Limerick Good Literature Guild

The Catholic Literature Service Guild in Limerick is carrying on an admirable mission in a manner worthy of the highest commendation.

Weak by weak it is pursuing the glorious work of disseminating and propagating golden truths, and in thus providing a splendid antidote to the printed poison that has been so industrially and sedulously sowing its way into Irish life for years past.

By bringing good wholesome and ennobling papers and magazines before the local reading public Sunday after Sunday, as they are doing, those engaged in the great movement are discharging a function that is valuable beyond all price and importance, doubtless, above all merely human calculations.

Appallingly grave injury was, and even still is, being done by the dissemination of those prints that in their varying degrees of infamy and immorality may be described simply as so many agencies of hell.

To combat the havoc wrought by such degrading and demoralising influences is an object meriting not only the sympathy and approval but the practical encouragement and support of all decent and clean-minded people.

The printed word has inevitably a big influence for good or evil, and any organized effort to supplant the base by what is pure and exalted to improve, deserves and has a legitimate claim to all the help and co-operation it can get.

For these reasons we can again—as we have done on more than one occasion already—heartily commend the work of the Catholic Literature Service Guild in Limerick.

The Guild was established about a year ago, and has done truly great and eminently useful work since. It issues a list of periodicals, weeklies and quarterlies, and the publications ordered are delivered by boys formed into a Boys' Guild for the purpose.

The whole scheme is under the control of the members of the Society of St Vincent de Paul, and is conducted and directed from the Society's headquarters, O'Connell House, Hartington-street.

The City of Limerick, for the purpose of the distributing of periodicals, says a reference to the matter in the current issue of the Dublin "Leader," is divided into about thirty districts, each district being in charge of two or three boys, who canvass for orders for periodicals. The subscriber signs an order form for each paper as he wants. These orders are registered in O'Connell House. The boys come for their supplies on Friday and Saturday evenings, and some of the boys at other times by arrangement.

The Catholic Literature Service Guild, goes on our contemporary, "has had to surmount many difficulties, and recently many improvements have been made in the working of it, and sales have been showing weekly a steady average increase. So far in its history this Limerick Guild has been instrumental in selling periodicals suitable for Irish Catholic readers to the value of over £700. That is a very good result for what might be called a trial effort. The work is going ahead, and even far better results will have been achieved during the current year."

To be able to note such progress in a splendid movement is decidedly pleasing and inspiring. The directors and workers of the Guild deserve both congratulation and praise for their laudable and fruitful efforts and the general public should show their respect, appreciation of the services being rendered by giving the movement more active encouragement and support for the future than they have been giving up to the present.

MAYOR OF LIMERICK AT PRESENT IN NEW YORK. The following was given to the Press on Saturday for publication:—The Mayor arrived in New York to-day (Saturday).

CITY DROWNING TRAGEDY. Rescue of Police Constable. Jeremiah O'Connell, a youth from the Bohernabreena district, bathing on Friday evening in a party of Bohernabreena, got into difficulties while in the water, when it is stated, to have been rescued by a police constable.

Rescue of a Police Constable. Some four police constables were bathing in the quarry in which O'Connell lost his life on Friday evening, when one of them was seen to be in danger. A comrade made an endeavour to render assistance, but did not succeed.

LIMERICK SHOOTING. Constable and Soldiers Wounded. A party of police, proceeding by motor through the city after O'Connell's (10 o'clock) on Saturday night to see that the regulations were observed and the people were within doors, was fired at in the Pennywell district.

SENTENCE ON ENNIS PRISONER. Chief Secretary's Assurance. In the House of Commons on Thursday, Mr T P O'Connor asked if the Government would give an assurance that in the case of John Joseph Egan, of Ennis, Co. Clare, who had been sentenced to death, and for whom a writ of habeas corpus had been granted, the sentence would not be carried out until the proceedings before the judge who granted the writ had been completed.

LIMERICK JUNCTION RAID. Military Stores Burned and Mails Seized. On Friday morning, at 11.15, the Limerick Junction Railway Station was held up by masked and armed men, who seized the military stores and burned them. They also seized the mails and destroyed the railway station.

TEACHERS' FATE. Dead Body Found With Label. The Press Association states that the body of Patrick Darcy, 27, school teacher, who disappeared the previous night, was found at Doonbeg, Co. Clare, on Friday.

ST MUNCHIN'S NEW CHURCH. The Strike of Stonecutters. At the early Mass in St Munchin's Church yesterday, Canon O'Driscoll referred to the strike of the stonecutters engaged in drawing stones for the church, and expressed his regret that these men had gone on strike without notice and without giving the Conciliatory Board an opportunity of settling the dispute.

