## FORAGE CROPS FOR SHEEP

ARTICLE BY PROFESSOR WIBBERLEY

It has been definitely proved, not once but thrice, that the average yield of Professor Wibberley in the "Oxk Experiment" has by pasturing ewes on green forage crops about a fortnight before they are mated, the number of lambs in the following season can be increased from 25 to 50 per cent. It has also been proved—in fact this matter is so well established—that a supply of green feed in spring is not only profitable, but the milk flow is very much increased, and in consequence the lambs thrive much better, and it is generally of green food is available for ewes and lambs in spring and early autumn that the best results are obtained. It is a well-known fact that the price of lambs in the following August is some hoggets.

Important as the above facts are, it is not to be forgotten that the best results are obtained when the ewes are mated in a very bad condition. With sheep, for instance, these are generally mated on poor land, and the pasture land, who in turn will sell them for further grazing on good class pasture. Similarly, small farmers raise calves which are sold to the butchers as "winters" on second class pastures; then, next, they are sold to the grazier and districts, and finally about 25 per cent are returned off on the very best pastures, and the remaining 75 per cent shipped to England or Scotland to be fattened. In short, the livestock trade of Ireland or those engaged in it may be likened to a community making a living by taking in each other's washing.

All this could be altered by converting a good deal of third-rate pasture land into tillage and growing forage crops thereon. As regards the ewe trade in England the finest of British soil is fastened on the poorest class of English soil—the Down lands of Wiltshire, Oxford and Buckinghamshire. These Down lands, if left to grass, would feed one sheep on 3 acres and would fatten a sheep on 10 acres. The Down land farmer has been growing crops and feeding all their crops where grown by sheep. I have just spent a very pleasant week-end with one of my clients in Wiltshire. This gentleman has under the plough 3,000 acres of land and mows annually between 100 and 150 tons of hay, and has 4,000 sheep. Owing to a few years ago, when most of his land was in what by courtesy was called grass, the land would only carry as the most a flock of 2,000. On the best field the soil is not more than 4 inches deep, and at that consists chiefly of fine sandstone. Practically the whole of the land is covered with a layer of manure which is carried on the land at all; the sheep are as walking manure carts, and keep the land in a fine state of fertility. The sheep are penned with nesting on the crops, 100 being allowed to 2 acres as a limit. The sheep-frog system of sheep raising as described in my books, having been put into operation, it is possible to do all these things just as well in Ireland—may, even better—for the damp climate of Ireland compared with England is distinctly in favour of forage crops.

Of course, I do not ever hope to see a 3,000-acre forage crop farm in Ireland, for the fact is that the average Irish farmer has the land he does with it. Probably I shall live to see the day when all this will be altered. People will not for ever agree to a policy of grass fed bullocks being sent to the Continent as an emigrant ship. To quote one of our Irish friends, though, Mr. Eady, the general and publishing secretary of the Oxk Farmers' Assoc. has last summer sowed rape and Italian ryegrass on a piece of land more or less derelict. He had splendid feeding in early winter, and after rearing the crop over winter, he gave the land a little nitrogenous manure in early March, with the result that he had green feeding for sheep six weeks ahead of his neighbours. One of my pupils, Mr. Harold Barry, of Brixton, put into practice the scientific teaching he acquired at the University College, and in consequence he had green feeding for his father's sheep from the 1st of November to the 1st of May. I visited this farm on Patrick's Day last, and at that time they had a plot of early greens 3 feet high. This crop was sown down with the sheep and lambs, and then allowed to go to seed. In addition, Mr. Barry sowed both autumn and spring vetch mixtures, and in consequence all through the prolonged drought he had a green crop for his dairy cattle and dry stock. Another client, Colonel Gibson, of Sligo, Co. Wexford, consulted me last year regarding the cropping of an outlying field, which was then carrying a crop of winter oats. I recommended the sowing of hardy greens. This was done early in September, and matured with artificial manure and alone. On the 1st of March of the present year the crop was a yard high, and was carrying 200 score pigs, 40 bullocks, and, later, a number of sheep. This he continues to feed until towards the end of May, the pigs receiving from 2 to 3 lbs. of dry meal per pig per day, and at the end of the feeding period, most of the pigs were thick fat. Needless to say, the progress of the crops and stock was watched with the keenest interest by all neighbouring farmers. As to suitable crops for sheep I will deal with these in my next article.

