERN ELECTIONS PANIC IN CLARE TOWN

Important Working Agreement Between Mr. Devlin and Mr. De Valera

The following is a copy of the agreement entered into between the Republican and Nationalist Parties for co-operation in the coming elections in North East Ulster:—

(a) That all candidates accept the principle of "Self-Determination" for Ireland.

(b) That all candidates pledge themselves to abstain from the so-called Facilitations of Northern Ireland.

(c) That the respective parties agree to co-operate during the election in such a way as will secure the united vote of the parties in the constituencies standing upon the "Anti-Partition" slogan.

(d) That each party put forward candidates for each constituency not to exceed the number set out in the following schedule:

MISSING BRIEFS

Application in King's Bench

In the King's Bench Division, in the case of O'Connell v. the Great Southern and Western Railway Co., Ltd., which was listed for hearing before Mr. Justice Finlay and a Dublin City appeal jury, the action being brought by the plaintiff, a resident of Kesh, Co. Wick, for damages for breach of contract.

Mr. J. J. O'Connell (represented by Mr. J. J. Linnell), in applying for an adjournment, said that there had been a fatality in the case, as the briefs on behalf of the plaintiff, which had been sent from Kesh three days before, had not arrived in Dublin. His lordship knew how things were in that part of the country. The railway line had again been torn up and the briefs had not arrived.

Mr. Lynch, K.C., with whom was Mr. Fitzgibbon, K.C., and Mr. Phelan (represented by Mr. Coker Barrington), for the defendants company, said that they had several witnesses present, including some from England, and they were prepared to go on. They would agree, however, to an adjournment if they were informed of the witnesses' expenses and the cost of the day. They had witnesses from the O'Connell Railway Committee and two witnesses who had to drive to Malin to catch the train for Dublin.

Mr. Justice Finlay adjourned the trial until the 26th inst., when the witnesses' expenses and the cost of the day should be stated.
