Mr E Shrapnell Smith, representing the Comercial Motor Users' Association, quoted the | Parliamant. resommendations of Mr Walter Lopg's Inter-Departmental Committee and the Departmental Committee appcinted by Sir Ecle Gedden to the effect that the present vehicle tax should render all users of motor vi hicks free of fuel taxation. He also quoted figures of running costs relating to the tests carried out on alcoher mintures by the London General Omnibus Company which showed that power alchol could not compete with patrol unless it were Imported like petrol free of import duty.

The Ohanoellor, in reply, stated that there had always been higher duties on imported alsohol than on alsohol produced within these islands on account of the Ruciss resulctions that impose a special burden upon home manu facture, and that he was not prepared to put the home producer in a worse position than the importer. He polited out that as the resait of the rebate of 31 the net duty on Empire entrits imported for power purposes would only amount to one peany or 2d per proof gallon. Referring to the particular preference that has been given to Empire spirit, and which is exercised by plasing an additional duty of 2s 6d upon foreign produced spirit, he was not in a position to say that the Government was prepared to go back on a clearly. declared policy with regard to preference to the Ropire.
