CORK COURTMARTIAL. County Limerick Civilian Charged. At Victoria Barracks, Cork, on Friday morning a Military Court assembled for the trial of John O'Sullivan, a civilian, whose address was recorded as Davon road, Abbeystead, Co. Limerick. Accused was charged with (1) committing an offence, in that he, near Knocknadsike, Co. Limerick, on the 24th April, was in possession of arms, viz, one automatic pistol and one revolver; (2) being improperly in possession of ammunition, viz, twelve rounds of revolver ammunition, thirteen rounds of pistol ammunition, thirteen shotgun cartridges, and one round of rifle ammunition; (3) being improperly in possession of documents prejudicial to the restoration of order in Ireland, viz, a book purporting to be an official publication of the Irish Republican Army, entitled, "Night Fighting."

Mr P. Kelly, B.L. (represented by Mr Maurice O'Donnor, solicitor, on behalf of the R.O.B. Moran, Cork, Limerick) represented the accused, who pleaded not guilty to the charges. An officer stated that on the 24th April he was with a party of military patrolling in the Tourmaline district; witness was in the leading car; after passing Knocknadsike they saw five civilians running away; just then the car was fired at; witness was not in the charge; he jumped out; they called on the men to halt, and as they failed to do so the military were ordered to fire, and did so; he saw the accused running, and they shot at him again and missed him; he was hit; he halted, then and put up his hands, and after a few moments of hesitation he came towards them; in the meantime another soldier came up from the right and searched the accused in his presence, and found the articles which witness enumerated; witness was not out in the charge; there were also found on him a Sam Brown belt, revolver holster, a hat, and a green haversack with the letters I.R.A. on it; a slip of paper was also found on him giving the number of the military transport car in which witness was seated; witness asked the accused why he ran away, and he said he was afraid.

In reply to Mr Kelly, witness stated that when he first saw the five men they were coming from the direction of a labourer's cottage; when those five men, including the accused, were arrested, no arms were found on their persons; accused said he was frightened, but that he was not in the charge; witness was away; witness only saw the top of his body as he ran away, but he could perfectly well see the accused throwing something away; witness was 150 yards away from accused at the time; it was a hilly country. Mr Kelly—Did you see what the accused threw away? No. And it might have been anything at all? Yes, it might. Did you go directly to the spot where you thought you saw him throw something away? As far as I could judge I went to the same spot, if I went there direct I would not have seen it. Did you first go to where the accused surrendered, 200 yards away from that spot, and afterwards come to where you thought he threw something away? No, sir.

In reply to further questions by Mr Kelly, witness stated that he understood the words in Irish on the haversack were Sean Sallivan. He did not know Irish, and that was what he had heard. The second witness, a member of the patrol on the occasion, gave corroborative evidence; with the accused was running away witness saw him stoop as if to put something on the ground; accused was then 200 yards from witness; accused went on for another 200 yards, and he then put up his hands and came back to witness and the previous witness, who were pursuing him; at the time a witness searched accused, and in his possession found a piece of paper with the number of cars on it, and also a book entitled "Night Fighting"; the first witness, two other officers, and witness then went over the ground, as far as they could, that accused had covered in running away, and they went up a lane, and just as they were running away witness saw accused stoop the first witness found the articles he had mentioned in his evidence. To Mr Kelly—They were all very excited at the time. Mr Kelly—Perhaps he stooped because he thought he would get a bullet? More than likely. Have you ever seen people stooping when they were running away from the military? Yes. Perhaps accused thought he might get a bullet? and he stooped to avoid it? It is strange he did not stoop at any other time when he was running away except at that time; I fired at him before that and he did not stoop.

In reply to further questions by Mr Kelly, witness stated he saw no papers near where accused was arrested; he did not make any search at the spot where accused put up his hands. The next witness stated he examined the automatic pistol (produced); he found it was loaded with 5 rounds; the magazine was found in the chamber; the pistol was thoroughly serviceable, and it was in good working order and perfectly clean. This closed the case for the prosecution. Mr Kelly asked the court for an adjournment of the case until the following day, as his witnesses were unable to be present owing to the lack of train facilities. The court then adjourned for fifteen minutes to enable Mr Kelly to consult with the accused. On re-opening Mr Kelly said he would examine the accused. He regretted the other witnesses were not present, but he would do the best he could. The accused was then examined, and stated he is 21 years of age; his father is a farmer in Ardara and witness is an assistant manager of a creamery; on 24th April he was with his father at 10 o'clock at Tourmaline; it was a fine day, and he was in a hurry to go to work; he was on his way to a hawking field for about three-quarters of an hour; his boot was hurting him and he went into a labourer's cottage and took a walk out of his boot; he was about to leave the cottage when he heard that the lorry ran into a trench on the road; witness ran after five others, who were running before him; witness stopped down by the side of the lane, as he thought he was being fired at; he saw three soldiers leading to Knocknadsike for about half a mile, and then turned into another lane, where he saw a man running; when he got about 500 yards from the cottage he saw three soldiers coming on the hill; he was running from the lane on to a field, where there was a fence; the soldiers were fired at him, and he went up and put up his hands, and went down the field to where the three soldiers were; he was arrested and the soldiers were found on him; he had not the documents mentioned, and never saw them until they were produced in court; the documents found on him he got in a trench which was on the road a few days before; he kept them for curiosity; he is not a fighting man, and does not favour violence, and never belonged to any political association of any kind; he met five or six men when he came out of the hawking field, but he was not afraid to give their names to the court; at the time witness was in the field there was another man running up by the fence, about three yards away. Cross-examined by Prosecutor—He knows it is a crime to be in possession of arms, but did not know it was illegal to have redoubt documents; he did not know that he was a member of the 2nd West Limerick Brigade of the I.R.A.; he was afraid to give the names of the I.R.A.; he met for fear they should be arrested; he started to run for fear they would think he was a soldier, or that he would get beaten; the man who was three yards away from him when he put up his hands was a man, and he had been standing in the cottage very previously. The Prosecutor addressed the court briefly, and submitted that the statement of the accused was not true, and that the court was highly improbable one. He submitted that the prosecution has proved its case conclusively, and that the guilt of the prisoner was established. Mr Kelly then addressed the court, and reviewed the evidence as laid out. He submitted that it was not being definitely established that he was in possession of the arms and ammunition. The character of the accused was not a good character, and he was a member of the I.R.A.; he was a member of the I.R.A.; he was not a fighting man, and does not favour violence; he was not a member of any political association of any kind; he met five or six men when he came out of the hawking field, but he was not afraid to give their names to the court; at the time witness was in the field there was another man running up by the fence, about three yards away.
