# SENT TO JAIL FOR FRAUD Represented Himself as Traveller For Limerick Firms

PLAUSIBLE BOGUE

Armed with on engaging manner and an Irish accent (says a London newspaper), Louis Werser, a young Rassian Jow, perpetrated a Koglund and Scotland. Representing himself as the traveller for Irish firms selling goods, oblify sugar, at cheaper prices than English computitors. Werner induced tradesman to as payment in advance for the goods that never arrived. At Darlington, he represented the Limerick concern to be tobaseo dealers, and quoted prices three and four shillings per thousand eigarestes cheaper than any other fim. With this story he annexed £15 of Darington money. Middlesbrough was next visited. The Limerick concern was now represented to be disposing of signretites and coocant oil. 215 was taken from the shopkeepers there. At Stockton on Tees the business was described as sugar, topacco, and provisions. By these representations Werney secured \$14. As Bury he announced himself as agent for a Dublin firm of whisky distillers. He induced a publican to purchase cases of whisky value £37, which were paid for in
