IRISH ELECTIONS

PROCLAMATION ISSUED

By New Lord Lieutenant

Wednesday night's "Dublin Gazette" contains a Proclamation by Lord Fawcett, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, concerning the Polls for Northern and Southern Ireland. The text of one proclamation is as follows:-

By His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant General and Governor of Ireland. A Proclamation declaring the calling of a Parliament of Southern Ireland.

Whereas, by the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, it is enacted that on and after a certain day, to be fixed in manner therein provided, there shall be established for Southern Ireland, a Parliament to be called the Parliament of Southern Ireland, consisting of His Majesty's Senate of Southern Ireland and the House of Commons of Southern Ireland.

CASE OF MR COMERTON

Arguments Resumed in King's Bench

Court Reserves Judgment
