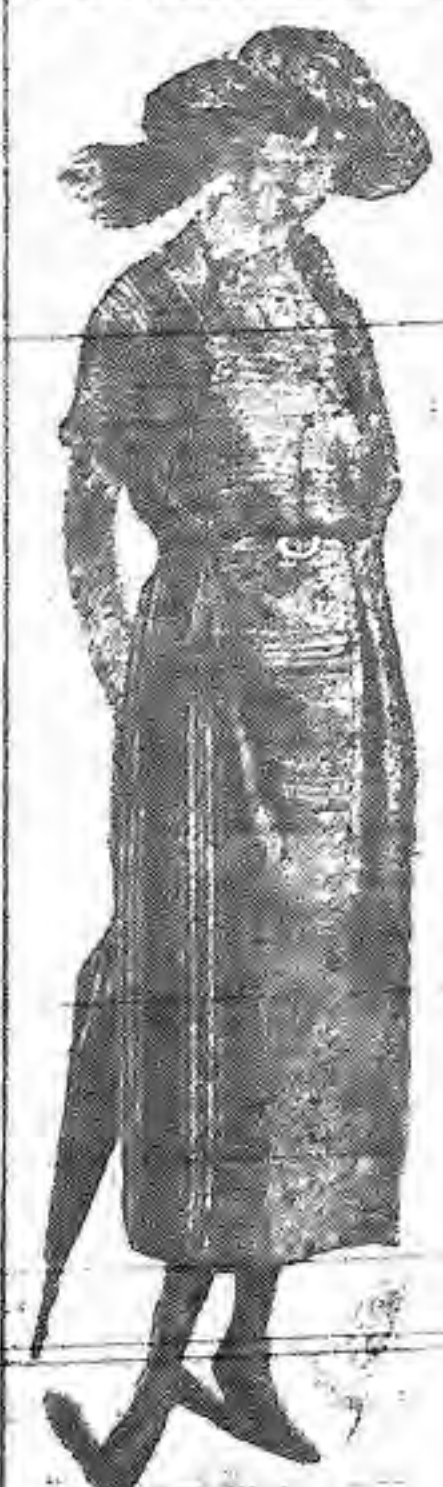

### THE WHITE CROSS SEQUEL TO COLLECTION

#### Six Charged at Military Court

At a military court at Tipperary on Friday, June 25, in continuation of the proceedings of the Military Governor, forbidding collections for any purpose in a public place without lawful authority. The collection in question was in aid of the White Cross Association.

Mr John O'Dwyer (assisted by Mr John O'Dwyer, solicitor) was for the defence. A preliminary objection by counsel as to the jurisdiction of the court was overruled.

Police witnesses stated that defendants took part in a collection inside the church railings at two Masses.

A military witness produced a copy of the proclamation which was received officially by witnesses from the Military Governor or his representative, and ordered by him to be posted in the South Riding of Tipperary.

Cross-examined, witnesses said he received the document by official aeroplane mail.

Did you ever see the original proclamation of which this purports to be a copy?

After arguments, the President raised witnesses need not answer the question.

Mr O'Dwyer said he would not deny the defendant's participation in the collection. He contended no legal evidence had been given to prove the proclamation was ever issued by General Strickland. Anybody could print a proclamation and put General Strickland's name to it, but without the sanction of the Military Governor, such a proclamation was wholly invalid. The collection was made in the church yard, which was private property, held under lease and devised to the Parish Priest. The church yard was separated from the public street by a high railing, the gate of which was locked from time to time. Counsel handed to the court a prospectus of the Irish White Cross Association to which the names of Catholic and Protestant bishops and Jewish rabbis were attached. He also referred to the Association which was to relieve distress.

A clergyman produced Archbishop Hurley's letter to the clergy, directing a collection to be held throughout the Archdiocese of Cashel and Emly, 29th May, that a collection would be held on the Sunday following. The collection was held inside the public porch; the gates of which were always locked at night, and were also closed during the day time on occasions of clerical conferences in the church.

Prosecutor cross-examined witnesses as to why the collection was not held inside the church.

Witnesses referred to the Archbishop's letter on the matter; collections for religious purposes had been held in the church porch; religious collections were held every Sunday in the church, to which the people paid as they passed to their seats.

Why was not this collection held in the Church? I cannot say; I cannot go beyond the Archbishop's letter; usually the collections are made in the church porch, but I remember distinctly collections for non-political and non-religious purposes, such as the promotion of the Irish language, being held outside the church. I think the idea was that by holding the collection outside it appealed more publicly to persons entering the church than if held in the church porch.

Prosecutor—The idea was to hold a collection in a public place.

Witness—No; I don't think so.

The decision of the court will be duly announced.

#### DEATH OF MR. D. O'NEILL, GLENSTAL

It is with feelings of regret that we report the death of Mr Daniel O'Neill of Glenstal, who passed to his eternal reward at the advanced age of 87 years. The greater part of his long and happy career was spent in the Barrington estate, where he acted as the capacity of head ramskeeper under the dual ownerships of the late Sir Cooper Barrington and that of the present popular employer, Sir Charles Barrington, and during this long period the deceased old veteran won the admiration of all, rich and poor alike—because of his cheerful disposition, the happy spirit of a content and untroubled mind, possessing a possible degree of strength and health, he worked unceasingly at his duties almost up to his death, and his love for the hills and dales of his native county gave him a vim and an activity which rarely stood to him in the end. His memory was the faithful repository of remarks, shrewd, sensible, and ingenious, which he had made during a long course of years. Fortified by the rites of the Catholic Church, of which he was a solid and staunch member, he passed away after a brief illness of two weeks, and, like the angels of the name he bore, passed to render an account of his earthly stewardship. He remains rested in the Marree Parish Church for one night, and on the morning of the 23rd of June, he was buried in the High Mass were duly celebrated, the Right Rev Monsignor Duggan officiating, assisted by the Rev celebrants—Fathers Godfrey, Murree, O'Callaghan, Cappamore, and Duggan, Newport. After High Mass the remains were taken for interment to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, Limerick, where they were committed to the soil, the cortege testifying to the popularity of the deceased.

#### GOVERNMENT AND WHEAT GROWERS

In connection with the arrangements made to ensure the fulfilment of the August 1926, next of the Government's undertaking to growers of wheat of the 1930 crop, the Ministry of Agriculture announced that the Royal Commission on Wheat Supplies calculated that the cost of wheat imported during April, May and June is equivalent to 2 1/2 per quarter of 504lbs for home-grown wheat of sound milling quality. For the month of July, therefore the average price properly receivable by growers will be 2 1/2 per 504lbs. Taking into account the value of imported wheat of comparable quality on the open market, the amount of interest payable to millers by the Board of Trade a respect of home-grown wheat ground during the month of July will not be less than 62 per quarter of 504 lbs.

#### MECHANICAL STREET CLEANER

The great throng of people leaving from Victoria Station, on Friday morning, on their daily pilgrimage to business, in the London correspondent of the "Illustrated" was started by a large green monster slowly moving along the street licking up the dust and dirt from the gutter, and humming to itself as it went. It was a recently invented machine. To those who had the curiosity to approach near enough to satisfy their curiosity as to the species of this formidable-looking creature, it revealed itself as a new type of mechanical street cleaner acquired by the City of Westminster. The machine was set off to clean the street, and the driver was seen to be working the machine. By means of a spray of water the refuse is turned into a sludge which is forced into a receptacle by a thick brush set at the rear, and carried to the curb. The machine is a highly efficient development in the art of mechanical engineering.
