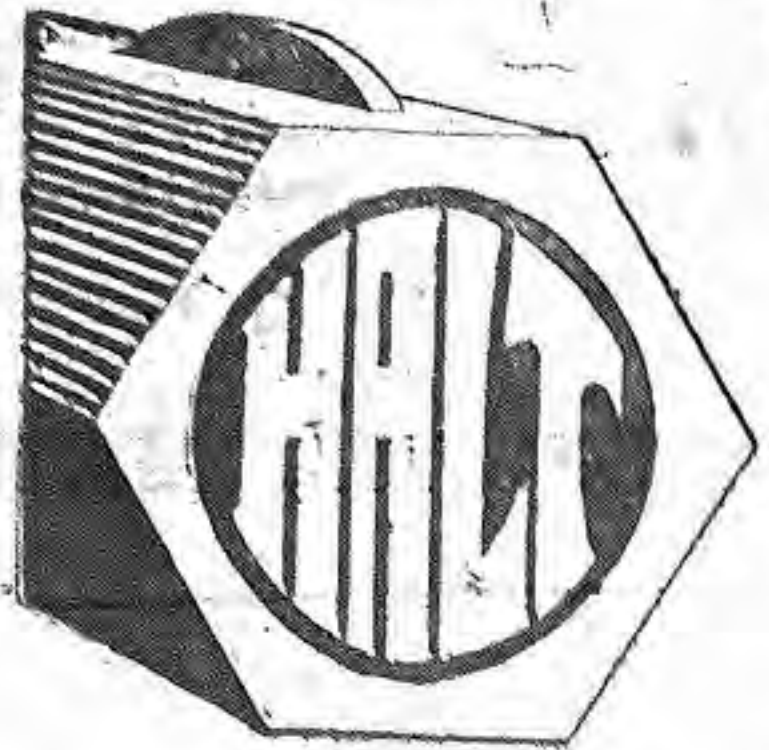

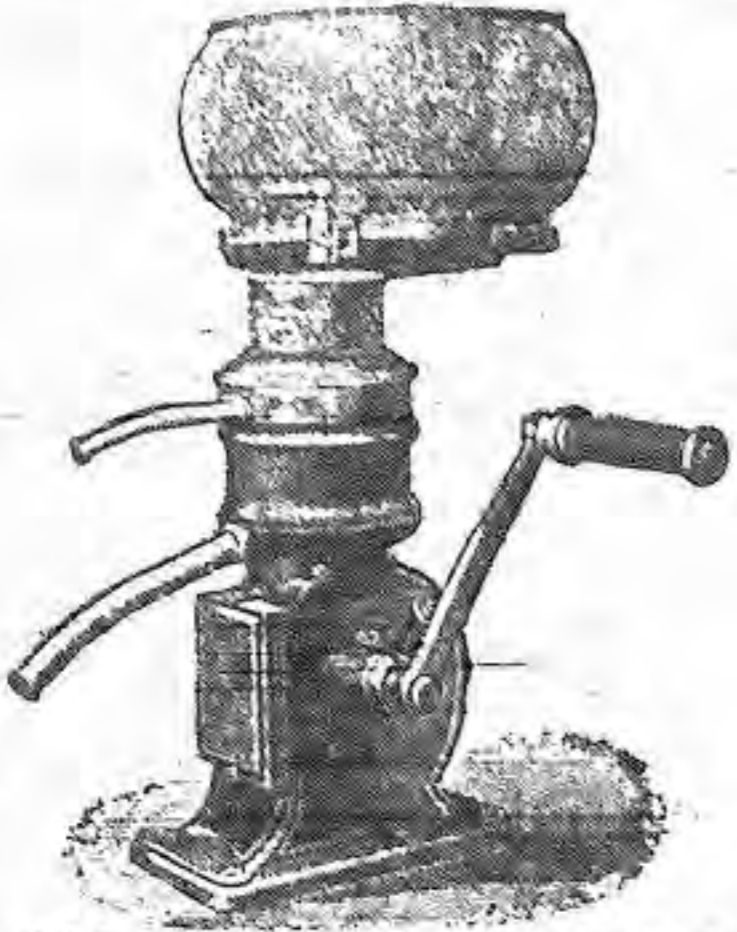

### DOCTORS' HOLIDAYS

#### THE SUBSTITUTE QUESTION

Interesting Discussion at Ennis  
At the fortnightly meeting of the Ennis Board of Guardians, Mr P J McNamara (Chairman) presided.  
Applications from dispensary medical officers for holidays evoked a discussion on exception being taken to the substitute.  
Dr MacClanney, medical officer of the Orahambur dispensary district, applied for his annual month's holidays, nominating Dr Coghlan to act as his substitute, at the usual rate of remuneration.  
There was a similar application from Dr T Fitzgerald, medical officer of the Newmarket dispensary district, nominating Dr Earlight as his substitute, at the usual rate of remuneration.  
Mr Maloy thought there was a resolution on the books dealing to pay those substitutes. He hoped the resolution would now be carried out.  
The Chairman said he was not at the meeting at which that resolution was discussed. He was only recognizing that those doctors were members of an Association, and they were entitled to the provisions of that organization, and therefore entitled to have their substitutes paid the fee laid down. He would leave the matter for settlement in the hands of the Guardians.  
In the course of discussion, in which information was sought as to the general practice in regard to such applications, the Clerk pointed out that according to the dispensary regulations the doctors were entitled to four weeks' holidays, during which the substitute was to be paid by the Board of Guardians. Originally the fee for the substitute was £4 1s, but the Association fee was now £6 5s.  
Mr Kennedy proposed that the substitute be paid £4 1s per week for the period.  
The Chairman would not dream of going against the recognised order of the organization.  
Mr McNamara asked how much more was paid the doctor's substitute during holidays than was paid to the doctor in salary for whom he acted.  
The Chairman replied that the rates of remuneration paid a substitute were governed by the rate laid down by the affiliated organization of which the doctors were members. He considered they should pay the doctors the fee laid down by the Association.  
There was further discussion, arising out of which the Chairman drew the guardians' attention to the fact that the substitute nominated by Dr MacClanney, Dr Coghlan, was already an officer of the Union, occupying two positions—medical officer of the Workhouse and of the Clara Castle dispensary district—and in respect of these positions he was drawing a big salary. It has now sought that in addition he should do duty for Dr MacClanney at his rate of remuneration. That was a policy with which he certainly would not agree.  
