A report has appeared in the American papers that an order for a shipment of Irish butter was senselled, as is could not be guaranteed by the Irish shippers free from preservatives other than sale. The Dairy Association say they have no knowledge of shis, nor could is apply to that Association, as they have no difficulty in giving the required guarantee. It is, however, known that there has been ahlpped, not only from Ivaland but from Great Britain, butter which was not submisted to the graders of the Dairy Association before it was despatched. Owing to the adverse dairying conditions which prevail in Ireland in the winter, it is not easy to manufacture as good butter as in the summer months, but with extra care and a skilful use of the appliances available in any well-equipped ereamery, buiter of exsellens quality can be turned out, and, as a master of feet, is turned out by the majority of dairies. The main requirements are strict oleanliness both at the firm and ereamery, careful cleaneing of all utensils used, pacteurisation, and close attention to temperatures at all steges. The prospect of drastic measures being taken to deal with the comparatively few manufacturers who are either deliberately, or through earelessment, publing on the market buster containing excess moisture has given homones satisfaction throughout the whole erade.

A splendid demand existed during the past sevenmenths for goods of Irish manufacture. So great was this domand that, in certain instances, Irish manufacturers were unable to immediately cope with it. Many of them hastened to instal additional plant and machinery (a costly proceeding) and to increase the number of their workpape, whilst quite a considerable number of new Irish industries aprang into being. 


