I write, therefore, to convey the following invitation to you, as the chosen leader of the great majority in Southern Ireland, and to Sir James Oraig, the Premier of Northern Ireland :-

House of Lords Decision In the House of Lords on Friday, Viscounts Finlay and Oave and Lords Atkinson, Sumner. and Phillimore unanimously dismissed the appeal of Lieus-Col W Edgeworth Johnstone, the Chief Commissioner of the Dubiln Metropolitan Police, against whom the Irish Court of Appeal, reversing a decision of the King's Bench Division, gave judgment for the return of £124 and a cheque for £4 153 6d selasd from Wm Pedlar on his acress for illegal drilling in Dubifn in May, 1918. 

LITTLE BOY KILLED

An. Eanls massage says :- A sensational seese, with unfortunate fatal consectences. was spaced on Friday afternoon in Ranis. About half-past three a constable rushed through O'Connell street apparently in parsuit of a young man, as whom he fired ravolver shote. The man fall and the constable reterned in the direction whence he had some, and was then seen in pursuits of another man through Market street, whom be also shot and then shots fired struck Miss Hewits and a shild five years old named Pat Merrissey, who died on the way to the Infirmary.

The first man was attended by Dr Mac-Makon in Coghian's Medical Hall, O'Connell street, and was found to have wounds in the upper part of the thigh. Hie name is F Kease, Klinsmons. The second man, named Fas O'Keeffe, of the same place, is a sonsin to Keane and has a wound through she body, which is believed dangerous. 



In experiments carried out in Co Cavan lass year the yield of sound tubers from a plot sprayed with a 2 per cent mixture was only 4 ows per statute acre greater than that sprayed with a 14 per cent mixture, and only 14 ows per stauge nore more than from that sprayed with a 1 per cant mixture. 
