In the King's Bench, Dublin, before Mr Justice Finn and a common jury, the Probate suit by Edward O'Toole against Edward Finnegan to prove the will of Miss Brady, late of Limerick, was tried. The testatrix was the last of her family and left no immediate next-of-kin. When she got too old to manage her farm she sold it and the stock for £1,900, and went into lodgings in the city of Limerick.

GAELIC TEACHER. For Charleville District. In connection with the teaching of the Irish language classes in the Charleville district, the local O'Connell Gaelic League have now secured the services of a new Gaelic teacher, and his appointment will be a decided boon to the revival movement in the district. The new teacher, Mr. Joseph Kelly, is a graduate of the National University of Ireland having taken his B. A. degree by qualifying in the following subjects, viz. Irish, Latin, Logic and General Mathematics, Psychology, and Social Philosophy and Ethics.

SWEEP STAKES. Question of Legality. A communication received from Dublin states:—The attention of the public is again called to the fact that sweepstakes on horse races are illegal, and that the postal authorities in Ireland have been authorised to open and detain any correspondence (including money) passing through the post relating to such sweepstakes.
