





Every sp proved dip is in a packes or vessel bearing label indicating that the use of the dip in certain proportions has been approved by the Department for the purposes of their Orders relating to Sheep Seab and Sheep D poing, and containing directions (which should be carefully followed) as to the preparation of the dipping bath. 




