FACTS AND FANCIES.

THE GREAT MOTHER OF SMALLPOX.
Dr. Muller, of the Western Hospital, Philadelphia, who has spent many years in India, speaking of some of the curious superstitions of the Mohammedans, Hindus, and Brahmans with regard to fever, said that every epidemic has its own goddess, and each goddess has her own shrine. The goddess most feared, and reverence is that of small-pox, and she is addressed as the "Great Mother." Medical men often find, when wishing to shave the head of a patient, that his hair has been dedicated, and can only be removed at the shrine of the goddess herself.

THE BEES.
Few realise the enormous effect a single pound of honey reconstitutes on the part of the bees. In a pound there is the concentrated essence of over 2,000 flowers. It is calculated that to make a pound of clover honey the bees must take nectar from 2,000 blossoms and make it 2,000 times in the process. Often the journey from the hive to the flowers and back runs to two miles, so that the making of a pound of honey entails journeys aggregating over 5,000,000 miles. When it is remembered that a single colony of bees will produce from sixty to eighty pounds of honey in a season it is clear that the "busy bee" is well named.

AN ACTUAL LOTTERY.
Marriage lotteries are still in vogue during October in some parts of India. The names of both sexes eligible for marriage are written on slips of paper and put into separate earthenware jars. The jars are then shaken, one of each kind, and the fourth wheel which is drawn obtains a letter of introduction to the young woman whose name accompanies his, after which the marriage commences.

ORIGIN OF "HONEYMOON."
Whence the term "honeymoon" ? It was an ancient custom among the Scandinavian races to drink mead, or diluted honey, for thirty days after the wedding. In the Island of Rhodes honey is still a factor in the marriage rites. After the ceremony the husband dips a finger in honey and traces a cross over the doorway of his home before his bride enters, while the guests admonish the bride to "Be always sweet and good, as is this honey."

CAVE SHAPED LIKE AN EAR.
Near Syracuse, in Sicily, there is a famous cavern called the Ear of Dionysus. It is said to have been constructed by Dionysus, the Elder, a tyrant of Syracuse, and used by him as a prison. The cave is 250ft. long and 80ft. high, fashioned in the shape of a human ear, and was so constructed that the faintest sounds were conveyed from all parts to a central chamber, corresponding to the tympanum, or drum of the ear.

It is said that the tyrant executed himself there at times for days, and listened to the conversations of the unfortunate prisoners within. The men that built the dungeon were put to death to prevent them from divulging the use to which it was put. Workmen, while making excavations during recent years, have discovered pieces of iron and lead that are probably the remains of chains and staples used to hold the prisoners.

FISH AND THE ANCIENTS.
The ancient Romans thought very highly of fish, and at big banquets brilliant fish were shown to the guests, alive, as a relish, then were served cooked after the soup. Apicius offered a prize to any culinary artist who would invent a new marinade compounded of rivers of the red mullet. Lucullus had a canal cut through his garden so that fish might be transported more easily to the ponds in his gardens near Naples. Hortensius wept over the death of a pet trout, while the daughter of Drusus adorned a favourite fish with a collar of gold.

LAUNCHING A SHIP IN JAPAN.
When a ship is launched in Japan the ceremonies are begun with religious services. Then the ship is released in the usual way, but instead of cracking a bottle of champagne across her stem great quantities of cut flowers, usually chrysanthemums, and bouquets are scattered from a decorated globe suspended over the launching platform, the sponsor pulling a cord. The flowers fall about the launching party as the freed birds circle overhead.

ORIGIN OF COIN NAMES.
When we read that sterling has fallen in exchange value who knows the origin of the term? Yet it is traced to the inhabitants of the Hanau towns, known as Esteringi, who were invited by King John of England to come to England and reform the currency, which had become very corrupt. From that date good English money was derived from Moneta, one of the surnames of Juno, in whose temple the Romans first made coins. The word mint is supposed to be a contraction of the word Moneta through the Anglo-Saxon "mynt." The origin of a German origin, having been the thaler, or more fully Joachim's thaler, the silver coin struck out of the silver found in the thal or valley of St. Joachim, France. This was extremely pure, and being coined into ounces gave the real basis of the silver dollar, which should weigh an ounce. The cent meant a hundredth, the French word for hundred, and is the appropriate name for the coin, which is one-hundredth of a dollar. The quarter is easy, too.

WEDDING RINGS NOT UNIVERSAL.
The ring, having no end, has always been regarded as a token of unending love. The Jews used the wedding ring long before the Christian era. The husband put his signet ring, or a duplicate of it, to his bride, signifying that he shared with her his authority. Among the Egyptians a betrothal ring of iron was worn by both man and woman, signifying the mutual sacrifice of liberty. In Assyria used to circulate in ring form in Egypt in early times, and at marriage the Egyptian placed one of these pieces of ring money on his wife's finger, showing that he shared his wealth with her. The use of the wedding ring is almost universal, but in the country districts around Glaston no ring is used. After the ceremony the groom shifts the flowers in his wife's hair from left to right, for to wear a flower over the right ear is to proclaim one's self a wife.

MUMMY GRAIN WILL NOT GROW.
The stories about the germination of wheat and other cereals found wrapped with ancient Egyptian mummies are declared to be fictitious by the United States Department of Agriculture. French tests show that grain more than a few years old will not germinate. German tests indicate that when seeds are kept under ideal conditions, wheat, barley, and oats may germinate up to eight or ten years, but few, if any, grains are alive after twenty years.