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

Crop and Live Stock CONDITIONS ON 1st JUNE

The weather during May (says the Department) showed considerable variation in temperature, but the rainfall was very much above the normal average. The conditions for the planting of potatoes and for the sowing of mangals and turnips were severe on corn crops and grass lands which suffered from drought and made very little growth. A heavy frost on the 20th of May did serious damage to early potatoes in many districts, and frosts also occurred on the nights of the 11th and 12th. The slight rains which fell during the last three days of the month proved very helpful, but the crops were not yet sufficiently advanced to be safe from a return of frost. Pastures made little improvement until benefited by the recent rains. The grass is stated to be unusually backward for the season; in most counties grass is not coming up so well as in previous years. The means of overstocking ceased through the export restrictions. Generally, stock was in good forward condition, though from Co. Lond. it is reported that owing to the drought of pasture the cattle are in a poor state of condition. CLARE MAN CHARGED WITH SOLICITING AMMUNITION

Trial Before Limerick Court-martial

As the New Barracks, Limerick, on Thursday, before a Field General Court-martial, Thomas Woulfe, Enlistment, was charged under 43 A. of the R.O.I. with soliciting soldiers to sell ammunition as Enlistment on the 13th May. Mr. J. Lynch, solicitor, Ennis, represented the accused, who pleaded not guilty.

A military witness states that on the 13th May, at 7.30 a.m., while walking through Enlistment with another soldier he met the accused, who asked him where he could get a drink; they went into a public-house, where they had a drink, and then went into another public-house; there they saw another witness, who it is stated he could not see; he said he would give £1 for every 50 rounds he would get; they left the house together, and at half past ten the same night witness saw the accused with another soldier in a public-house; he saw the accused next morning to his officer, and two days later prisoner was arrested in his own house.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To "freshen" salt fish, soak in sour milk. To remove grease from glass rub with hot vinegar. To remove the smell of paraffin from a plate or dish use vinegar. For setting a rabbit-trap use bread soaked in linseed oil. Bait ammonia reeds lined with oil. To restore the gloss to enamel, use borax-water in washing. To soften hands after washing with soap and water, rub with oatmeal while still wet. A morsel of sugar dipped in vinegar and placed in the mouth stops hiccoughs. Considerable time may be saved in cooking hard-boiled beans if a pinch of soda is added to the water in which they are soaked. To prevent water from collecting at the bottom of the vegetable dish, place a piece of stale bread in the dish. This will soak up all the moisture. To renovate green vegetable blinds dust thoroughly, wipe over with a damp cloth, dry, and rub with linseed oil. Before washing new silk gloves for the first time it is a good plan to warm them before the fire. When making jam if the fruit is allowed to boil for 10 minutes before the sugar is added only about half the quantity of sugar will be required. The swap never visits you if you burn a little saltpetre in your grate occasionally. The flames will free the chimney from soot. To preserve cheese, wrap a cloth out in vinegar and wrap round the cheese. All cabbage water to cool, then pour on the ground. It is an excellent fertilizer for fruit and flowers. A pot of boiling water should be placed over the kitchen sink every week to prevent its becoming stopped. An ounce of alum added to the rinsing water or to the starch will render muslin or cotton goods most agreeable. If the wine ends come off your shoes laces dip the ends in hot sealing wax and squeeze quickly. Old broom handles make good curtain poles, carps baskets, cloth hangers, and garden dibblers. Old shoes, rubbers, and hot water bags are useful for making wheelbarrow pumps and water can handles. The material is placed on the metal to be fixed, and pranced with a hammer until it is cut through. To clean rusty curtain pins, let them stand for a few minutes in a cupful of water to which a little ammonia has been added. Then take them out and rub them well, and they will look like new again. A hard, old paint brush can be rejuvenated by dipping the bristles in turpentine, then dipping in the material to be fixed, and pranced with a hammer until it is cut through. You can make a good water-pump cover by giving two or three coats of paint to a sheet of canvas or falling cloth, ordinary cloth. A small onion skin fire resting will often induce sleep. The taste may be removed after eating by chewing a bit of parsley. To avoid breaking the plaster of your wall when you drive in nails, first dip the nails into cold water until they are thoroughly soaked. When an egg has cracked, the contents may be kept in the shell by bricking it with moistened soil over the crack and allowing it to penture. The egg can then be boiled as successfully as any uncracked one. This is a simple remedy for clearing the voice. Grated orange and enough lemon juice to dampen the sugar thoroughly. Take a teaspoonful every hour until the voice improves. One often puts too much salt in food while cooking. To remove salt, place a wet cloth over the top of the vessel in which the food is cooking, and the steam will draw the salt into the wet cloth. Citrus fruits may be kept fresh for a long time by placing them in a glass jar, with holes in the jar and with a few leaves of paper. Discard 10 lbs of salt in one gallon of hot water. Soak your colored garments in this till the water becomes cold, and the colors will not fade. Iron the garments on the wring-side, and wash as from a new one. Never dried worn typewriter ribbons. One ribbon used for 24 hours in two gallons of water will produce that quantity of superior ink, violet, red, or black as the user may wish. The ink flows beautifully, does not fade, and won't corrode the nib. The best manure used is made by putting a teaspoonful of lemon juice in half a cupful of hot water. It removes stains from the fingers and nails and softens the outside about the nails in a satisfactory way. The objectionable smell of fish which so often persists in clinging to dishes, after they are washed, may easily be removed if the dishes are put in hot soapy water, to which has been added about a teaspoonful of household ammonia. Never darn knitted underwear with wool. It will shrink and make a whole larger than the original one. Use instead loosely-twisted knitting yarn. When washed the new texture will most closely resemble the knitted material. Cleaning a Lamp The small part of the lamp, the burner that holds the wick, etc., should be boiled in hot water and soda once a month. Wipe the other parts of the lamp over with soft cloths. Washing Velveteen A child's velveteen coat (or frock) may easily be washed in the following way:—Make a good tub of soap, allow the coat to get quite warm, and then wash with the coat in this water, and wring it out as dry as you can in the sun. Do not wring or squeeze the article, but place on a soap-hanger and dry it in the sun. A Burnt Saucepan Never use soda for a burnt saucepan, because if you do it will burn again. Wash with water to which a good quantity of salt has been added, and leave it to soak for twenty-four hours. Then boil the water, and the burnt portion will come off quite easily. Home-Made Silver Polish Mix together a half pound of powdered whiting, two ounces of yellow soap, a pint and a half of boiling water and a quart of a pint of ammonia. Place in a bottle and cork. Before using, shake the bottle well. Apply the polish to the metal with a brush, or dry, then polish with a leather or soft cloth. To Brighten a Shabby Carpet Dissolve a small lump of soda in a pint of hot water. It is a good wash for carpets, and will take away all the dirt and grime.

