THE purchasing public to this country are nothing if not patient beasts of burden. It can with truth, is doed, be said that they are enduring more in the master of exorb and charges for nearly all classes of goods and produce than in justice to themselves they ought to tolerate.

That profisering is rampant on practically all sides goer wishout eaying. The fact is generally admissed, but merely grumbling against is will not suffice to bring the despicable practice to an and.

Those who buy from the retallers have the real remedy in their own hands if they only log favour in Oavan, and many shops have combine and use it to good purposs. To simply complain will not in it sit bring the profiteer to a sense of Jastise or decency, and some pracsical notion is the only thing that will have the desired effect.

One thing for instance that could be done in Limeriok with usuful results is to form some sort of Consumers' League, which could in vestigate the question of prices and secertain. what addition to the wholesale also of foodatuffs would leave a reasonable mergin of profit for the resaller.

As things ere at present the retailers are in most cases me king an unconscionable profit on what they buy from the wholesaler. Countless instances could be cited to show that this the case, but the fact is too well and too widely known to need any elaborate recapitulation.

The dally newspapers for some weeks past are full of lesters and complaints in reference to the high prices dealeg charged all over the country by butchers and milk vendors, and there can be no doubt whatever that there are good grounds for the allegations made.

Malicious Injuries IMPORTANT CIRCULAR LETTER

From Dall Eireann L. G. D.

Points for the Ratepayers

At the meeting of the Cork Rural Dietrics Council on Saturday, Mr M Mehigan, chairman, presiding, the following letter from the Local Government Board Department (Dall Rireann) was read :-

The attention of this Department has been drawn to the fact that certain policitors and barriebers, taking advantage of the existing truce conditions, are acting in contraemos heassl galaraw edt lo golenev months ago to the office that public ra es cannot be held liable for damages arising out of war conditions, and that any attempt to obtain payment of these claims out of funds essential to the maintenance of cervices visal to the welfare of the general community will be resisted and punished by the elected goverament of the people. In certain counties, notably in Donegal, solicitors have been active since the truce in "garnishesing" rates in satisfaction of these claims, liability for which must be a matter for settlement between the our floring governments. These solicitors and bheir ollends are acting with full knowledge of the attitude of Dall Bireaun on this master and is is not with a view to further satisficating shom as to the position, or as to the gravity of the situation in which they have placed themselves that this circular is teamed, but for the benefit and information of the general public, this Department wishes to define once more, fully and explicitly, the attitude it has adopted towards those so called " Oriminal and Mailcious lojury Claims.

To do so, it is necessary to eketch, briefly, the causes which led up to the definite caverance of relations between Irish local authorities and the Ecglish Local Government Board. GENTLEMEN -It is hardly necessary for me to state that work in concection with the maintenance of roads has been rendered very difficult during the past six months. Fortunately, the very dry summar rendered very little actual repair work necessary, and your district did not enflar as much as others in the matter of preparation of materials, as praction ly all the work is done by hand in the Glin Rural District. With reference to the preparation of materials, I should like to point out that alshough the money allowed for road maintenance in your district is the lowest of any in the western division, the cost of quarrying and breaking stones is much higher in several instances. I could understand this in the case of materials from the foreshore, as the stone is extra hard and d'fficals to break, but in the case of quarries the ecat should be much lower. I have not received the necessary notice of motion from your clark, neither have I any to lay before you. I have to report that my estimate of road expenditure for 12 months from 1ss April, 1022, so Sies March, 1923, is as foliows : -Main roads, 21,650 ; district roads, \$1,215. The amount, however, to be levied off your district will be reduced by 2024, as result of the incidence of chaage of the main road scheme. - Your obedient servant,