## TO KEEP FIT

### After Age of 45

A bath, cold if you please, hot if you must with a good rub, twice the day right. If you will save your smoke still after luncheon you'll never have smoker's heart.

Wearing the same weight undereclothing the year round will save you a lot of colds. Dress cool when you walk and warm when you ride. Your nose, not your mouth, was given to you to breathe through. Don't sit still with wet feet. Walk until you have a chance to change. Never let a day pass without covering four miles on foot. See how high you can hold your head and how deeply you can breathe whenever you get out of doors. Getting mad makes black marks on the health.

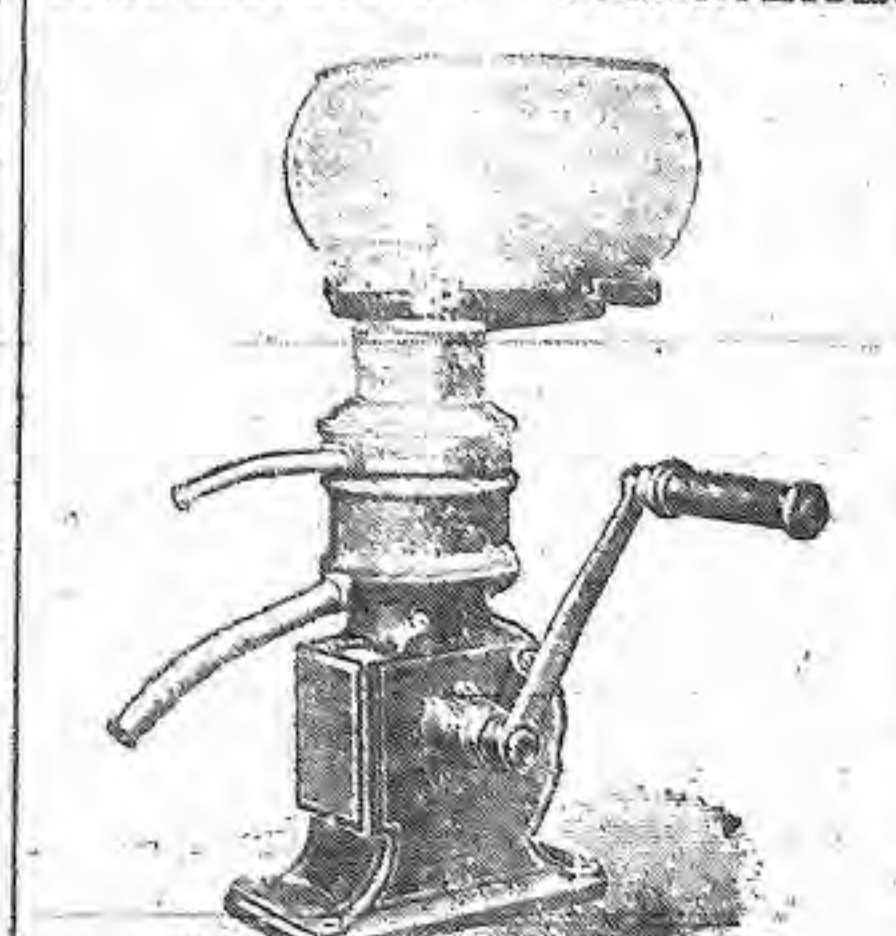
Instead of London Costumes

### BURNING AT EMLY

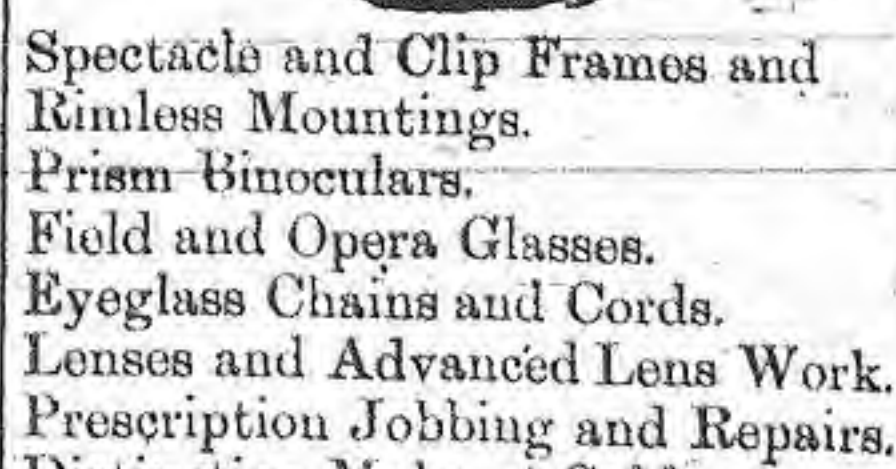

HOUSING ACT, 1921

This Act affects important amendments in the Housing (Additional Powers) Act, 1919, under which free grants were made to private persons for erecting houses in municipal areas in Ireland between the 28th December, 1919, and the 23rd April last.

The Housing Act, which received the Royal assent on the 1st instant, extends the time for completing houses up to the 31st June, 1922, or, with the approval of the Local Government Board, in special cases, to the 31st October, 1922.

The system of grants is also extended to rural areas immediately adjoining municipal areas. Applications for certificates in respect of any houses in rural areas, which will probably be one and a half years in progress, should be made to the Local Authority of the nearest municipal area.

Grants already commenced either in a municipal area or in a rural area may be continued under the conditions already prescribed by the Board for the purposes of the Housing (Additional Powers) Act, 1919, but houses not commenced before the 1st July, 1921, can only qualify for grants by compliance with the regulations, which will shortly be issued under this Act.

Applications for grants may be addressed to municipal authorities or the Housing Department, Local Government Board, 30, Lower Fitzwilliam Street, Dublin.

