



#### Disparities in THE mist disparities in the prices ruling throughout Ireland are strong if not conclusive avidence that profiteering is and has been very

rampant in this country. It is not to be wendered at, of course, that local circumstaness and other conditions show!d make some little difference in cost of commo dition on hetween such places as Dablin and Etmerick, for instance, inevitable.

But the margin in most cases in point that can be quoted is so large that it leaves ne room for doubt that in several quarters a wholly anconscionable profit is being reaped at the expense of the purchasing public.

When one retailer in a particular town or city, for example, can cell for a shilling an article for which another trader in the same place pushing observes one and einpeace the latter to undoubtedly guilty of barefaced robbery.

And instances of price disparities of this kind sould be mentioned not only by the hundred but by the thousand, all showing to what a huge extent the retail buyers of most commodities are being fleeced.

Strong efforts are being made all over the country to bring prices to a reasonable and proper level, and they have already achieved soms vary marful results.

The Anti-Profiteering Committee formed in Limerick, we are glad to see, has set to work with a view to moderating prices in the city, and it is to be hoped the efforts in that direction will be the mesne of bringing muchneeded relief to the local purchasing commanity. Limstick can more than hold its own with

most places in the matter of high charges, and the members of the City Anti-Profiteering Committee have wide scope for their energies in trying to force prices down so the level warranted by wholesale costs and the costs of production.

Prices ruling in saveral Irish centres throw an interesting side-light on many of those being charged in Limerick, and the Aust. Profiteering Committee will, no doubt, bear them in mind in their negotiations and endeavours with various classes of traders in the olay.

# POOR LAW SYSTEM

#### INTERESTING EXPERI-MENT

TO BE MADE IN DUBLIN

Economy and Efficiency Almed

A six months' experiment in Poor Law neministration, which may have far reaching results for the whole of Ireland, was desided on by Dablin Board of Guardiaus, on the recommendation of the Local Government Department of Dall Elreann at a special mesting on Friday. The experiment takes the form if the appointment if a whole-time Commissioner to deal with the affairs of the

Mr Richard Beck moved, and Mr O'Callaghan seconded, the necessary resolution, and the discussion was based on the following, sabmitted by a Dall Inspector :-

"Having carefully considered the recommendation of the Local Government Department of Datl Eireann in regard to the appointment of a whole-time Oceamissioner, and believing such appointment would lead to sconomy and efficiency, we agree to the enggestion, and request the Local Government Depart. ment to appoint a Commissioner to the Dabita Union, with plenary powers to deal with all terr gularities and the enforcing of dicety inc. to transfer, dismiss, superannuate, and otherwise deal with all employes; to alter (should he think fit) the present system of administration, accounts, and records, with a view generally to avo'ving a system of poor relief which will eliminate waste and incil clessy, and so provide at a reseasable cost an institution at once a comfort to our sisk poer, destitute and infirm, and a oredit to the City of Dublin, subject, however, to the following ecaditions: --

At a meeting of the Beliast wholesale mershele departure from Ireland. Sabsequently | chants on Thursday night the President proposed the following resolution, which was passed :-" Test this meeting of the members of the Belfast Wholesals Merchants' Association calls upon the Imperial Government, shrough the Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, to extend to traders in this country full prosection in the discharge of their legitimate business, inasmuch as freedom of trade with many areas has cessed to exist through the illegal operation of what is known as the Belfast Boycott, and which is carried on by methods of violence and intimidation. We respectfully demand this protection as loyal men paying our share of Imperial taxation to ensure us our rights and liberties as British citizens. We note with eatinfaction that Mr Lloyd George has promised protection for English traders whose goods are boycotted in Ireland, and we respectally claim shat the

same protection be extended to us. Mr Robert Kirk, in seconding, said it was s great play that they had to bring forward a resolution of that kind, but it was their duty to use every effort to bring this unfortunate of boldly asking America to ouncel England's

business to a close. Mr John Tyrell said the boycost was an illegal interference with the liberty of the subject, and it has brought unfold misery and loss to the residents of those a eas in which it had operated most severely.
