THE present dispute between the miners and mine owners of Great Brissia should serve so direct fresh attention to the question of Ira land's coal resources.

Those qualified to speak with authority on the subject are unanimous in stating that in this country there are collieries quite capable, if they were only fally developed, of supplying all our fuel and power needs for generations to come without any imports whatever from out.

Some idea of the extent and richness of our Irish coalfields may be had from figures just made available as to the actual working and possibilities of the Wolfbill mines, in Queen's County.

The Wolfhill collieries have for some years been owned by Mr J J Parkinson, the wellknown racing man, but the property is now being floated as a public company, with capital of £160,000, of which Mr Parkinson himself is to receive £100,000, half in each and half in shares, as the option of size directors,

The total sies of the property, the manager of the mines explained to a party of visitors on Monday, Is 9,802 acres, of which some 200 acres have been worked out. The scal reserves are estimated to be 65,000,000 tons. The coal raised is anthracite, and it is elaimed to be free

At pre ent, it appears, catting is done at Wolfhill by hand, but electric cost-outting and being considered. hanling mathines are being installed, and under the new development it is expected that in a few months there will be an output of 550 sone per day. At this rate, it is calculated, the coal sapply at the collieries would last over

Wolfhill is but one porsion of the Leinster coalfields, and the figures given in relation to is show the wonderful impersance and possibilisies of our Irish coal fields, which cover a wide area and are mainly composed of very rich seams of coal of high class quality.

The new company formed to work the Wolfbill mines will leave nathing undone to achieve success and he supply Irish coal requirements as far as possible.

It is estimated, according to a report in the " Independent," that "If the collisies are developed to an output of 650 sone a day for 280 working days in the year the annual profit would be £39,000. On this basis a dividend of 15 per cans sould be paid, and allowances made for the bailding up of a reserve for depresia. sion and new developments."

COUNTY COURT JUDGE'S ANIMADVERSIONS

Must Have Full Details

Captain Moonlight" Warnings County Court Judge Piget, & U, at yesterday's continuation of the Limerick Quarter Sessions, while dealing with a claim by the shareholders of the Kantoher Co operative Creamery Society for compensation for malicious damage, emphatically stated that he would refuse in fusure to admit any syldence as to damage to oreamerise when given in bulked figures.

The Oreamery Society, which was represented by Me John Condon, solicitor, claimed £350 for the malletons destruction of machinery and busser.

Mr Condon described the creamery as one of the hest developed and largest in Ireland, and Mr Fant, the machinery engineer for co-operative creameries for the Agricultural Organisa-tion Scotaty, gave Pridence that he had examined the damage and bad assessed the amount at £350; which he considered a very reasonable sam. 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
