

When it is remembered that one official has to deal with such a variety of business as the issue of selegraph and ordinary money orders

and war cardificates, payment of old age panslone, army allowanees, and postal drafts, and several other matters, some idea can be had of the immense strain on the officials.

GREAT PRIEST

DIES IN AMERICA

A CLARK-BORN PASTOR "HEART OF GOLD" STILLED FOR EVER

Touching and Eloquent Eulogy American excharges to hand contain lengthy references to the death in the stry of Cohoes. Diosess of Albany, USA, of a brilliant Clare priest in the person of Rev Michael C Gavin, Pastor of St Agues' Church, Cohoes, who passed away last month after an illness of long

duration. Father Gavis was a native of Ogonnellos Killalos, and was unote of the late Mr Patrick Gavin, victualler, Davis street, Lime-

"While the death of Father Gavin has long been expected," ramarks, the "Ophoes American," " the news of his passing away came as a distinct shock to the community in which he had laboured for 24 years sea servant of Ond, and sorrow was expressed in every walk of the clay's 1 f.

The same paper, giving a sketch of the life of the decessed slargyman, anys :- "Rev Michael O Gavin was born in Ireland seventy years ago. He attended the Parcellal Sobocia of his native hirabpiace and afterwards entated the famous Maynooth College, Iceland. from which he was graduated early in 1878 Wise his graduation be completed his desconship for the priesthood, and dame to the Unite ! States for the purpose of finishing his atuates for the work of the Church. Arriving in the United States late in 1878, Father Gavin entered Niagara Seminary in 1874. He was ordained in she same year at the Troy Seminary. At the time of his death he had comploted 47 years as a priest. Father Gavin's first assignment was as assistant paster of the Anne's Church, Fourth Avenue, Albany, where he served for a number o years. He was then sent to Sa Peter's Obarch, Troy, where he served for eix months as locum tenens (acting paster) after the death of the then pastor. His work in Troy attracted the attention of his superiors, and within a short time after leaving St Peter's he was seelgned as paster of the Catholic Church at Blobfield Springe."

From that onward Father Gaynor's premoafon was as rapid as his assivities were mani-

Describing the funeral obsequies the "Cohoes American" says :- "Not only ware members of Father Gaynor's parish among the mourging mulstande but members of other churches and of other denominations prowded the edifica where the beloved priess had lahabred for so many years. FACTS AND FANCIES.

A QUAINT ELECTION. As old-world election takes place every two years at Kirby Hill, in the parish of Kirby Bavensworth and wapentake of Gilling West. Under the will of John Dakyn, dating back to 1550 a ourious method of choosing wardens crustees of the hospital, which he himself Amoded, was inaugurated, says the Yorkshire Past. The people of the parish assemble in the common hail, the Vicar being returning officer. Each of the four churchwardens not be cardidate, the Vicar proposes one, and the Vicar and churchwardens jointly nominate one, making six in all. The names of the candidates are enclosed in separate pieces of white paper, which in turn are wrapped in coarse brown paper, and then coparately enclosed in a small ball of cobbler's wax. The balls are then dropped into a bowl of water, the heated wax cracking freely after being immersed. The candidates whose names ere enclosed in the first two balls taken from the bowl are publicly declared to be duly elected to hold office for two years. The other balls are left in the water, and in the event of a trustee or warden dying during his term of office, a ball is taken from the bow! and the person ramed in it serves in the racant office. The idea of the founder in formulating such a mode of procedure seems to have been to enours purity of election. Locally the event is facetionaly named "Kirby Hill Races."

THE PEREGRINE FALCON The peregrine taleon is the bird of prey prized by falconers. It is regarded by other Birds with the greatest terror. 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POSSIBILITIES OF HELIUM.

SCIENCE NOTES AND NEWS.

Progress in knowledge of the element helium has opened up astonishing possible. ties, save the Times: In the year 1868 the French astronomer Janssen directed attention to lines in the solar spectrum which had hitherto been unobserved, and in the same year the Englishmen Frankland and Lockyer inferred from these lines the axist. ence in the sun of an element hitherto muknown on the earth. They called the element helium. A hunt for it began. Palmieri found traces of its presence in lavas from Vesuvius; Hillebrand in the United States extracted a small quantity of the actual gas from a rare mineral, although he did not at the time recognise the nature of his discovery; in 1896 the late Sir William Ramsay extracted it from the mineral eleveite. Subsequently it was found to exist in many natural gases in varying quantities, and to be present in our own atmosphere in the amount of about four parts by volume in a million. Until 1918 probably not more than three

or four cubic yards of helium had been collected. But this was enough to place the element in its true position in the chemical series, and to lead to the discovery of its poculiar properties. Two of these properties, the fact that after hydrogen, of which it has 92 per cent, of the lifting power, it is the lightest known gas, and that it is non-inflammable and non-explosive, made it an ideal aubstance for airships. On the proposal of Sir Richard Threlfall, the Admiralty Board of levention and Research sent Professor M. Levnan, in 1915, to

