

## A Good Move

THE Limerick United Trades and Labour Counoil, we are glad to see, has taken practical initiative with a view to combatting profiteering in the sity.

That body sent a delegation to the meeting of the Corporation held on Thursday night, and as a result of the views put forward by the deputation the Borengh Council appointed a commisses to act in conjunction with a commisses to be subsequently appointed by the Trades Council to go into the matter of profiteering and devise a means of dealing with it.

This is a decidedly good move so far as is goes, and we hope to will be followed up by some prompt and definite action that will bring much-needed relief to the harassed local pur chasing public.

Limerick may be a bit backward in many things but in the matter of excessive charges it can easily hold its own with most centred cither in Ireland or in Great Britain.

In the course of his remarks at the Corpora tion meeting on Thursday night Mr James Darr. President of the Trades Council, of the depaisation from which he was spokesman, denounced the profiteers as "public robbars, and many will agree with him that the appella tion, though strong, is by no means sutirely nadeserved.

Things were going from bad be weree, remarked Mr Carr, "and is was felt than the Civic Fashers, in conjunction with the workers, were compelled to take some action. Profiteering was rampane in most things, but it was especially noticeable in the prices of mean and vegesables. Bacon in the city was the same price retail as it was twelve mouths ago, although the price of pigs had decreased sucr. mouely. As regards beef and muston, the price was as a higher figure than anywhere else in the country-in the midet of an egricultural and mest raising district."

Nobedy wishes to deny the totallers a fair and reasonable prods. To that they are, of course, fully entitled. But their greatest apologist cannot explain the wide margin of difference that exists in most cases between what the preducer gets and what the consumer has so pay.

Numberless instances could be cited to show that the mejority of retailers, and, in many cases, the wholesalers, too, are reaping a profit for which there is not a shred of real justifies

This thing cannot be allowed to go on, and the secret and more vigorously it is tackled the better eventually for all classes in the sommunity.

The butchers, the beconcurers and merchants and the milk vendors-to mention only a few of the many classes of profiteers—have in mesi cases been resping a golden harvest of un. conscionable predict and nothing must be left undone to bring them to their senses-or

rather to a sense of honesty and justice. Readers of the newspapers of late are being given plenty proofs of the existence of gross profiteering. They can see for instance how some butchers can sall at as much as 64 and 84 per lb less than some of their sompetitors, and do so on their own showing at a fair profit.

And so with other eleases af traders. The joint Committees of the Limerick Corporation and the Trades Council will have ample field for the exercise of their energies in combatting profiteering in the city, and it is to be hoped they will set to work at once with a view to bringing local prices down in all cases to a reasonable level.


