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

SHOCKING OCCUPRENCE

In Castleconnell Hotel

PROPRIETOR AND TWO POLICEMEN SHOT DEAD

A shooking and painful occurrence took place in the Shannon Hotel, Castleonunell, last evening, when the proprietor of the hotel, Mr Denis O'Donovan, and swo policemen wass shot dead.

About sight o'clock, it appear. three policemen from Newport, in plain coloshes, were having a drink at the bar of the hotel, when a large party of Auxiliaries, also in plate clothes, rashed in, and gave the order "Hands up." When the three at the har saw the Auxiliaries in mufai arrive they evidently shought it was a Sinn Feln, or Republican raiding | party and produced revolvers and opened fire on the Auxiliaries. Auxiliaries in turn apparently thought the three palicemes were Sine Peiners, so they returned the fire. Mr O'Donovan was in the bar at the time of the occurrence after which, it is stated, the Auxiliaries, or some of them, accused him of having harboured rebels, sook him out into the hotel yard and there fired a number of revolver builtes into him. Mr O'Domevan died in about ten minates, a priess in the meantime having administered to him. When the whole affair was over and explanations had been made the Auxiliaries tendered expressions of regret and sympathy so Mrs O'Donovan for the shooting of her

Later Information

Information gleaned on the spot to-day showed that in the terrible occurrence the first osensly was an Asxiitary, believed to be an officer. Daring the exchange of shots within he appeared outside a window looking into the bar, and as ha did so one the three polloemen fired at him, the builes seiting affect in the right eye, death being instantaneous. The Auxiliaries brought a Lewis gun into action on the bar aparament, causing great haven to walls and partitions. The fire was terrific.

When the firing within the ber was slienced it was alteovered that une of the Newport police was dead and that a second was dengerously wounded. The wounded policemen. however, is progressing favourably. The village of Castisounnell is in deep mourn-

ing to day, sil shops and places of husiness being sissed as a mark of respect to the memory of one of its most popular and infigential residents. The lase Mr. O'Donovan was aged about 46 years. He was a very prominent figure in the city of Limerick, where he was for a number of years and up to the time of his death agent for Massrs James J Musphy & Co. brewers, Cork. In all public masters he sook a deep interest and was a first rate speaker on each matters. He was educated at Clongowes and was married to Mice M Namara, a sieter of Mr John M'Namara, Speinoarne.

An interesting ascount of a visit to the house of the late Mr M O Callaghan has been contributed so the "New Republic," an important American magazine, by Mr Francis Hackett who spent some days with the then Mayor and Mrs O'Callaghan lass summer.
