







STORAGE OF POTATOES

The results of experiments on storage rot in potatoes carried out recently at the Agricul. bural College, Glasnovin, showed that the sural College, Glasmevin, showed that the most dangerous source of infection arises from the direct costant of subers with blighted foliage. Although blight has not been very prevalent this year, there have been reports of late appearances, and cars should, therefore, be taken when pointoes are being dug to prevent tubers coming into contact with diseased stalks, and not to use the latter as covering for plawhile lying in the field.

At the time of lifting or shortly if arwards potatoes should be escafully picked and graded into large and small sizes, and stored sep-arately Discensed tubers and very small once should be removed from the others and put away for pig or poultry feed bg.

Where potatons are stored in pits or elamps out of doors-and this is the method adopted with the bulk of the grop ast required for sood-the pit or slamp should be situated on the driest part of the ground. Low-lying damp land, subject to fixeding, and chaitered places in the visibility of trees, are most appaultable positions for pits.

positions for pits. After grading, pointoes should is piled in a heap not more than three feet wide at the bottom, and gradually tapering to a width of a few meters at a height of about 2½ feet. Os very dry land the pit bottom may as hollowed slightly, but the best results are observed when the pit is made on lavel ground. When the pil-is made up it should be sovered with a layer of from 4 to 6 inches of dry straw, which in turn should be sovered with a layer of soil of simi-iar depth. Provision for ventilistion - to prevent the disease known as " pit rot "-should be the disease knows as "pit rot"-should be made by inserting small bundles of straw at intervals of from five so six feet along the top of the pis. DIGESTIBILITY OF EGGS.

Raw white of egg leaves the stomach much sooner than any other egg product; the raw yolk requires much longer. Hard boiled egge require a few minutes longer for gastrio digestion than soft-boiled eggs; scrambled eggs require a little longer still. Eggs fried in excess of fat remain in the stomach only a little longer than boiled eggs. The popular belief that fried or moderately greasy foods give the stomach appreciably more trouble was not substantiated by these experiments. Posched, stirred, and scrambled eggs were found to be the most readily digested forms of eggs. So says the Journal of the American Medical Association.

PRENCH BEANS A LA POULETTE.

Wash and string one pound of beans, and put them whole into boiling water. When tender drain and put on one side. 

The Franco-German War

When the Franco Garman war buret upon Europe the villagers were basily preparing for the representation, which was about to take place. The call to arms rang through the peaceful little village, and those engaged upon the work of production were obliged to leave she stage for the battlefield. Out of the 70 villagers engaged in the work eight were killed on the blood stained field of France.
