LIMERICK QUARTER SESSIONS

MALICIOUS INJURY CLAIMS

Applications Before Judge Pigot

County Court Judge Pigot on yesterday concluded the hearing of the malicious injury compensation claims at the Limerick Quarter Sessions.

Commander Gregory, R.I.C., sought £1,500 compensation for injuries received in April last owing to a motor in which he was travelling from O'Connell-st. to the station. The motor was driven by a man named O'Connell, who was driving at a considerable rate, as they could understand that the police barrack at the station were being attacked. He was hurrying to reach the station on the road. The motor car ran into a trench on the side of the road. It was out with a certain amount of technical skill, the trench only extending half way across the road; it was obviously meant to damage a car coming along the road, and it was out in such a way that it must have been intended to hit the trench on the side of the road.

His Honor raised the point whether the trench was dug with the object of damaging the motor car or in order to prevent a car from proceeding along the road.

Mr. J. S. Gaffney, Crown Solicitor, alleged that the applicant had at about 1 a.m. he was travelling in a Ford car and accompanied by two "Crosley" boys, one named Vary, lights and rockets being set off, which were going at a considerable rate, as they could understand that the police barrack at the station were being attacked. He was hurrying to reach the station on the road. The motor car ran into a trench on the side of the road. It was out with a certain amount of technical skill, the trench only extending half way across the road; it was obviously meant to damage a car coming along the road, and it was out in such a way that it must have been intended to hit the trench on the side of the road.

His Honor raised the point whether the trench was dug with the object of damaging the motor car or in order to prevent a car from proceeding along the road.

Mr. Gaffney said he did not think it would be necessary to go into the details of the intentions of the persons who dug the trench.

After some legal discussion as to how the question of malice arose, his Honor decided to hear evidence as to the cost of the repairs to the car which was damaged on the occasion, and Mr. Patrick O'Connell gave evidence that the cost of the repairs was £111 15 6, and that the car was working in good condition after the repairs, in accordance with the estimated price of Messrs Ford's parts, was £111 15 6 and there was no charge made in his estimate for labour, the work having been done by the applicant's men.

Applicant re-examined, said that when the Ford car overturned he was thrown out, receiving cuts on his head and face; as the car overturned he received a knock on the head, and as the result of the occurrence he had become "lumpy," and his nerves had gone all wrong, so that he had to apply for leave, which was granted, and he was away from duty for four and a half months; he had been under the care of Dr. Bennett (Kingsdown), and he had to leave the country altogether owing to his condition; on medical recommendation he went abroad and returned to duty on 28th September; he had previously suffered a fit in from his nerves, and that was as a result of being blown up at sea when the ship was sunk and he was wounded; at the end of about six weeks, however, when his wound had been healed he was quite well again; his wounds on the occasion were caused by shell splinters of which he had received three in the arm and one in the side.

To his Honor - £40 or £50 would cover the cost of his medical if he had been at home during the nineteen weeks which he was compelled to be a result of his injuries to spend abroad in hospital.

Dr. Bennett gave evidence as to his attendance on the applicant and gave a detailed description of what the plaintiff was suffering from; applicant was not yet normal and when he would be normal would depend on the kind of work he would be engaged in; he was still nervous and his condition might possibly become permanent.

His Honor allowed £450 with £35 14s expenses in the personal claim, and £15 in respect of the motor car.

Constable Murphy, R.I.C., stationed at Oola, claimed compensation for malicious injuries received on the 2nd of July.

Applicant, examined by Mr. Gaffney, O.S., said that on 2nd July he was one of a party of police which went out from Oola to investigate the burning of some railway waggons on the line near Oola; when they came within a few yards of the bridge which crosses the line a fire was opened on them by men on the bridge; they were taken completely unawares and he was among five of the police who were wounded, two being killed; he was laid up for twelve days and suffered from shock and nervousness for a long time; he was better now.

Dr. O'Sullivan, Pallis, gave evidence that he was in attendance on the applicant after the occurrence; as a result of his wound the man had become a complete wreck for some time; he was very nervous; he was recovering now; he had never been off pay.

Sergeant Kennedy, R.I.C., Kildare, claimed for injuries received on 15th July. He stated that he was on duty on that night, and when at Ballydoonagh, as a band on duty, he fell into a trench, sustaining injuries, and now he is laid up from the effects of the occurrence and from loss of memory.

Dr. Conroy gave evidence that the applicant's injuries were not serious, and included facial and bodily contusions and cuts, and that he was still suffering from their effects.

District Inspector Sampson said the man was still very nervous; he was recovering now; he had never been off pay.

His Honor gave a decree for £45.

CASTLEGONNELL TRAGEDY.

RECALLED IN COURT. Claim for Compensation. Case Before Judge Pigot.

At the Limerick Quarter Sessions on Monday, Mrs. Agnes O'Donovan, Castlegonnell, made application for £20,000 compensation for the loss of her husband, Mr. Denis O'Donovan, who was shot in the hotel at Castlegonnell on Sunday, 17th April last...

The witness admitted the charge. D. K. Kins, R.I.C., said the house was well guarded. The witness imposed a fine of £5 and costs. For the defendant the witness prohibited hours John Carroll was fined £5.

The witness stated that at 10.15 p.m. on the 17th August he saw two men leaving the defendant's premises as he was passing. One of the men was John Carroll; he went to the shop door and looked in; on entering he found several men working for the publican; the publican's wife admitted that she was assisting in preparing the house.

The witness admitted the premises, but said the house was well guarded. A fine of 10s and costs was imposed on the publican, T. G. and costs on Carroll, and each of the others 5s. In the case of the publican an order was made that the fine was not to be repaid.

Major Colley said that when the premises were burned down it was necessary that the premises should be opened as early as possible. The witness produced evidence to prove that the premises had not been opened. The witness granted the certificate.

The applicant's case was that while doing a glass of wine at the Technical School on the morning of the 7th February 1920, his right hand went through the partition, a strip of iron which was likely to remain permanent. The partition was removed for the purpose of a dance held in January, 1920, on instructions received from the Principal of the school, Mr. M. De Laoy.
