THE Guardians of this Union will, at their meeting on SATURDAY, 10th APRIL, 1921, receive tenders for supplying the Workhouse from the 1st May, 1921, to 31st May, 1921, with from 200 to 250 Gallons Pars New Milk daily, as per gallon. The Milk must produce not less than the standard of nine degrees of cream each delivery, and when such shall not have been reached, a penalty of 2d. per degree per gallon will be imposed on each gallon delivered.