Section 1-(1) Sub-section (2) of Section 1 of the Housing (Additional Powers) Act, 1919 (which prescribes the conditions of grants) shall be made to persons constructing houses, and shall be deemed always to have had effect, as though two years and six months were therein substituted for 12 months.

Provided that any certificate approving a proposal to construct houses issued before the commencement of this Act in pursuance of a scheme made under Sub-section (1) of the said section shall cease to have effect on the 1st day of July, 1921, so far as relates to any house, the construction of which has not been commenced before that date.

(2) Any conditions prescribed after the passing of this Act by the Minister of Health in this Act referred to as "the Minister" under paragraph (a) of the said sub-section (3) shall be prescribed by regulations made by the Minister, and any regulations made in pursuance of this Sub-section shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament as soon as may be after it is made, and if an address is presented by either House within 31 days on which that House has sat next after the regulation is laid before it, praying that the regulation be annulled, the Minister in Council may annul the regulation, but without prejudice to the validity of anything previously done thereunder.

Section 10.—This Act in its application to Ireland shall have effect, with the following modifications:— (1) References to the Minister of Health or the Minister shall be construed as references to the Local Government for Ireland, and the references to the Public Works Loans Commissioners shall be construed as references to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland.

(3) A certificate for the purposes of Sub-section (3) of Section 1 of the Housing (Additional Powers) Act, 1919, may be granted by a local authority within the meaning of Part III of the Housing (Additional Powers) Act, 1919, as respects a house situate within a municipal area, if it is situate within such district as may be specified in a scheme made under the said Section 1, and such scheme within the area of any other such local authority.

