





Owing to the large number of seeds produce: by a single plant, and the extraordicary site. ' lisy of the seed, which may remain buried in the ground for years without losing its garmi nating power-experiments with seeds of char-- look barled in she soll have shown that these retain their vitality to the ground for twenty years at least- it is most important that serd log should be checked as far as possible. Harrowing corn in the early stages of growth, when the land is dry, and the weeds are in the seedling stage is beneficial, and if the number of plants is small, hand pulling may also be resorted to; but in a badly intested Mand, spraying is the most effective remedy.

The spraying mixture recommended by the Department is a 3 per cent solution made by dissolving 12:bs copper sniphate to 40 gallens of water; and the quantity to be applied, from 50 to 70 gallons per statute sore, accorning to the stage of development and prevalence of the weed, "A 4 per cont solution, that 19, 16,05 copper sniphate to 40 gallans of water has. says the Department's let fiel on the subject. "been used with equally good results, but the stronger solation does not appear to poseuse any marked advantage as compared with the 3 per cent solution. Where a given weight of c:p per sulphate is used per acre batter results are usually obtained from the application of a 3 per cent solution than from a smaller quantity of a 4 per cent solution." In experiments estried out in Northamptonshire last year it was found that "the more water used par acre (even without increasing the quantity of copper sulphate) the better the distribution and the more effective the results." This would seem to indicate that a solution weaker than 3 -per ceat may be efficacious, and the conclusion is, to a certain extent, a configmation of earlier English experimente, wherein somewhat better reanits were got by dressing an acre with 16.bs of copper salphate dissolved in 60 gallons of water, or with a g per cent solution. As to the best time to spray there is a differance of opinion. Is was found, for example, in the Northamptonshirs experiments that spraying when the sharlook was in flower was more effective than earlier spraying. This is not in complete accord with Irish experimensai work, which, "Is may be added, has been confirmed in Scotland and even in some earlier experiments carried out in Eog land. Although the weed can be killed by spraying even when in flowerr, the Department are of opinion that it is much better to spray In the early stages of growth before the weed has had time to injure the corn crops. In a leeflet issued by the Scottish Board of Agricolure is is stated that to be encoustai. "spraying must be done in time. The dressing should be given while the Charlock plants are still in the rongh leaf and before the stem begins to grow weedy, previous to flower-bad formation," Dr Brenchley, of the Rothamstend Experimental Station, writing in the March 1919 Journal of the Ministry of Agriculture gave it as her opinion shat "the spray is best spplied when the leaves have three or four well-developed leaves, though later applications are often effective, The writer naw a farm at Gedling, Nous, In which chaclock had been successfully sprayed when in full flower, but this delay is not to he recommended." The weight of opinion is. therefore, on the side of the cenclusions reached in the Irish experimental work-that is is better to spray oven crops sarly. Fiax should be sprayed when the crop is about 3 or 4 inches bigh. The Scuttish authority quoted tenders the following advice as to the atmospherie and other conditions desirable when applying the spray :- "It is accless to spray in wes weacher as the rain washes of the solution before is takes effect." The Norshamptonshire, experimente would appear to show that spraying is I work saccessial whether the operation is carried out in wes or dry weather. "It is inadvisable," , the Scottish advice proceeds, "to sursy in bright sunshine as the aireos heat dries up that in equilibrium -- no longer recte on the heatsolution too quickly, esusing a concentration of the spray in spous and only took! destruction of the tissues. Spraying must be done unles and preferably conless weather in order to ensure a downward 78:1 of the spray directly on the expanded lear of tao weed, and hardly at all on the apright leaves of the corn." In connection with the latter point it should be monsioned that the immediate effect of spraying on the corn is to surp the leaves brown, but the plants quickly recover, and no permanent lojory need be apprehended. In the "later spraying "experiments in Northemptonahire it was observed that the corn was slightly more damaged that when the charlook was oprayed before flowering, but in no case way the crop permanautly injured ; such damage as occurred was only temporary.

In s village in Hersfordshire, within a few miles of Berghamstead, it is impossible so get a drop of milk. About 100 villagers depend for their milk on a cow belonging to a market gardener. Three weeks ago she cow falled to give milk. Negotations were opened with a farm a faw miles away, and another cow was "borrowed." The village had milk for three days, but now the substitute cow, for no svident reason, has stopped supplying mix-sugaging in a sort of sympathetic strike-and the villagers are without supplies.