Chairman—No do I.  
Mr Maloy—I certainly do not agree so give Dr Coghlan his own fee and Dr MacClanney's fee as well.  
Mr Maloy—It is certainly wrong if you do. Chairman—I believe in giving the recognised fee to a substitute, but I am not in favour of giving Dr Coghlan his own fee and Dr MacClanney's fee. He said he did not understand why young professional gentlemen who had qualified as doctor or dentist were given an opportunity of seeing during those temporary periods of employment, and to give them some chance of encouragement to earn something at their profession.  
Mr Maloy—Certainly.  
Mr McNamara—If Dr Coghlan is, will you get a doctor to do the work?  
Chairman—There are plenty of young doctors in Ennis at present.  
Mr Markham considered that the doctors should be called upon to pay their own substitute in the ordinary course of the Union should be applied to do the same thing when taking holidays.  
The Chairman, suggesting a means of meeting the difficulty, said if the Guardians liked the figures showing expenses and receipts as follows:—Total customs and excise—Budget estimate, £877,800,000; revised estimate, £878,000,000; actual receipts, £883,335,000. IRELAND'S CONTRIBUTION.  
Details of the revenue and the following figures relating to Ireland:—Spirits retained for consumption, home-made, 1,751,239 proof gals.; imported, 555,452 proof gals.; stock of home-made spirits in Irish bonded warehouses, 36,874,976 proof gals. Quantities distilled, 13,587,387 proof gals.  
There were 28 distilleries at work in Ireland in 1930, and the average of output and receipts for illicit distillation in 1930 were 947. The spirits received by makers for methylation are given as 47,889 proof gals.  
EXCISE LICENCES  
The number of brewers' licences issued for the year was 25, and the duty received amounted to £28,721. The net receipt of duty from excise licences in 1930 showed a steady decline from £335,793 in 1911 to £145,912 in 1930.  
254 motor cars and motor cycles licences were issued during the year, and duty received amounted to 224,928. Gun and game licences numbered 20,281, and the duty collected £1,011.  
BEER AND SPIRITS  
The Customs and Excise duties allocated to the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account are given as follows:—  
Customs and excise duties on beer and spirits, £124,388; liquor for the sale of inland, £119,197; other licences, £48,717.  
A table of pensions payable on the 31st Friday ended March 31, 1930, gives the total for Ireland under the Old Age Pensions Act as 173,092.
