Irish Peace Proposals

The correspondence published to-day regarding Mr. Lloyd George's Irish peace proposals will be read with the keenest interest.

Mr. Lloyd George's Terms

To express at this stage a definite opinion as to whether the terms offered could be accepted as the basis of a settlement between Great Britain and Ireland would be both premature and unprofitable.

The most that can be said at the moment is that these terms seem on the whole to be little reason for coming to the conclusion that the door has been banged and bolted on further negotiations between the two countries.

The official publication by the British Prime Minister of the letter written by General Smuts to President de Valera may have a great deal of significance.

The "Freeman," commenting on this particular document, says: "It is not the document which it might not otherwise possess, but which it would now be unwise to ignore."

The only meaning that can be placed on this document which Mr. Lloyd George has added as a supplement to his own, adds our contemporary, "is that the Government binds itself to an offer of complete Dominion Home Rule in the broadest sense."
