Sheep, Barley and Virgil

Light land, sheep and barley, form an agri sultural briaity, but very few farmers in this country realies how sheep-farming and barleygrowing go hand in hand. When antumn or winter barley is sown there will always be a Bibble for the sheep two or three weeks before. shere to a biss of grans, and not only are the sheep improved by eating the barley back but the barley size is improved. The easing back sauses the harley to braird, the droppings of the sheep surich the land, and the tread of the sheep consolidates the land and causes the barley plant to get a root grip. HINTS FOR THE HOME

A COMPLEXION BUAUTIFIER.

The cirl who calnes hor complexion would de well to remander that a lunch of bread and hutter for last dripping, if butter is scarcel and watercress is far botter for the beauty of her skin than one of jum farts or buns and lemanado. Watercross is distinctly valuable for the complexion. It is a real blood purifier, a Spinnoh is viso a spleudid food for the blood. It is richer in iron than any other vegetable. A poncheal egg on spinneh makes an excellent lunchoon for a girl with a tendency to anomia and a poor complexion.

FRUIT PULP.

This is fruit cooked to a pulp as in making iam, but when just maily for the sugar, instead of adding it, the pain is put unsweetened into hat fruit bottles. These may be startlised at once or left until the next day. When sealed the pulp will keep indefinitely. Jam equal to that made from fresh fruit can be made at any time by simply boiling the contents of a bottle with signar for ten or twelve minutes. A two-pound battle of palp requires two pounds of seear and vields four pounds of jam. This is a convenient war of dealing with surplus fruit, and is also economical, as no water is hortled.

TO PICKLE VEGETABLE MARROW: Pool and care the marrow, cut into strips one inch thick, and weigh. To each six pounds allow one quart of vincear, two miners of sugar, one onnee of flour of mustard, half an ounce of turnieric, half an ounces of ground gittler, a few chillies, and a dozen shallots. Mrs the floor of mustand and the turmeric (how obtain the at the chemist's) smooth with a little cold cheegar; then pet into a large pan with the remainder of the vinegar and all the abor mereducers except the marrow. Boil for fiftion minutes. Remove the shallets and put in the prepared marrow. Boil for ten minutes, put into a bid pickle jar, and cover. Keep for a month before using.



A DAINTY VEGETABLE LIE.

Take any cooked vesocables that are to hand, sliced or divided into small pieces; for example, some sprays of cauliflower, sheed tomato, peas, sliced brough beans, broad beaus, the outer skins of which have been removed, carrot, turnip, and onion sliced. Place these in a saucepan, and warm them in well-flavoured brown or white sauce, then place them in a ple-dish, and cover with semolina crust. For the semulina crust put three ownees of semolina in a pan with one pint of flavoured stock, two ownees of fat, pepper and salt. Bring to the boil and stir+well, then cook centiv until the mixture becomes a stiffish paste. Spread on a plate to cool, and use as any other postry.

JELLIED RABBIT.

For jeffied rabbit take two rabbits and obtain in addition two slices of bacon, a quarter of an onnee of gelatine soaked for twenty minutes in sufficient water to cover it, a blade of mace, ten peppercorns, a bunch of herbs, half a teaspoonful of grated lemon rind, two teaspoonfuls of sait, one and aquarter pint of clear stock or water. Having washed the rabbits in warm salt and water, divide into neat joints and put them into a jar with the bacon, but in dice, and the rest of the ingredients. Cover down securely with greased paper. Put the jar in a moderately bot oven for half an hour, and then cook in a more general heat for one and a-half be two hours. When the meat is done the bones are easily detachable. Into a mould freshly rinsed with cold water put the pieces of rabbit, carefully removing all bones. Strain the liquid gravy off and put mould aside to set for twelve hours. Setting can, however, be hastened by the use of ice. To turn the mouse out, dip it into warm water for an instand, reverse on to an entree dish, and gar-

POTATO OMELETTE.

Put two ounces of margarine in a fryingpan and cut in slices three small potatoes. When the fat has melted fry the potatoes a light brown on both sides, and drain off any fat. Mix an egg with one gill of milk, season with pepper and salt, pour on to the potatoes, and cook for about ten minutes, but do not stir after the egg has been poured in. When set hold under the grill or in front of a good fire to brown the top.

POTATO SOUFFLR.

Take four or five large potaboes. Peel and slice, and put a layer into the-bottom of a souffié dish. Add a lump of butter and grated ohoese. Another layer of potato, cheese, and butter, with a soupcon of cayenne pepper, Continue until the dish is nearly full. Add salt, and fill to the brim with milk. This should be done in the morning, so as to let the potatoes stand all day in the milk. By doing this the potatoes become soft and impregnated with the cheese and milk, and so obtain a delicious flavour. Bake in a slow oven for thirty minutes. Just before perving add a little more grated cheese to the top, and set back in the oven to brown. If the mills dries up too much in the cooking a little more may be added from time to time.

MUSHROOM KETCHUP.

To each pound of large mushrooms above one ounce of salt. Break up the mushrooms basin or jar, sprinkling the salt in with them. Let them lie for three days, stirring often. Place the jar in the oven, cook gently till the luice runs out freely. Strain through a cloth ir double muslin; but do not squeeze. To one pint of the juice obtained add one ounce of pickling spice, stew gently for one bour. Strain and put into bottles. Cork when week
