BARBADOS.

Pear-shaped, solitary, furthest east of the West Indies, Barbados generally is accounted the most healthful of the group, even though it is the most populous country in the works, to the square mile, except Chins, says an Amarican paper. ...


The island is but an eighth the size of Rhode Island, but has twice as many inhabitants to the square mile as the smallest and most densely populated State in the United States.

Seldom does a volcano become an asset, bas volcanic aruptions have contributed largely to the fortility of Barbados. When the sun was obscured throughout one day in May, 1922 the Barbadians were panic stricken; bet when the gentle rain of black dust subsided, the deposit was found to be ashes from an eruption of St. Vincent Soufriere, nearly 100

miles to the west, which enriched the soil. Long before that time, though, Barbadon was productive. Oldest. of British colonial possessions except Newfoundland, it also was the first place in the British Empire where sugar cane was planted. Its average crop of this now high-priced commodity is 50,000 tons. It also has 2,000 Geres planted in See Island with long staple - tion ; raises 40,000 bunches yearly of the Chinuse banana, and exports molasses. 



To Fry Cabbage

Oold cabbage lefs over from dianar should be chopped into small pieces, seasoned with pap per and sals and a pinch of herbs and spice. Melt a little dripping or other fat to keep 16 from barning; put is in, and turn it about unbil dry and brown. Oold carrots can also be added, or onlong, and just a little grated apple gives it a pleasant flavour. A teaspoonful of serry powder sprinkled over before frying is liked by many.

Savoury Oucumbers

Required :- Two small onesmbers, fiver, s little butter, and half a plut of brown gravy. Out the encambers lengthwise, scrape out the peeds, put into bolling water with a little sais ; simmer for five minutes, take them out and place in another pan with the gravy ; boil over a brick fire until the outoumbers are tender : If as all bitter, a lump of sugar should be added ; thicken the mock with a little flour, add a little butter, then pour same over the sacambers and serve.

Dried Beef and Mggs

Gat a tin of dried heat, awo or more eggs, newording to size of tin, Break eggs, season with salt and pepper, beat and turn luto a hot greased frying pan. Add the beaf, and scramble porscher ; if liked, herbs may also be added as seasoning.

Curried Beef Hash

Two pounds of cold roast beef free from skin and superfigue fat one onion, three tablespoon fuls of butter, one tablespoonful of chopped pareley, one sablespoonfal of carry powder. sas supral of stook or water, one tablespoonful of shutney, one tablespoontal of thickening, and a border of plain bolled rics. Out the beel inte small enter. Pasi and chop the onion, and fry it is one tablespoontal of the butter with pareley. When nicely browned, add the serry powder, seir wall, and add the stock or water, and then the chutney. When hot, stic In the thickening, blended with the remaining butter, then add the meat. Season with a listle sals and sook gently unsti gaine hos. Dish up in the seatre of a border of well-cooked rice.

Ourry Omelet

To fiethen the colcur of a carpot, free it from dass, then rub is with a flinnel wrang ons in sospends and impossing, a bablespoorfel of incombine to a gallon of ands. Wash only a small piece at a sime and sub dry with a clean clath,

Save all candle ends, put them in an empty jam jar, molt, and add enflicient turponting to make the mixture rather thin. This will polish linen or any description of flooreloth.

To preserve rubber heals, scrape all grit and mud out of them when disaning the boote. Grit and small stones wear out the rubber as is revolves on the solaw, making it fail off long bafore the heel is really worn out.

Rub a mud staloed umbrella with a rag dipped in methy lated spiris, and the stains will disappear.

To freshen a black velour has, hold it in the steam of a fast-bolling hotele. Oars should be taken not to gracp the hat by the brim, otherwise floger marks will show. Dry on a perfectly CAS CHYIROS,

When a knitted jamper is soo small or out of date a good pian is to unpick the jumper and wind the wool in sheins and sie each skein is 4 places (to prevent from tang'ing) ; then steep in lukewarm soapy water, rinse in lukewarm water, and hang out to dry. This makes old wool like new and it knits equally well.