IRISH PLOTHOLDERS AND FIXITY OF TENURE

At a meeting of the Council of the United Irish Plott holders' Union held in the Lord Mayor's Court, William Reid, Dublin, the President (Mr. Thomas Shaw) in the chair, the report of the committee appointed to consider the question of the continuance of allotment areas at the close of the current year was submitted. They recognized that the Union's fight for fixity of tenure must have round the areas at present being given to the Government Department. They had addressed a circular to those areas suggesting that the owners be approached to see if they would deal directly with the tenants, and on what terms. The reply was in the negative, and the Council decided that the committee should be asked to revise a deposition. As to the voluntarily acquired areas, which are either Corporation property or have been rented or leased by that body for allotments, the Council suggested that a deposition should be taken from the Corporation with a view to securing the interests of economy and good management of the local branches of the Union should administer the areas, the Corporation collecting the rents and providing the necessary cards.

COOKERY NOTES

Useful Hints and Recipes

Flaky Pie-Crusts

Before stirring a pie for pie crust add one level teaspoonful of bicarbonate of soda to every cup of flour. You will find that a great deal in making tender flaky crusts.

Cheese Tea Cakes

Three level teaspoonsful butter or dripping, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 level teaspoonful baking powder, 1 egg, 2 cups flour, 1 cup milk, and a little vanilla. Bake for three-quarters of an hour.

Plain Queen Cakes

Two eggs, half cup sugar, 1 tablespoonful butter, 1 level teaspoonful baking powder, 1 level teaspoonful salt, 1 cup currants, essence of lemon. Bake in buttered paper cups, good oven.

Fig Pudding

Take one pound of dried figs, chop them finely, and mix with a pound of bread crumbs, also finely chopped, six ounces of brown crumbs, the grated rind of a lemon, a little rum, and a little vanilla. Make a milk to make it of the right consistency. Put into a greased mould, sit down, and steam for three or four hours.

Potato and Egg Salad

Of washed potato and cold boiled eggs are used for this salad. If radishes are available, place some of the leaves on the salad dish, upon which the potatoes and the eggs are to be served. Dress with oil, vinegar, and salt. Beat a little milk and add to the dressing, using plenty of it. This should not be prepared until time to serve.

Celery Sandwiches

Chop celery, white sauce of celery very fine and mix with butter. The salad dressing was mentioned in the foregoing and spread between your sandwiches. These are particularly appetizing for travelling lunches as they keep nicely so long.

Rhubarb Dessert

Sew one pound of rhubarb in just enough water to keep it from burning. Sweeten to taste and when the rhubarb is tender rub it through a sieve. Leave to become quite cold, then add one cupful and a half of milk. Mix thoroughly and serve in thick custard cups.

Sandwich Cake

Brown Potato Soup

Heat one tablespoonful of butter and onion in a pan; add one cup of potatoes, one cup of carrots, one cup of celery, one cup of onion, one cup of carrot, one cup of celery, one cup of onion. Put in a floured cloth which has been wrung out of boiling water, plunge into boiling water, and cook for about a half hour. Serve with sweet sauce flavoured with lemon.

Gauliflower Scalloped with Cheese

Boil the cauliflower as usual, then remove the core and break the pieces into small pieces. Put in a baking dish in layers with white sauce and ground cheese. Press a mixture of butter and cheese on top and bake for 30 minutes.

Sausage Pudding

Take half a pound of pork sausage; chop up the potatoes and put both the sausages. Mix the sausages, slice the potatoes, and chop the onion. Mix the sausages and onion together, and add the butter and cheese. Bake for 30 minutes.

Imitation Gingerbread

Take one pound of self-raising flour, a quarter of a pound of dripping, one egg, one cup of sugar, one cup of milk, one cup of water, one cup of salt, one cup of pepper, one cup of onion.
