

APPEALS TO AMERICA FOR LOAN OF TWENTY MILLION DOLLARS

On Behalf of Irish Republic

What the Money is Needed For The following is a copy of an appeal icease to the people of the United States by Mr S M O'More. Mayor of Limerick, American Agent of the Finance Department of Dail Elreann :-A CHARA-In the year 1920 a loan of more than five million dollars was successfully floated in this country by the Irigh Republic. Wishin a few days I shall render you an account of this money and ludiente to you in some detail the manner in which it was expen-

I have now to feform you that I have been commissioned by Mr Michael Collins, Minister of Finance of the Irich Republic, to come to the United States as Financial Agent for the purpose : f floating a loan of twenty million deliars. This, the second external loan of the Irish Republic, was duly authorised by Dail Elreann, August 26, 1921.

England, too, has sent her financial agen here to avrange the loans which your connery has made to her, losus of not less than five billions of dollars -- to say nothir g of the unpaid interest. Irojand cialms the same privilege and har a greater need.

Dall Eireann, at its meeting of August 17th. in passing a resolution of thanks to the American people, promised, on behalf of the Itieh Nation, to redeem the bond sertifical se of the first loan in due course. To fulfill this pledge and to redeem also this present issue would be an easy susk for a free Ircland, for Ireland's annual revenue, is awo hundred and fifty reillion dollars. The British Treasury Department itself admits to collect of this sam every year from Ireiand. The amount of our revenue then for one month would be sufficient to enable us to pay our debt to the people of this country.

Permit me briefly to indicate to you the purpose for which this second last is needed. It England to morrow should renew her aggression against us, we sould not, without this losn-deprived of our revenue as we are-effectively at their one government or successfully resist that ag gression. We must be prepared.

We need it also to repair the Livages of war,

FRUIT GROWING

COUNTY LIMERICK

A Pallaskenry Example

Situated midway between Limerick and Fornes, and wishin about three miles of the River Shaunon, one enters the vilage of Pallaskenry (writes Mr J J Olery, Harblouitarat Instructor, Crosm). Here on avery side even the asses observer cannot fall to notice that fruit brees are extensively grown, for in the gardons of the soltager and farmer one is greened with either the fruit or branches of the trees papping over the fences. Some of these orchards are of long standing, but a very large number, also are of recent introduction. The latter must be credited to the account of the Instructor in Horstonisure, Mr J Malone. It is really pleasing to travel through the county and ese in meanly every onlings sarden from three to thirty-six apple trees growing; and in all cases gooseborries and earrants growing between them. The planting of shore trees in the costage gardens so antengively was the result of the scheme of planting frait trees for small holders, which is in opera blem under the County Commisses of Agriculturs, Limeriak-it also is to operation in the other counties in Ireland—the planting of which is carried out under the directions of the Bortionitural Instructors.

A special planning soneme of recent lutroduction has also been very much availed of, and a very large number of the various kinds of fraits have been planted. Forces broce have been largely planted also, thus going to show how popular the scheme is and the interest taken in planting among the people.

It is wonderful the effect the planting of those fruit trees, etc. has produced throughout the county. The people delight in their fruit trees, and can tell one the names of each varioty which does not do wall in their woll. Those particular varioties they do not keep as an syesore, but after experimenting, and flading shey do not do satisfactorily, they immediabely discard them. As a matter of fact, they do not root them up and burn them, as might be expected, but they out them ever and graft en others which have been proved re-

The farmers, also, have planted extensively ander this latter scheme, and on some approach to nearly every farmatend is to be seen orehards of from half an acre in extent up wards, of nicely pruned, healthy fruis erees, cf proved reliability.

One such orchard I visited deserves special moution. It is clivated in the townland of Kildimo, Pallaskenry, and its owner, Mr P Sallivan, is a most skilled fruit grower. portant question. I do not believe in putting s small quantity of maners in a ring around each It may work out all right with small tress, but in an orchard where you have large arees, it is far better to spread planty of farm. yard manure over the entire surface of the orchard, as then all the surface roots, no may har how far they extend, are sure to get food. I give a dressing of basic slag, and a heavy an plication of farmyard manure each year. For a number of years I kept between the rows cultivated, and graw all kinds of vegetables. erops and strawberries, but now the trees have got too large, and it is all les out in STRES. "De you find spraying pays?' I here in-

astred. "Yes, very much so; you ocnnot grow apples suitable for market without spraying properly. The County Inspector and myse:f have oprayed in winter with the Caussie spray, and is in the real thing Is simply outs moss and all foreign master off the mass. Luck how clean and healthy they are now. Sometimes, after a elight shower of rain, I come out with some buckets of lime, and seaster is through the branches. I find this very good also. I also spray with copper sulphate and arrenate of lead."

I left Mr Sailivan, fully convinced, from what I had seen, that if others followed in his footsteps, we would not be depending on imported fruit.

POTATO VARIETY TESTS

Substitutes for Basic Slag

Daring the past season (writes the Depart ment) special trials were carried out at 121 centres in Co Donegal, in all the counties of Connacha and in Counsies Clare, Kerry and Ocik (weet), in Maneter, to teet the cropping qualibles and suitability for cultivation in these sountles of Karr's Pink, a comparatively new mainto op variety. The trials were carried out by farmers -- under the expervision of the appletant agricultural overseers-under onlinary farming conditions.

The Average Yields

At It centies in Co Donegal the average yields per statuta nors were 12 tons 1 owt unleable (seed and ware), 19 awts 8 qcs, amail I owre 1 or diseased, that is, a total yield of 18 ons 4 cws per strate sere. In the past, basic slag containing over 30 per cent of total phosphases and wish a citrio aniubility (according to the Wegner seet) of over 80 per cont were easily obsainable and could always be relied on to give eatlefactory reagles upon land in need of such manura. As present the production to Great Brisain of hasic sisg of this description is much less than previously and as a result of the difficulty which farmers experience in procuring supplies an effort is being made to encourage the use, as r substitute for high grade baste elag and superphosphate, of other forms of phosphate fereilisers such as ground rock poosphase or mixing and each ground phosphate and law grade basic slags. That pertain forms of rook phosphate, eg. those of North African origin, are capable of being profitably used for the supply of phosphoric sold to the soil, experiments conducted some years ago by the Da parament clearly showed. Not Recommended

It is understood that at the momont certain Irish traders are in a position to offer on special terms supplies of besis sing containing to per cent to 24 per cent total phosphates but with a bigh degree of sittle solubility. Ordinarily basto slag of shis description is, so far as this ocunery is concerned, relatively higher in cost per unit than slag of better quality, and for this reason its use is not to be recommended. It, however, in the special circumstances now existing such sieg is procurable at a price per unis that compares favourably with sing of higher grade there is no reason why farmers should not purchase the lower grade, provided always that they safeguard themssives by insisting on a guarantee of a citric olability of not less than 75 per cent.

SOLD AT FANCY PRICES

Irish Product Sacrificed The General Council of the Irish Creamery Managers' Association has lesued a protest against statements regarding Irish oreamsry butter which have been made as meetings of
