Conciliation Scores Again

The success of conciliation has once again proved an efficacious remedy for the settling of labour disputes in Limerick. The Conciliation Board, which has succeeded in having the city free from a strike, has again secured a similar result.

The builders' labourers claimed a wage increase of 2d per hour, and on their demand being refused, announced that they would cease work on Thursday night last.

Both sides concerned, it appears, were unwilling to leave the point at issue to arbitration. Father Philip, however, realized that if the builders' labourers struck it would mean that the skilled labour employed in local buildings would also be unemployed.

As a result of the tireless energies and persuasive efforts of that truly great priest the employers and the labourers met in conference at 4.30 on Saturday afternoon.

The Conciliation Board, and as an outcome of its exertions for a peaceful solution of the difficulty an amicable arrangement was come to whereby the men got an increase of 1d per hour, bringing their wages up to 1s 6d per hour.

The adjustments of the dispute before a strike was resorted to is a matter for the greatest gratification, and both thanks and congratulations are due to those responsible for giving effect to the arrangement.

What Father Philip has done in preventing strikes in Limerick is by no means fully realized by the general public. He has been chiefly instrumental in forming the local Conciliation Board, which has already more than completely justified its existence.

Limerick can ill afford to lose the services of such a magnificent organizer and preserver of industrial peace, and his transfer just now will be very seriously regretted by those in a position to fully know and understand the character and greatness of his work in warding off and satisfactorily settling local labour disputes.

His latest piece of useful and fruitful endeavour—the bringing of the builders' labourers and their employers together and the bridging of the difference between them—is but one of the very many triumphs of his genius for preventing industrial harmony, but it would be sufficient in itself, even if it stood alone, to entitle Father Philip to the warm gratitude of all classes of the citizens.

A duck, belonging to Mr. John, of Broomfield, was seen in the city on Saturday morning. It was a very fine specimen of the breed, and was seen in the company of a young boy who was seen to be feeding it.

On Saturday morning, a young man named George Stone, of Killybeg, was shot dead. His younger brother was also shot, but escaped unhurt.

The dispensary doctor, clerk, matron, and other officials of O'Connell's Hotel, who were not salaried for the quarter ended 31st March, have been paid for the past two months.

The Ballymacelligott Courtmartial found Thomas O'Connor, Timothy Healy, and Wm. Dowling not guilty on one, but guilty on a second charge. James O'Connell and Richard McEllistrain were acquitted on all charges.

A meeting of the Committee was held yesterday. Very Rev. Canon O'Donnell, P.P. V.F.O., was in the chair. The meeting was held in the presence of a large number of members.

The Rev. Chairman reviewed the financial position, pointing out that the subscriptions were coming in slowly although the work on the church was progressing very rapidly.

After some discussion it was decided to appoint a delegation to call and solicit contributions from all industrial firms, shopkeepers and trades bodies in the city during the coming week, the delegation to consist of the Rev. Canon O'Donnell, P.P.; Rev. G. H. O'Connell, O.C.; Messrs M. O'Loughlin, J. Barry, J. A. Doyle, Solicitor; P. O'Farrell, and James and John Powell.

Mr. A. Evans, Manager and Leicester Bank, who has been appointed manager of the Limerick branch, was succeeded as cashier by Mr. J. J. McKeown of Killybeg.

SHOCKING OCCURRENCE

In Castleconnell Hotel

PROPRIETOR AND TWO POLICEMEN SHOT DEAD

A shocking and painful occurrence took place in the Shannon Hotel, Castleconnell, last evening, when the proprietor of the hotel, Mr. Denis O'Donovan, and two policemen were shot dead.

About eight o'clock, it appears, three policemen from Newport, in plain clothes, were having a drink at the bar of the hotel, when a large party of Auxiliaries, also in plain clothes, rushed in, and gave the order "Hands up."

When the three at the bar saw the Auxiliaries in plain clothes, they naturally thought it was a Sinn Féin, or Republican raiding party and produced revolvers and opened fire on the Auxiliaries.

The Auxiliaries in turn apparently thought the three at the bar were Sinn Féin, so they returned the fire. Mr. O'Donovan was in the bar at the time of the occurrence, and after which, it is stated, the Auxiliaries, or some of them, accused him of having harboured rebels, took him out into the hotel yard and there fired a number of revolver bullets into his back. Mr. O'Donovan died in about ten minutes.

Information gleaned on the spot today showed that in the first instance the three policemen were shot dead, and that a woman sitting at the bar was wounded.

The village of Castleconnell is in deep mourning today, all shops and places of business being closed as a mark of respect to the memory of one of its most popular and influential residents.

Solemn Requiem High Mass at Castleconnell at 11 o'clock (new time) on Wednesday. The Rev. Canon O'Donnell, P.P., will officiate.

Funeral Arrangements. A funeral will be held for the late Mr. Denis O'Donovan at 11 o'clock on Wednesday at the parish church.

LIMERICK HARBOUR BOARD. ELECTRIC LIGHTING CHARGES. Opening of the Dock Promenade.

A meeting of the Limerick Harbour Commissioners was held today. The Mayor (Alderman S. M. O'Meara) presided, and the other members present were:—Messrs L. J. Griffin, H. O. O'Connell, J. H. Roche, and J. H. Roche.

The Engineer thought that there was a good deal too much distinction between the charges for power and light and argued that from his experience and information the charges for lighting should be more proportionate. The proposed increase was for 4s 1d.

A question having been asked by Mr. Griffin as to the lighting along the quay and an answer given that the whole of the sections had not been completed.

Mr. Griffin said that there was one matter which he wished to bring before the Board, and which he would wish to be persisted in, and to bring to a finality the question of access to the dock promenade.