THE HOSPITAL SHOOTING

The remains of Constable O'F. H. R. G. who was fired at in Hospital on Tuesday, 19th, by a party of armed men, and who subsequently succumbed to his injuries, were removed from Kilmallock military hospital on Friday in a lorry to the railway station, and conveyed by train for interment in England.

CLARE TRAGEDY

Old Man Shot Dead

Thomas Russell, 75 years old, of Maurice's Mills, Clare, Co. Wex., was shot dead by a party of men on Wednesday. It is stated that the old man was walking up to a field and fell to do so.

It was mentioned that Dr. Morrissey was now carrying on the duties of Dr. Kelly, and apparently that another man, who had formerly been Dr. Kelly's assistant, was being paid by Dr. Kelly as well as his own. It was also stated that Dr. O'Dwyer, the Tipperary Dispensary Medical Officer, was in charge of the hospital, and that his duties were being discharged by Dr. O'Dwyer.

Dr. O'Dwyer said that there was no personal objection to Dr. O'Dwyer and if there was any other application when the time came he would be selected. The other applicants, if any, would also get due consideration.

Mr. O'Dwyer said the doctors could go to South Africa and elsewhere, but he would not be sending matters away by suggesting the appointment of Dr. O'Dwyer. One man was getting two pay at present and it would mean that another man would be getting two pay instead. If one man could do a job why should they pay for two?

Mr. O'Dwyer said the guardians were paying Dr. Morrissey two salaries at present and they were trying to get a reasonable doctor and at the same time to pay a superannuation allowance to the retired doctor. At the time Dr. Kelly was appointed over 800 people came under the care of his workhouse doctors, and surely he could not see why Dr. Morrissey could not look after the hospital of patients in the hospital now.

Mr. Morrissey asked how many patients were now in the hospital, and the master said there were 90 the previous night.

It was decided to allow matters to stand pending the appointment of a substitute to Dr. Kelly, which was adjourned for the present.

Restraint!

So momentous are the events which our country is now passing, and in which our undiminished honor and the peace of Great Britain is involved, it behooves us to be imbued with that love of duty which should be their privilege and right to observe the utmost decorum and self-restraint in all our words and actions.

Anything up to the time of going to Press the amiable and optimistic spirits which shed all shades of what were, until the last hour, distinctly opposed political views, and even in the course of a few hours (I trust) and calmly whirled up to a very high stage of excitement.

Nevertheless, there is an undercurrent of emotion which is natural from the recent past experiences, but we earnestly exhort parties to remember that it is not personal animosity that should prevail but the sentiment of individual so-called rights to devotion to commonweal.

As we are worthy of our great traditions, and as the world that we are the best entitled to give which has been so loosely used in the past, let us continue to act in that spirit of restraint which eliminates self-interest, and in the result of the assembly of the Irish people with those with whom the country is at issue, and show to the world that all our differences are of a temporary nature, and that we are, as a people, steadfast and loyal to the end.

KILMALLOCK SHOOTING

CONSTABLE FIRED AT

Residents Rounded Up

About half-past ten on Saturday morning (written on Kilmallock correspondent) Constable Bullock, R.I.C., was fired at in the streets, Kilmallock, near the premises of Messrs S. B. Walsh & Son. His assistants, who were undisciplined, fired three revolver shots in quick succession. At the time of the shooting there was a number of people in the town, and there was an immediate stampede in the streets.

FOURTEEN KILLED

AND OVER A HUNDRED WOUNDED

Terrible Belfast Disturbances

Fourteen people are reported killed and over 100 were wounded during disturbances in Belfast since midnight on Saturday. All day yesterday shooting and sniping proceeded in certain of the well-known danger spots, and one man, accompanied by his Catholic family, was shot dead, the occupants having to seek safety in flight.