SUITING THE GIFT TO THE FAVOUR.
Miss Kingley, in one of her travel-books, tells a story of an African trader who had saved the life of a native woman's husband. The woman shortly after brought him a present of a very skinny chicken. He (rather rudely) observed that this was not much of a token of gratitude for what he had done. The woman replied: "Sah, it is true that this chicken is no very good chicken, but that man who saved my life—"

A true soldierly spirit is being displayed by both sides in the honourable observance of the terms of the truce. The highest qualities of statesmanship are demanded of the protagonists in these negotiations. Only those who are actually engaged in the consultations know how they stand. All others should refrain from offering opinions until they have accurate information upon which to base them."

JUDGE'S INTERVENTION

SECURES ACQUITTAL
 When evidence was being given at Roscommon Assizes in a charge of manslaughter against James Dooley, Mr. Justice Wills stopped the case and directed the jury to acquit the prisoner. It was stated that Dolan and James Donnellan, the deceased, were at Athlone fair on May 10. A dispute arose over payments for labour, and later Donnellan assaulted Dolan in his home. The latter struck him on the head with a sweeping brush, and when the case was investigated by the police, Dolan was found dead on the floor on a stretcher from the fair. The accused's age, 18 years of age, was given evidence when the judge stopped the case, holding that he could not more force than was necessary to get out of his house a man who had assaulted him three times.
 The same jury also acquitted Patrick Dooley, of Oron, charged with the manslaughter of Thomas Ryan, a herd, on April 9. It appears that Dooley was employed as a shepherd in a shop in Roscommon. They were separated, but on the way home renewed the dispute, when Dooley knocked Ryan down. Ryan was carried home and died next day.
 Captain Lindsay, military doctor, who made an external examination of the deceased, gave it as his opinion that the deceased died from hemorrhage of the brain.

JAIL CONFLICT

FATALITIES FEARED
 Six prisoners in the Western Reformatory, Tipperary, on Monday, two others out, and numerous orders were given for a battle with 600 prisoners, detained there, mutilated, fought the guards, and set fire to a number of small wooden buildings, which were destroyed. The city police and firemen assisted in putting out the fire, which is said to be the result of a long period of discontent. Some of the prisoners were serving long term sentences. Many of them were desperate characters. The lives of several wounded prisoners are despaired of.
IMPORTATION EMBARGO
REGULATIONS RELAXED
 Owing to the improvement in the Food and Mouth Disease position in Great Britain, and Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland has decided to relax, as from the 18th inst., their embargo on the importation into Ireland of raw hides and animal manure, and to allow of the landing of these classes of animal manure, under the conditions laid down in the Departmental Form, pending importation should, in the first instance, apply to the Veterinary Branch of the Department (S. and S. Upper Mounts st., Dublin), and to the application of the number and class of animals which it is intended to import and the purpose for which the importation is intended. It should, however, be understood that permits will not be granted for the importation of animals loaded within a Food and Mouth Disease Schedule district, or which have been in contact with such animals during the six weeks preceding intended date of importation.

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FAIRS AND MARKETS

Tipperary Athlete's feat
 One of the finest long distance and endurance country runners that Ireland has ever produced has again proved that, despite the advance of years, his athletic powers are equal to those of a younger man. It is a fact that when given an equality of competition, to the great record of Mr. O'Connell, which has been so fully, yet modestly, detailed in the columns of "Ireland's Own," is now added the following achievement reported in the sports columns of the "Standard" of London:—"The English long distance runner, finished seventh in the Windsor to London Marathon Race (25 miles) on Saturday, his time being 3 hrs 25 mins 35 secs. Some marvellous tests of the endurance of Mr. O'Connell have been written by "The Standard" and they will bear repetition at an early date."

KILLARNEY SALMON FISHING

Inquiry Suggested

TARRED AND FEATHERED

Extraordinary Experience
 An extraordinary outrage was perpetrated (says a reporter Miami, Florida, message) on a British subject, an Anglo-Irish, and an English Anglican, who is a leading figure in a religious work among the Southern negroes. As he was returning home in a motor car after evening service, two other cars drove up, and he was asked for a loan of a spenser. As he was about to get into the car, two men stepped out of each of the other cars, seized him, clapped handcuffs on his wrists, and took him to some adjacent woods, where after being stripped he was flogged. His spenser being applied a seal of tar and feathers which he was to take to his home in a motor car to the business section of the city, and then dropped out into the street. Subsequently describing his experiences, the Archbishop told the police that his spenser assisted him in having preached social equality to the negroes, and of having advocated inter-marriage between the white and black races. They declared that such doctrines could not be tolerated in the South, and threatened they would lynch him unless he left Miami within 48 hours. Four other cases of tar and feathers have been reported from various parts of the South during the week-end, and methods adopted in all these cases are so familiar as to suggest the existence of a secret society, similar in its operations to the old Ku Klux Klan.

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BROTHERS DROWNED

Fraternal Sacrifice
 A sad fishing accident occurred at James town, village, near Carrick on Shannon, on Sunday, when two young men named Joseph and William Gilibuss (brothers), of Angharham, were drowned. Both the men, who were sons of a farmer living near the town, decided to take a bath in the Shannon on Saturday evening. They swam in different directions, at a point where a whirlpool exists, as a result of springs in the river, William got into difficulties, Joseph went to his assistance, and the outcome only understood the seriousness of the situation when both suddenly disappeared. The bodies were quickly recovered from the river, but artificial respiration was tried unsuccessfully.

U. S. A. AND BRITAIN