Canada to determine the beliam contents of

the natural gases at Alberta and New Brunswick, and to devise methods for extracting and purifying them. The Professor arrived at the conclusion that from Alberta alone over 10,000,000 cubic feet of helium could be obtained annually, and the utilisation of other sources in the Empire would bring the annual supply to over 12,000,000ft. Even al though this quantity would keep only a very few large airships in commission, it is im portant that the supply should be secured. and the bulk of it preserved for amorganeiss, especially as there is good reason to believe that the supply of natural gas is far from in-But there is a currous use to which belium might be put at once. Sir James Dewar, in 1895, sneeded in hypervine a minute quantity of behum that he had obtained from natural gas at Bath. When it is liquefied, and possibly even solulified, the lowest temperature attainable can be reached. In 1908 Onnes, of Leiden, working with a larger quantity, succeeded in reaching a temperature of approximately 271deg, below zero Contigrade. This is a close approach to minus 273deg., the absolute zero, the point at which, theoretically, all heat movements would cease, and molecular matter would have contracted down to the vanishing point Already it is known that many elements change their electrical properties when they are cooled down towards this point, and the apportunity of reaching an unknown state of

A NEW VIBRATION GALVANOMETER. Vibration galenuameters are useful in zero measurements, but have not been much used in industrial laboratories on account of their being sensitive to external vibrations and requiring deliente adjustments. A new instrument developed by the United States Bureau of Standards, winch has a sensitivity higher than other forms of the moving fron type, but less than that of the most sensitive forms of the moving coil type, has the advantages of sturdiness, quick responsiveness, and freedom from the effects of external sibration. It consists essentially of a fine steel wire mounted on one pole of a permanent magnet, and so arranged that the free end of the wire may vibrate between the noles of an electromagnet through which the current to be debeeted passes. The paper describing this instrument is Scientific Paper No. 370 of the Bureau of Standards, and any one interested may obtain a copy by addressing a request to the Bureau.at. Washington.

POWER FROM SEA WAVES.

In a paper published by the College of Engineering, Tokio, Mr. I. Hires describes some experiments made with a wave motor. He states that taking the coast line of Japan to be 1,500 miles in length, power amounting on the average to at least 5,000,000 h.p. is being wasted in actions which are merely destructive. The above figure is, he states. equivalent to two thirds hap, per linear foot of shore, and were is practicable to devise means for utilising it efficiently and without exercise capital expenditure the advantage would be very great. With a view to garning some idea as to the feasilatity of utilising some of the wave energy now wasted be creeted within reach of the waves a bourd, 64ft wide and suspended from a hinge fixed 18 2ft, above the lowest point of a bed of concrete, shaped to conform to the path of the lower edge of the swinging board. In order to keep down the cost of the plant the concrete hed was not carried down below lowwater mack, its lowest point being in fact O'Sti, above mean som level. The tides at the sito elected have a range of about 5ft. at spring and 2ft, at near tides. The shore is shelvane and large waves are broken up at a considerable distance from the shore, and even in storms the height does not exceed 67t. at 1,500 from the shore the where they break. The waves formed as a consequence of this breaking were again broken up at 200ft, from the shore line. On the other hand, even in the calmest weather there are always waves reaching the shore, having a height of about 2ft, a length of 160ft, and a period of from eight seconds to fifteen seconds. The pendulum board was loaded with stones, and it was found that the effectiveness of the device varied considerably with the load, but at the best the output was small, the best result being equivalent to the production of mechanical work at the rate of 110ft, ib, per second. This was obtained with a pendulum weight of 1.155lb., a wave height of 2ft. to 6ft., with a mean period of 9'8 seconds. The amplitude If the swing ranged from 20 oneg, to 47 odeg.

ORIGIN OF THE LOCANBERRY. It appears that the plant that is now well known as the logamberry is a red-fruited mariety of a trailing blackberry that grown wild on the Pacific Coast, rather than a hybrid between this blackberry and raspberry. Such, says the Scientific American, is the view given by George M. Darrow in a Farmers' Bulletin from the United States Department of Agriculture. Mr. Darrow calls the plant the "Logan blackberry," in walling therefore, a red fruited blackberry. It is reported that this variety is distinguishable from certain black-fruited varieties only by the character (chiefly the colour) of the fruit, and that there are also wild forms of the species which have red fruits. It is clear, however, that the original seedling of the Logan blackberry was grown from a seed taken from a black-fruited plant that grew in Judge Logan's garden. The Logan blackberry s sound to be adapted to culture in the milder parts of the Pacific coast states. The variety does not thrive in any of the central or easters states, and thus far no strains adapted for culture in these states have been developed. Several forms of blackberries and blackberry-
