



"The establishment of the similarity of responsive actions in the plant and animal is," Professor Bose remarked, "of the highest significance." for "we now realise that it is by the study of the simpler phenomenon of irritability in the vegetable organisms that we may expect to elucidate the more complex physiological reactions of the

In this respect the sense of taste resembles the less elaborated senses -namely, those of touch, heat, cold, the muscalar sense, the sense of pain, and apparently also the sense of equilibrial pressure, which, though not concerned with sound-vibrations, is conveyed to the brain by fibres which form

part of the auditory nerve. ABOUT MERCURY.

Although the tiny planes Morenry, lost as it generally is in the near effulgence of the sun's blaze, has been known even from the most ancient days, it is a difficult object to discover, and is, therefore, a landmark in the novice's astronomical career when first seen in the evening twilight or morning dawn low down on the horizon, says Mr. M. B. Heath in Country Side.

As well as being the nearest to the sun, Mercury is also the smallest of the eight major planets, its diameter being only about 3,000 miles, so that its volume is only a little ever a twentieth part of that of the earth, or about three times that of the moon. The surface of the planet is, of course, correspondingly small, being about one seventh of our world's. The planet completes a revolueighty-eight days, or somewhat her the three of our mouths, to do which it has to keep up an average speed in its orbit of about twenty-nine miles per second, as sompased with the partir a more moderate orbital velocity of eighteen and a half miles per ascond. As, however, the orbit of Mercury is markedly eccentric, its speed varies widely in different parts of the orbit. When meared

the sun it is rushing onward with the TERRIFIC VELOCITY of thirty-five miles per second, nearly double dest of the earth; but when furthest fare the sun the speed slackens down to so low as twenty-three miles per second, which is not very much in excess of our one morld's. Mc B toff. o, Chairman of the Limerick Donney Concoli, presided at the adjourned baif-yearly meeting of the Proposale Committee of that bedy on Saturday, when the principal business of the Committee was the consideration of the tenders for advertising and for printing and stationary supplies for the ensuing year. In regard to the advertising is was decided to adhere to the precedent of accepting the tenders of the four city papers and one county paper under the same terms as prevailed for the past twelve months. Is regard to the contract for printing and stationery and to which the attention of Dablin

stationery firms had been directed, a deputasion from the L'merick Branch of the Typographical Association, consisting of Alderman Doyle and Mr O J Carsy, seevetary, having been admitted to the Council in somme Mon with their application to be allowed place their views with regard to the position of the printing industry in the city as existing at present, Mr Oarey thanked the Council for deciding to hear the deparation. They were present, he said, to appeal to the Proposale Commistes to do everything in their power to keep the printing work of the Council as home se much as possible, and so have the work executed locally. 
